Additional Guides The great players Sony Crackle, Crackle, or Crackle Plus Once known simply as crackle, this free streaming site has experienced almost as many name changes as P. Diddy. Initially controlled by Sony, it is now a joint venture between Sony and Chicken Soup for the Soul Entertainment (CSS). This partnership created a new entity called Crackle Plus, and it was believed that it would also become the name of the streaming service as well. However, a look at the site and it is clear that simplicity has won: It is just called Crackle. Whatever you call it, the service includes content from six ad-supported CSS streaming services (Popcornflix, Popcornflix Kids, Popcornflix Comedy, Frightpix, Spainflix and Tru!), as well as some Sony movies and TV shows. You'll find quality low-budget hits like Election, Bernie, Coneheads and Train to Busan, as well as a generous handful of obscure but interesting B movies. Crackle is an excellent resource, although constant interruptions from advertisers can age quite quickly. Lla Lla is available in 21 countries, but has closed its Canadian, Latin American and Australian offerings. IMDb TV Plus new to this roundup is owned by Amazon IMDb TV (formerly known as FreeDive). It has free, advertising-supported television shows and movies. In February 2020, the service acquired the rights to more than 20 Disney-owned series, including Lost, Desperate Housewives, Malcolm in the Middle and My So-Called Life. It's also the only site that allows you to stream Lost and Malcolm in the Middle for free. Other television shows in his relatively small library include Psych, White Collar, 3rd Rock From the Sun, and Schitt's Creek. It has a number of hit movies, including the Hunger Games series, Groundhog Day, Isle of Dogs, Big Fish, Rudy, Glory, and many more winners and cult classics. You can watch IMDb TV on the web, Amazon Fire and Apple TV devices, and thanks to the Amazon Prime app you can find on many smart TVs, tablets and phones. IMDb TV is only American at the moment, although a European expansion is underway. Vudu, owned by Vudu Walmart, might be best known for its subscription streaming service, but the platform also has an impressive and free content section supported by advertising. Titles such as Ella Enchanted, The Preacher's Wife and The Hangover Games are good examples of what you'll find. If you're cruising through the 4K/HDR title site selection, there are even one or two free-to-watch options. You'll still need a Vudu account, but you can create one for free. The Vudu app is already supported by many platforms, including Roku, Apple TV, game consoles, and more. In addition, there is an app for most mobile devices. Vudu is only available in the United States. How is this for a bargain: Sign up for a library card and get free downloads or movie streams without any announcement at all. That's the deal when you use Hoopla, a digital media streaming platform that has partnered with local libraries to let members access online-borrowed content. It is similar to Overdrive, but with more than e-books and audiobooks. The availability of a given title will depend on your location and the number of copies available for download, but we found some surprisingly decent movies when we checked in October 2020. Streaming will work on any device with a browser, while downloads will require the Hoopla app on a mobile device. Not all libraries currently in charge of Hoopla, so be sure to ask. To date, libraries in the United States and Canada have access to Hoopla. YouTube This one is a no-brainer. Everyone knows YouTube is the biggest online video hosting service, and you probably already use the site for stupid chat videos and images of people getting hily with exercise balls. But YouTube has a large collection of feature films on its free level as well. Granted, the majority of them are new to the B list, but there are some quality movies hiding in there. In addition to free movies, made by Google, there are thousands of movies on the site that won't arrive unless you search for them directly. If you're looking for a particular title, especially an older title, it's worth a quick search on YouTube to see if anyone has posted it. These are not always downloaded by film rights holders, and many of them are divided into episodes and playlists, but as they say, beggars cannot be choicess. Finding free movies on YouTube has become more difficult lately, as more rights holders choose to offer their movies for rent via the service, and YouTube also has subscription levels like YouTube Premium and its live tv streaming service, YouTube TV. Still, you'll find a lot to look at, especially if your standards aren't too high in terms of stream quality. Vimeo YouTube might be the biggest video hosting site, but Vimeo is probably the best. Yes, they're fighting words, but Vimeo has the muscle to support them. The site has its own layout that is devoid of ads and benefits from a community of active users that is widely considered more professional and constructive than YouTube. From this community emerges many great original shorts and feature films. Vimeo also has an on-demand section where users can purchase feature films and TV shows. The majority of them are produced independently by Vimeo users, but some offers are produced by major studios as well. Anyway, Vimeo is a great place to find free, high-quality movies. The Roku Channel When Roku launched its free, ad-supported Roku channel, it was not technically eligible for this roundup because you had to have one of the company's streaming media devices to see it. Roku devices certainly won't break the bank, but they're not free. Now, however, the Roku channel is available to everyone, via the web, as well as through the company's free apps for iOS and Android. The service has more than 10,000 titles to choose from, including old favorites such as The Sisterhood of the Traveling Pants and Donnie Darko, as well as a number of new and old TV series, from The Dick Van Dyke Show and Bewitched to The Bachelorette. You'll need to create a free Roku account before you can watch, but it's a quick and painless process. If you ever decide to expand your choices, the Roku channel now houses several premium subscription options, including Showtime, Epix and The Roku channel is available in the U.S. and Canada. Plex Free Movies and TV Shows Plex is best known as a versatile and easy way to manage and watch your private collection of movies, music, photos and other media. However, in 2019, the company launched its own ad-supported free streaming service with a collection of movies and TV shows from studios such as MGM, Warner, Lionsgate and Legendary. It is available all over the world, worldwide, the selection of titles will vary considerably from region to region. You can access the collection of movies and shows from a browser, or on one of the many devices that supports Plex client software, such as Apple TV, Roku, smart TVs, etc. All you need is a free Plex account and you're ready to go. For those who already use Plex as a multimedia server, free ad-supported options can be added to existing server categories, making the experience completely seamless. Pluto TV Although it is not as well known as the above services, Pluto TV is still worthy of your attention. Not only does it host free movies on demand, but it's also a free live tv streaming service, hosting content organized from all over the web. While the channels vary enormously, we focus here on the movies. Pluto TV currently has several live movie channels, perfect if you want to watch something but don't know what. There are two general cinema channels, the rest focusing on specific genres or categories, including action films, Flicks of Fury, Horror 24/7, Movies Classic, Black Cinema, Gravitas Movies and The Asylum. The service operates in the United States, as well as many international locations. Pluto TV's on-demand cinematheque is relatively small and runs frequently, but offers as much variety as its live cinema channels. It's also available on a ton of devices in addition to your computer, including Apple TV, Amazon Fire TV, Roku devices, and more. To learn more about Pluto TV, check out our full guide to the service. Tubi TV Another up-and-comer, Tubi is very similar to Sony Crackle, in that it offers both free movies and TV episodes. No matter which device you use, chances are good enough that you'll be able to watch Tubi because it's available on Android, iOS, Roku, Apple TV, Amazon Fire TV, Samsung Smart TV, Sony Smart TV, PlayStation 4, Xbox One, and the web. As with the vast majority of services on this list, you'll need to watch some advertisements, but that's what keeps the service free. Tubi has the content of more than 200 partners, including NBCUniversal and Warner Bros., which brings with it nearly 400 classic titles such as Hell's Kitchen, Unsolved Mysteries, 3rd Rock From the Sun, and The Real McCoy's, and the original version of 21 Jump Street. Hit films such as Kick-Ass, Fury and 13 Going On 30 are here, as well as cult classics like 30 Days of Night, Donnie Darko and The Boondock Saints. Cult classics such as Assault on Precinct 13, Camp and C.H.U.D., as well as cult classics such as 10 Cloverfield Lane and No Country for Old Men, are also in the growing catalogue. If you're using this service to complement Netflix rather than replace it, the No on Netflix section will help you find new and interesting movies to watch. Kanopy Independent Films and Documentaries Like Hoopla, Kanopy is not only free to but it's also ad-free if you have a library card. Founded in 2008 in Australia as an educational tool, Kanopy now offers a library of more than 30,000 films through its partnerships with more than 200 libraries. The focus is on free independent films and documentaries (the company even has access to many recent films from the A24 catalogue), but you'll find all kinds of movies available, and even more are on the way thanks to an agreement that will see the entire catalog of filmmaker Fred Wiseman come to the service. Kanopy is available internationally, but content may vary depending on location. Top Documentary Films Love Documentaries? So are we. You know what they say, truth is stranger than fiction. The well-titled Top Documentary Films is, hands down, the best site for documentaries. Not all selections are long, but a good documentary doesn't have to be long — some of the best are under 60 minutes. Boasting a library of more than 3,000 films, the site also has a simple and direct layout and categorizes all its films according to the subject, making it easy to find something that interests you right away. The content is not hosted by the site, but rather organized and integrated from other sites such as YouTube, Vimeo, Daily Motion, etc. It is available internationally, but not all content will work in all locations. Sources for classic movies Archive.org Chances are, you read this article because you are looking for a place to watch newly released movies online. While there's nothing wrong with that, you certainly shouldn't ignore all the older fantasy movies the Internet has to offer. Archive.org offers a treasure trove of old movies you've probably never heard of, as well as a handful you'll recognize. The Archive - which is also home to the famous Wayback Machine that shows you how the Internet was - has silent movies, black and white horror movies, obscure sci-fi movies, and an assortment of other movies. They may not have all the fancy CGI we've all gotten so used to, but the occasional return is a great way to mix things up. Open Culture Open Culture is designed to be your one-stop shop for all things free and cultivated. The site offers hundreds of free online courses to sign up, thousands of free ebooks to read, and hours on lecture hours from celebrities such as Carl Sagan and Leonard Bernstein. It also offers a ton of free movies. Here you'll find everything from silent films and Hitchcock-directed projects to westerns and Black. The site is even home to some short films by legends such as Quentin Tarantino and Stanley Kubrick. Open Culture can be hard to navigate, but with over 1000 free movies available, it's definitely worth slogging. Retrovision Retrovision is another public domain site that classic films from many different eras. The word classic might be to interpretation - there are a few movies here that were made as recently as last year, and not all Retrovision movies are of high quality - but there are still a lot of good things here. Retrovision is also a well-designed site that allows users to filter based on gender. It is also not limited to feature films, as there is a solid collection of classic television programs to choose from. Shocker Internet Drive-In Shocker Internet Drive-In is a few niche, and its website looks like it was made in the 90s, but it's a great resource. The site is updated weekly with featured horror classics, which are then made available for free download as WMV files at the Snack Bar site. Users can also purchase DVD copies of any movie on the website for only \$3. If you miss the old days of the internet when it was more like the Wild West and everything was less polite, this could be for you. The downside of so many different services being available is that if you have a movie in mind but don't know where to watch it, you have a lot of different catalogs to browse in the hope of finding it. Fortunately, as long as you have a smartphone, you probably have access to a tool that can help you. Apple's TV app, available on iOS as well as several other platforms including Apple TV, Roku, Amazon Fire TV, as well as LG and Samsung smart TVs, lets you search through more than 50 different streaming services. For Android users, the Google Play Movies and TV app offers similar features, although the number of connected services is lower. Roku devices now have a Free Featured section that offers an organized selection of the best free content on the platform, whether you have a specific channel installed or not.
