## Labor incumbent in limbo as the vote count continues



The final order may not be known until next week.

For incumbent MLC for Northern Victoria Jaclyn Symes (Labor), who slipped out of the top five yesterday, it's a case of wait and see.

"It's not dissimilar to four years ago, although Labor's primary vote looks a lot better than back then," Ms Symes said.

"Because of the below the line voting system we won't know the result until mid next

"I feel like I'm a little bit in

limbo but because I've been through it before I'm fairly relaxed."

Ms Symes said the overwhelming win by her party in the Legislative Assembly and the likely increase of Labor numbers in the Legislative Council was confirmation of the government's performance over the last four years.

"I'm so proud of what we have achieved, and I look forward to continuing that good work," she said.

Despite a number of Lower House seats still being up in the air, Ms Symes said the government was already back to work.

"Daniel (Premier Andrews) is keen to get cracking as soon as possible and my office was

open today, despite all of my staff being exhausted.

"The good thing about a returning government is you can just pick up where you left off."

Ms Symes said if the numbers didn't go her way in the count she would be happy to make a contribution to public life in other ways.

"I've never described politics as a career," she said.
