Gift-Giving

- 8. Did you ever give a gift you would rather have kept for yourself?
- 9. What's one gift you have always wanted but have never received?
- 10. Do you like to put a lot of thought and time into buying gifts? Why or why not?




God's Gift:

"God loved the people of this world so much that he gave his only Son, (Jesus), so that everyone who believes in Jesus will not die, but instead have eternal life."


