In which of these situations would people in your country expect you to apologize to them?



Idioms:

- **1. No big deal** not difficult or troublesome. "Don't worry. It's no big deal to wash the dishes. No problem."
- **2. Better (be) safe than sorry** You should be cautious—if you are not, you may regret it. "It may be time-consuming to check the oil in your car every time you buy gasoline, but better safe than sorry."
- **3.** A sorry sight a sight that one regrets seeing; someone or something that is unpleasant to look at. "Well, aren't you a sorry sight! Go get cleaned up and put on some clean clothes."
- **4.** Bear a grudge against someone continue to be angry about something; not willing to forgive. "She still bears a grudge against her friend even though she has apologized many times."
