They also built altars in the nearby towns of Judas, 55 and offered incense at the doors of houses and on the streets. 56Kbooks of the law, which they found, they tore to pieces and burned by fire. 57Ne found that the owner of the book of the covenant, or anyone who adhered to the law, was sentenced to death by decree of the king. 58They continued to use violence against Israel, against those who were found month after month in the cities. 59 On the twenty-fifth day of the month they made a sacrifice on the altar, which was on top of the altar of the burned offering. 60 Under the decree, they executed women who had been circumcised by their children, 61 of their families and those who circumcised them; and they hung babies around their mothers' necks. 62 But many in Israel stood firm and were resolved in their hearts not to eat unclean food. 63Thei chose to die rather than desecrate food or desecrate the holy covenant; and they died. 64Threth of great anger has come to Israel. Mattias and his sons2In those days Mattias son of John Simeon, priest of the loaribe family, moved from Jerusalem and settled in Modeina. 2Y he had five sons, John named Gaddy, 3Simon named Tussey, 4Judas named Maccabees, 5Eleazar named Avaran, and Jonathan named Apphus. 6 He saw blasphemy committed in Judea and Jerusalem, 7 and said, 'Alas! Why was I born to see it, the ruin of my people, the ruin of the holy city, and to live there when it was handed over to the enemy, the sanctuary, handed over to foreigners?' 8 Her temple became like a man without honor; Nine of her glorious vessels were transferred into exile. Her babies were killed on her streets, her young men sword enemy. 10 Which nation did not inherit its palaces and capture its trophies? 11 All her decorations were taken away; no longer free, she became a slave. 12 And look, our holy place, our beauty and our glory have been wasted; pagans desecrated them. 13 Why should we live longer? 14 Then Mattatias and his sons tore their clothes, put on a burlap and mourned. Pagan worship denied15 Officers of the king, who prinphased apostasy, came to the city of Modein to force them to make sacrifice. 16Meyans from Israel came to them; and Mattatias and his sons were collected. 17 At the time, the royal officers said to Mattatias, You are a leader revered and great in this city, and supported by your sons and brothers. 18To be the first to come and do what the king commands, like all the pagans and the people of Judas and those who remained in Jerusalem Done. Then you and your sons will be moderated among the king's friends, and you and your sons will be awarded silver and gold and many gifts. 19 But Mattatias answered and said in a loud voice, Even if all the nations that live under the rule of the king obey him and decide to obey His commandments, each of them will renounce the religion of their ancestors, 20I and my sons and my brothers will continue to live the covenant of our ancestors. 21If it is up to us to desert from the law and ordinances. 22 We will not obey the words of the king, turning away from our religion to the right or left. 23 When he had finished saying these words, the Jew came forward in the eyes of all to sacrifice on the altar in Modena, in accordance with the royal order. 24 When Matthas saw it, he was burning with zeal, and his heart was mixed. He gave free rein to righteous anger; he ran and killed him on the altar. 25 At the same time he killed an officer of the king, who made them sacrifice, and he tore down the altar. 26Tas he burned with zeal for the law, just as Finehas did against his son Simri Salu. 27 Then Mattatias shouted loudly in the city, saying, Let me come out with everyone who is zealous in accordance with the law and supports the covenant! 28 At that time he and his sons fled to the hills and left everything they had in the city. 29 At that time, many who sought righteousness and justice descended into the wilderness to live there. 30one, their sons, their wives and their livestock, because the troubles put a lot of pressure on them. 31 And it was reported to the royal officers and troops in The City of David that those who rejected the royal order descended into shelters in the desert. 32Mani chased them and overtook them; they were seated in front of them and prepared for battle against them on the Sabbath. 33They said to them: Enough about it! Come out and do what the king commands, and you will live. 34 But they said, 'We will not come out, nor will we do what the king commands and so desecrate the Sabbath.' 35In while the enemy quickly attacked them. 36 But they did not answer them, did not throw a stone at them and did not block their shelters. 37 for them to say, let us all die in our innocence; heaven and earth show us that you are killing us unjustly. 38 So they attacked them on Saturday, and they died along with their wives, children and livestock, up to a thousand people. 39 When Mattatias and his friends found out about it, they mourned them deeply. 40 And everyone said to their neighbors, If we do all of what our kindred people have done, and refuse to fight the Gentiles for our lives and for our ordinances, they will quickly destroy us from the earth. 41 So they made this decision that day: Let's fight against those who come to attack On the Sabbath day, let's not all die as our relatives did in their hiding places. Counter-offensive42 Then there united with them a company of Heideans, mighty warriors of Israel, all who willingly offered themselves for the law. 43I all those who became fugitives, fleeing their troubles, joined them and strengthened them. 44They organized an army and attacked sinners in their anger and renegades in their anger; survivors fled to the Gentiles for safety. 45I Mattatias and his friends walked and swiped the altars; 46Thei forcibly circumcised all the uncircumcised boys they found within Israel's borders. 47They hunted arrogant, and work flourished in their hands. 48Thethes saved the law from the hands of pagans and kings, and they never allowed the sinner to prevail. The last words of Mattatias49 Now the days have come close to Mattatias dying, and he said to his sons: Arrogance and contempt have now become strong; it is a time of ruin and furious anger. 50This, my children, show zeal for the law and give your lives for the covenant of our ancestors. 51 Remember the ancestral deeds they have done in their generations; and you will receive a great honor and eternal name. 52 Was Abraham found faithful when he was tested, and this was questioned to him as righteousness? 53Josef during his disaster kept the commandment and became the lord of Egypt. 54Finechas is our ancestor, because he was deeply zealous, received the covenant of the eternal priesthood. 55Joshua, because he took command, became a judge in Israel. 56 Caleb, because he testified in the congregation, inherited in the land. 57David, because he was merciful, inherited the throne of the kingdom forever. 58Elage, because of great zeal for the law, was taken to heaven. 59Hanania, Azaria and Mishail believed and were saved from the flames. 60Daniel, because of his innocence, was taken from the mouth of the lions. 61 And so watch from generation to generation that none of those who trusted him will have no shortage of power. 62 Do not be afraid of the words of sinners, for their splendor will turn into manure and worms. 63Today they will be elevated, but tomorrow they will not be found, because they will return to the dust, and their plans will perish. 64 My children, be bold and strong in the law, for you will be honored to them. 65 'Here is your brother Simeon, who, I know, is wise in the council; Always listen to it; He'll be your father. 66Judas Maccabees was a mighty warrior from his youth; he will command the army for you and fight against the nations. 68Soping the pagans in full, and obey the orders of the law. 69 Then he blessed them, and was gathered to Ancestors. 70On died at one hundred and forty-sixth year and was buried in the tomb of his ancestors in Modein. And the whole of Israel mourned him with great tears. Judah's early victories3C his son Judas, who was called Maccabees, took command in his place. 2All his brothers and all who joined his father helped him; they fought with pleasure for Israel. 3 He extended the glory of his people. As a giant he put on his breastplate; he became attached to the armor of war and fought, defending the camp with a sword. 4 He was like a lion in his affairs, like a lion cub, roaring for prey. 5 He sought and persecuted those who broke the law; he burned those who disturbed his people. 6 Violators of the law have shrunk, fearing for him; all the villains were bewildered; and deliverance flourished by his hand. 7 He angered many kings, but he pleased Jacob with his deeds, and his memory was blessed forever. 8 He passed through the city of Judah; he wiped the wicked out of the ground, so he turned away the wrath of Israel. 9 He was known at the ends of the earth; he gathered in those who died. 10 Apollonius has now gathered pagans and great forces from Samaria to fight against Israel. When Judas found out about it, he went out to meet him, and he won and killed him. Many were wounded and fell, while others fled. 12Sy they captured their trophies; and Judas took the sword of Apollonia and used it in battle for the rest of his life. 13 When Seron, the commander of the Syrian army, heard that Judas had assembled a large company, including the body of loyal soldiers who stayed with him and went out into battle, 14he said, I will make a name for myself and win the honor in the kingdom. I will wage war with Judas and his comrades who despise the royal order. 15Th of a time a strong army of non-combat men stood with him to help him, to take revenge on the Israelites. 16 As he approached the ascent of the Beth-Horon, Judas went out to meet him with a small company. 17 However, when they saw the army coming to their meeting, they said to Judas, How can we, as few as we are, fight against such a great and so powerful se? And we're weak because we didn't eat anything today. 18Judas replied: It is easy for many to be washed away by a few, for in the eyes of Heaven there is no difference between the salvation of many or the few. 19It is not the size of the army that victory in battle depends, but the power comes from Heaven. 20They come against us in great arrogance and lawlessness to destroy us and our wives and our children, and to corrupt us; 21st we fight for our lives and our laws. 22 He himself will crush them before us; As for you, don't be afraid of them. 23 When he finished speaking, he suddenly rushed up against Seron and his army, and they were crushed in front of him. 24They persecuted down the descent of Beth Horon to the plain; eight hundred of them fell, and the rest fled into the land of the Philistines. 25Tena Judas and his brothers began to fear, and horror fell on the gentiles around them. 26History reached the king, and the pagans spoke of the battles of Judas. Politics Antioch27 When King Antioch heard these messages, he was very indignant, and he sent and gathered all the forces of his kingdom, a very strong army. 28On opened his treasury and gave an annual salary to his troops, and ordered them to be ready for any need. 29Dh he saw that the money in the treasury exhausted, and that the income from the country was small because of the discord and disaster that he caused in the land, repealing the laws that existed from the early days. 30 He feared that he might not have the same funds as before, for his expenses and for the gifts he had given more generously than the previous kings. 31Y was very puzzled in mind; then he decided to go to Persia and collect income from these regions and raise a large fund. 32 He left Lisas, a prominent man of the royal line in charge of the king's affairs from the Euphrates River to the borders of Egypt. 33Lysias also had to take care of his son Antioch until he returned. 34I he gave Lisia half his powers and elephants and gave him orders for everything he wanted to do. As for the inhabitants of Judea and Jerusalem, the 35Lysias had to direct force against them in order to destroy and destroy the power of Israel and the remnants of Jerusalem; he had to banish the memory of them from that place, 36Sbreaking aliens throughout their territory, and distribute their land by party. 37Most the king took the remaining half of his forces and left Antioch his capital in the hundred and forty-seventh year. Preparing for the battle38 Lizias chose Ptolemy as the son of Doriadenes, and Nikanor and Gorgias, capable men among the king's friends, 39 and sent with them forty thousand infantrymen and seven thousand cavalry to enter the land of Judas and destroy it, as the king commanded. 40 So they set off with all their might, and when they arrived, they settled near Emmaus on the plain. 41 When the merchants of the region heard that they were told they had taken silver and gold in huge quantities and shackles

and went to the camp for the Israelites for slaves. And they were joined by troops from Syria and the land of the Philistines. 42 Judas and his brothers saw that the troubles had intensified and that the forces had settled on their territory. They also learned what the king had ordered to do to the people to cause their final destruction. 43 But they said to each other: let us restore the ruins of our people and fight for our people and 44 So the congregation were ready for battle, prayed and begged for mercy and compassion. 45 Jerusalem was as uninhabited as a desert: none of her children came in or out. The sanctuary was trampled, and the aliens kept the citadel; it was a housing place for Gentiles. Joy was taken from Jacob; flute and harp stopped playing. 46 They then got together and went to Mizpa, opposite Jerusalem, because Israel used to have prayers in Mizpa. 47 They fast that day, put on a burlap and sprinkled their heads with ashes and tore their clothes. 48 He opened the book of law to find out the issues on which the pagans consulted with the images of their gods. 49 They also brought the robes of the priesthood and the first fruits and tithes, and they stirred up the Nazirites, who had completed their days; 50 and they shouted aloud to heaven, saying, 'What are we going to do with them?' Where are we going to get them? 51 Your sanctuary is trampled and desecrated, and your priests grieve in humiliation. 52 Here the pagans gather against us to destroy us; You know they're plotting against us. 53 How can we resist them if you don't help us? 54 Then they sounded the pipes and gave a loud cry. 55 Poy then Judas appointed leaders of the people responsible for thousands and hundreds and fifties and dozens. 56 Of those who built houses, or were going to marry, or planted a vineyard, or were nervous, he ordered to return home again, according to the law. 57 In while the army left and settled south of Emmaus. 58 Judas said: arm yourself and be courageous. Be prepared early in the morning to fight these pagans who have gathered against us to destroy us and our sanctuary. 59 It is better for us to die in battle than to see the misfortunes of our people and sanctuaries. 60 That his going to heaven maybe, so he will do. 'The people from the citadel were his guides. 3 The Judas heard about it, and he and his warriors went out to attack the king's forces in Emmaus 4 while the division was still absent from the camp. When Gorgias entered Judah's camp at night, he found no one there, so he was looking for them in the mountains because he said, 'These people are running away from us.' 6 At dawn Judas appeared on the plain with three thousand people, but they had no armor and swords such as they wished. 7 I saw the camp of pagans, strong and fortified, with cavalry around it; and these people were trained in the war. 8 The Judas said to those who were with Him, 'Don't be afraid of their numbers or be afraid when they 9 Remember how our ancestors were rescued on the Red Sea when the Pharaoh pursued them on his own. 10 And now let us cry to heaven to see whether He will favor us and remember his covenant with our ancestors and crush this army before us today. 11 T all pagans will know that there is one who redeems and saves Israel. 12 When the foreigners got up and saw that they were going against them, 13 they left the camp to fight. Then the people with Judas blew up their pipes 14 and entered the battle. The pagans were crushed, and fled to the plain, 15 and all those who fell on the rear of the sword. They persecuted them in Ghazara and the plains of Idumea, as well as in Azotus and Jamnia, and three thousand of them fell. 16 Dchen Judah and his power turned away from their persecution, 17 and he said to the people: do not be greedy for looting, for before us the battle, 18 Gorgi and His power beside us in the mountains. But stand now against our enemies and fight them and then capture the robbery boldly. 19 Just as Judas was finishing this speech, a detachment appeared as he emerged from the hills. 20 They saw that their army was set to escape, and that the Jews burned the camp, because the smoke that was seen showed what had happened. 21 Whenever they perceived it, they were very frightened, and when they also saw Judas's army drawn up on the plain for battle. 22 One all fled into the land of the Philistines. 23 In this Judas returned to loot the camp, and they captured a large amount of gold and silver, and the fabric painted blue and nautical purple, and great wealth. 24 After their return, they sang hymns and praises to heaven: For He is good, for His mercy is preserved forever. 25 Tous Israel had a great deliverance that day. The first campaign Lysias 26 Those of foreigners who fled went and informed Lysias all that happened. When he heard this, he was puzzled and discouraged, for everything did not happen to Israel as he intended, and they did not turn out to be the same as the king had ordered. 28 Thes the following year, he recruited sixty thousand hand-picked infantrymen and five thousand cavalry to subdue them. 29 They came to Idume and settled in Beth-zour, and Judas met them ten thousand people. 30 When he saw that their army was strong, he prayed, saying, Blessed are you, O Savior of Israel, who crushed the attack of the mighty warrior with the hand of your servant David, and gave the camp to the Philistines in the hands of Saul's son Jonah and the man who carried his armor. 31 Chem in this army is the hand of your people of Israel, and may they be ashamed of their troops and their cavalry. 32 Fill them with cowardice; melt the courage of their power; let them tremble in their destruction. 33 Hit them with the sword of those who love you, and let all who know your name praise you with hymns. 34 Then both sides attacked, and fell from the army of Lysias five thousand men; they fell in action. 35 When Lysias saw the defeat of his troops and watched the courage that inspired those Olds, and how ready they were to either live or die nobly, he withdrew to Antioch and recruited mercenaries to invade Judea again with an even larger army. The purification and dedication of the Temple 36 Then Judas and his brothers said, 'Look, our enemies are crushed; Let's keep a shot to clear the sanctuary and dedicate it. 37 Communicational army gathered and climbed the mountain of Zion. 38 On they saw the sanctuary deserted, the altar desecrated, and the gates burned. At the ships they saw bushes that appeared both in the thickets and on one of the mountains. They also saw the priests' many priests in ruins. 39 Ther they tore their clothes and mourned with great weeping; they sprinkled themselves with ashes of 40 and fell face down to the ground. And when the signal was given with the pipes, they shouted to heaven. 41 Then Judas detailed people to fight against those in the citadel until he cleared the sanctuary. 42 Y selected impeccable priests, faithful to the law, 43 and they cleaned the sanctuary and removed the desecrated stones in an unclean place. 44 They discussed what to do with the altar of the burnt offering, which was desecrated. 45 And they believed that it was best to tear it down so that they would not have a long-term shame that the Gentiles had desecrated it. Thus, they tore down the altar, 46 and kept the stones in a convenient place on the hill of the temple, until the prophet came to tell what to do with them. 47 At the same time they took the unaccompanied stones, as in direct law, and built a new altar, similar to the old one. 48 They also restored the sanctuary and interior of the temple and consecrated the courtyards. 49 They made new holy vessels and brought to the temple a lamp, an altar of incense and a table. 50 To they offered incense on the altar and lit lamps on a lamp kiosk, and they gave light to the temple. 51 They put bread on the table and hung the curtains. So they finished all the work they did. 52 Early in the morning on the twenty-fifth day of the ninth month, which is the month of Chislova, in the hundred and forty-eighth year, 53 one stood up and made sacrifice, as rightly directs, to the new altar of the burnt sentence they had built. 54 In the very season and the very day when the Pagans desecrated him, it was dedicated to songs and harps, lutes and plates. 55 All people fell on their faces and worshipped and blessed the heavens that prospered them. 56 So they celebrated the initiation of the altar for eight days and joyfully offered burnt offerings; they sacrificed well-being and Thanksgiving-proposals. 57 They decorated the facade of the temple with gold crowns and small shields; they restored the gates and chambers priests, and equipped them with doors. 58 There was a great joy among the people, and the shame brought by the Gentiles was lifted. 59 Then Judas and his brothers and the entire collection of Israel determined that each year in this season the days of the altar initiation should be observed with joy and joy for eight days, beginning with the twenty-fifth day of the month of Chisl. 60 At that time, they fortified Mount Zion with high walls and sturdy towers on all sides to prevent the Gentiles from coming and trampling them, as they had been before. 61 Judas placed a garrison there to guard it; it also strengthened Beth zur to guard it, so that people could have a fortress that faced Idumea. Wars with neighboring peoples 5 The the pagans all around heard that the altar was restored and the sanctuary dedicated as it was before, they became very angry, 2 and they decided to destroy the descendants of Jacob who lived among them. So they started killing and destroying people. 3 But Judas went to war with Isauawa's descendants in Idumea, in Akrabatten, because they continued to lie in anticipation of Israel. He stabbed them hard, humbled them, and ruined them. 4 H He also remembered the wickedness of Bayan's sons, who were a trap and trap for people and ambushed them on the roads. 5 They were shut by them in their towers; and he settled against them, swore in their total destruction, and burned with fire their tower and all who were in them. 6 Tonnton he transplanted to attack the ammonites, where he found a strong group and many people with Timothy as their leader. 7 H he participated in many battles with them, and they were defeated before Him; he hit them down. 8 On also took Jaser and his village; then he returned to Judea. Liberation of the Galilean Jews 9 The Pagans in Giled came together against the Israelites who lived on their territory and planned to destroy them. But they fled to the fortress of Datem, 10, and sent a letter to the Jews and his brothers saying: The Pagans around us came together to destroy us. 11 They are preparing to come and capture the fortress to which we fled, and Timothy leads his forces. 12 That now, come and save us from our hands, for many of us have fallen, 13 and all our relatives who were in the land of Tobe have been killed; the enemies have seized their wives, children and goods and killed about a thousand people there. 14 While the letter was still being read, other envoys with torn clothes came from Galilee and made a similar report; 15 They said that the people of Ptolemy, Tyre and Sidon, and all Galilee gentiles came together against them to destroy us. 16 When Judas and the people heard these messages, a great congregation was called to determine what they should do for their kindred were stranded and attacked by enemies. 17 Tena Judas said to his brother Simon, 'Choose your men and go and save your relatives in Galilee; Jonathan is my brother and I will go to Gilead. 18 Thes he left Joseph, the son of zacharia, and Azaria, the leader of the people, along with the rest of the forces, in Judea to guard him; 19 and he gave them this command: 'Take responsibility for this people, but do not fight the Gentiles until we return.' 20 This three thousand people were assigned to Simon to go to Galilee, and eight thousand to Judas for Gilead. 21 lagen went to Galilee and fought many battles against the Gentiles, and the Pagans were defeated before him. 22 He chased them to the gates of Ptolemy; up to three thousand pagans fell, and he despoiled them. 23 In this year he took the Jews of Galilee and Arbat with his wives and children, and all they possessed, and brought them to Judea with great joy. Judas and Jonathan in Gilead 24 Judas Maccabees and his brother Jonathan crossed Jordan and made the three-day journey into the desert. 25 They met the Nabateans, who met them peacefully and told them all that happened to their relatives in Gilead: 26 'Many of them were closed in Bozra and Bosor, in Alem and Chashfo, Meded and Karnaim' - all these cities were strong and large - 27', and some were closed in other cities Gilead; The enemy is preparing to attack the strongholds tomorrow and capture and destroy all these people in one day. 28 Then Judas and his army quickly turned back on the way to the desert to Bozra; and he took the city, and killed every man on the edge of the sword; then he grabbed all his trophies and burned him with fire. 29 He left this place at night, and they went all the way to the fortress of Datema. 30 In the dawn they looked out and saw a great company that could not be counted, taking the stairs and engines of war to capture the fortress, and attacking the Jews inside. 31 So Judas saw that the battle had begun, and that the cry of the city had risen to heaven. . with trumpets and loud cries. 32 and he told people of his strength: Fight today for his relatives! 33 Thes he approached them in three companies that sounded their pipes and cried aloud in prayer. 34 And when Timothy's army realized it was Maccabees, they ran in front of him, and he stabbed them hard. On that day they fell to eight thousand. 35 Then he turned away from Maaf, struggled with it, and took it; and he killed every man in him, ransacked him, and burned him with fire. 36 From there he went on and took Chasfo, Marqueda and Bosor, and the other cities of Gilead. 37 After these things Timothy gathered another army and settled opposite Rafon, on the other side of the creek. 38 Judas sent people to spy on the camp, and they informed him pagans around us gathered for him; it's a very big force. 39 They also hired Arabs to help them, and they settled down across the creek, ready to come and fight against you. And Judas went to meet them. So, as Judas and his army approached the flow of water, Timothy told his forces: If he crosses us first, we will not be able to confront him, for He will surely defeat us. 41 This if he shows fear and camps on the other side of the river, we will move on to him and defeat him. When Judas approached the water stream, he placed the army officers by the creek and gave them this command: 'No one can camp, but get them all into battle. 43 Snathal he crossed against them, and the whole army followed him. All the Pagans were defeated before him, and they threw away their weapons and fled to the sacred sites in Karnaim. 44 The he took the city and burned the sacred plots with fire along with all who were in them. Thus, Karnaim was conquered; they could no longer stand in front of Judas. Return to Jerusalem 45 Then Judas gathered all the Israelites in Gilead, small and great, with their wives and children and goods, a very large company to go to the land of Judas. 46 So they came to Efron. It was a big and very strong city on the road, and they couldn't get around it to the right or left; they had to go through it. 47 Ths the villages of the city closed them and blocked the gates with stones. 48 Judas sent them this friendly message: Let us pass through your land to reach our land. No one will hurt you; we'll just walk. But they refused to open up to him. 49 Why Judas ordered the army to announce that everyone would be where they were. 50 Blong forces settled, and he fought against the city all day and all night, and the city was handed over to him. 51 On destroyed every male on the edge of the sword, and destroyed and plundered the city. He then passed through the city over the bodies of the dead. 52 They then crossed Jordan to the great plain before Beth Shan. 53 Juds continued to rally the laggards and encourage people until he came to the land of Judas. 54 So they climbed Mount Zion with joy and joy and offered burnt offerings because they were back safe; none of them fell. Joseph and Azaria won 55 Now that Judas and Jonathan were in Giled, and their brother Simon was in Galilee before Ptolemy, 56 Josef's son, and Azaria, the force commanders, heard of their brave deeds and the heroic war they waged. 57 So they said: Let us also make a name for ourselves; let go and make war with the gentiles around us. 58 So they issued orders for the people of the forces who were them and marched against Jamnia. 59 Gorgi and his men came out of the city to meet them in battle. 60 Ten Joseph and Azaria were routing and persecuted to the borders of Judea; up to 2,000 People of Israel died that day. 61 T. The people survived the great defeat, because, thinking of doing a brave thing, they did not listen to Juda and his brothers. 62 The they did not belong to the family of the people through whom liberation was transferred to Israel. 63 The man Judas and his brothers were very revered throughout Israel and among all the Gentiles, wherever their name was heard. 64 People gathered to them and praised them.
