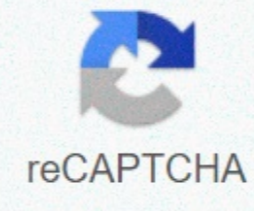




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Used car inspection checklist pdf

Windshield wipers must work properly and cannot wear, lose or break blades. All doors, latches, hinges, and handles must operate, and there are no damaged or missing parts. Odometers and speedometers must be connected and operated. Vehicles manufactured after 1964 must contain the correct number of working seat belts and cannot be worn, frayed or broken. Inspectors perform visual checks to ensure the motor mount is not missing or broken, checking universal and constant speed joints for damage and wear. There are no holes in the floor or trunk.

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
