


Voters guide nassau county

Requesting the Missing Bulletin Online on How to Register to Vote HICKSVILLE, N.Y. - Amid lingering public health concerns about coronavirus, Hicksville voters who haven't cast ballots will head to the polls on Tuesday to do just that in the congressional primary, as well as in state Senate and Assembly elections. All eyes Tuesday will be on U.S. Rep. Tom Suozzi, the former mayor of Glen Cove and the Nassau County executive who is facing challenges from Melanie D'Arrigo and Michael Weinstock. But many New York Democrats will also pay close attention to the number of votes that former Vice President Joe Biden receives in the presidential primaries compared to U.S. Sen. Bernie Sanders of Vermont, who dropped out of the race earlier this year. The state's Electoral Commission tried to overturn the primary election, but federal judges reinstated them. While Biden is the presumptive Democratic nominee, the primaries also dictate which delegates are chosen, which could ultimately affect the party's rules and platform. Suozzi, an attorney and CPA, is a member of the House Ways and Means Committee, the house's main committee on taxes. He is also a member of the Subcommittees on Oversight and Tax Policy. His campaign did not fill out a candidate Patch's questionnaire. D'Arrigo, a Port Washington resident who has worked for 14 years as a health professional for Allies, described herself in a candidate patch questionnaire as a mom and organizer who supports universal health care and wants what she called bold changes to combat climate change. Weinstock, of Great Neck, is a former firefighter and prosecutor who said he wants to be a fresh voice that kids can watch up to. He pointed to incredibly high taxes as one of the reasons many young people can't afford to live on Long Island. Santos, a financial specialist who works in Congress for GOP Primary George A. D. Santos, queens, is a financial professional who wants to take on a radical regime, according to ThelslandNow.com. He didn't fill out the patch candidate's questionnaire. He didn't handle his budget well, Santos told the publication about Suozzi. I'm the antidote to all the wasteful spending. Technology must be constantly tested to ensure that coding and firewalls are effective and that malware is not loaded onto a workstation with access to election data. All devices that are removable or transmit data must be periodically checked/replaced to ensure that voter data is not compromised. I would like to expand the CCTV system to improve security. Federal lawsuits aimed at universal voting by mail (sending ballots to all voters, regardless of whether they asked for those ballots) and collecting ballots (to allow the expansion of current state law to allow more people to pick up vote by mail ballots). I oppose universal postal voting and ballot collection and will lend my vote if I am elected to suggest reasons why these changes should not be implemented. Infectious Control - with COVID19 we need to consider safe, smart methods to maintain voting premises that prevent infection and allow voters to trust early voting and vote on Election Day. Through my experience in health care, I have the necessary skills to address this issue and ensure the safety of our constituents. How can you help voters in a way that others are running for office can't? The leader of the elections is a position of public trust. Confidence in our electoral process is essential for an orderly transfer of power; and that's a key qualification when choosing the next Nassau County election leader. Trust earned; Not provided. Trust takes time and requires a proven track record. Trust is built on community participation and public service. I served in Nassau County in public service for 18 years and demonstrated that I will follow the law and be a strong leader. The experience of holding elections comes from a variety of sources. I have experience as a candidate, working as a public official serving leadership positions in a major political party serving as an observer of the village and assisting in a controlled vote for the elderly and disabled. Maintaining public trust is the highest priority. The power of one voice in this country can make a difference, and I will work to make sure that all voices are heard. If elected, how would you address calls for racial justice? I recently attended a judicial forum in Nassau County, focusing on the topic of racial justice. The forum focused on an article published in December 2016 by the Herald-Tribune entitled Bias on the Bench. I believe that the right to vote is the basis for promoting a stronger social structure in our community. If elected, I will work to ensure that residents are better educated on the restoration of voting rights and how the petition process works to restore voting rights. I believe that when people become involved in their community by voting, there are fewer crimes; and when they have a greater voice in deciding who represents them, they are more responsive to the needs of their community. Elections are essential for the peaceful transfer of power, and we must ensure equal access to the ballot box for all. What tasks is COVID-19 represented in the office you are looking for? I believe that the new COVID-19 norm and the increase in the number of postal ballots will have the following consequences: Increased workload - We can expect an increased workload as more voters ask for a postal vote. This will create a demand for employees, postage, processing and processing of these newsletters and verifying signatures. This is especially important for older people whose signatures change with aging. Security Bulletin - Expanded use of postal voting will require greater storage management and installation of security cameras to help ensure the safety and processing of ballots prior to tabulation. It is important to ensure that workers a large number of ballots are kept safe and prevents the threat of infection. (. I would like to ensure that appropriate procedures for the processing of these ballots are put in place before these ballots are processed or processed. For voters who choose to vote early and vote early on Election Day, we ensure that infection control procedures include social distancing provisions, plexiglass barriers, personal protective equipment, and hand sanitizer. We will disinfect all voting places after each voter to help control the risk of infection. Honest, safe and accurate elections: This will always be a top priority to protect the integrity of the election process. Focusing on detail, proper testing of equipment, the introduction of the highest safety standards and the provision of an appropriate voting system for detention are critical measures. Threat Assessment: With the threat of COVID-19 and the new perspective of pandemic control, we need to continue to assess what happened and how we can better prepare for future pandemics. Shared resources: Millions of tax dollars have been saved through the sharing of information technology (IT), Geographic Information Systems (GIS) and staffing services through interlocal agreements. I will continue to work with other agencies to use common resources to reduce costs and save tax dollars. In addition, I will work to increase voter participation by creating programs in our libraries, schools, and other organizations to help educate our younger generation about the importance of the electoral process. How can you help voters in a way that others are running for office can't? My experience as a small business owner, county commissioner, and my leadership roles in many community organizations ensures skillset needs to get started with great staff to continue the excellent work of the previous election supervisor. I had experience working with our current head on office-related issues, including building security and improvements, as well as budget review and understanding. In addition, I will ensure that voting is easily accessible within the law and encouraged for all registered voters. What tasks is COVID-19 represented in the office you are looking for? New problems are

being raised about the need for social distance as it relates to polling stations, election officials and voting. It is important that the election supervisor promotes a safe and healthy environment for voters by supporting the CDC's social distancing and sanitation recommendations. Voting booths must be divided more than 6' apart and properly disinfected after each voter. This may require additional staff at polling stations to ensure these requirements are met. Electoral commission officials are understandably concerned and may therefore not wish to participate in the upcoming elections. This creates additional problems in finding a replacement for these workers, so additional staff should be on standby. In addition, the number of voters is expected to vote by mail, as many voters may not want to expose themselves or others to potential health risks. Employees must be prepared to cope with the influx of postal and return requests.
