I spent a lot of time puttingting around with different ways of visualizing this data and found two apps that stand out: Power Line and Cool Tool. Power Line and Cool Tool allow you to track a huge amount of information, no matter what you do on the phone. They use an Android operating system feature called the overlay screen, which allows apps to display images over other apps. While the sound is similar to the Android notification bar that is displayed at the top of the screen, the overlay of the screen appears anywhere you want on the screen. Also, for those of you who use Paranoid Android or Pacman custom ROMs, you may not even have bar notifications to show the watch or the quality of the cellular signal - installing an improved bar notification form can help. For those of you with questions on how to eradicate and install custom ROM, check out Danny's article on the subject. Power Line Power Line shows all its information without text - using extremely minimal lines. Although Power Line may display fewer types of reading than Cool Tool, its colorful bars look very good and much easier to install. To get started with Power Line, you only need to light the app. If you need to add extra strings, go to the

settings and press the I button in the top right corner. The basic features of the Power Line app display the phone's information using customized, colored bars, which it lays out in one of three locations: (1) The top of the screen; (2) at the bottom of the screen; (3) The center of the screen. You can change the color, thickness, positioning and transparency of these bars. Plenty of reading: Power Line provides thirteen different reads - there's a fourteenth option to include as a decoration. Full screen bars/lines: Colored bars can cover the entire length of the screen. For example, by using mobile bar-reading signals when in an area of A large cellular reception, the bar covers the length of the screen. The colors of the lines can also vary depending on their strength - for example, if the cellular signal is strong, the color can be set to turn blue. Good minimum aesthetic: Power Line has extremely minimal graphics - it's just a bar. Cheap: A paid version of the power line costs \$1.49. Beautiful: While Cool Tool focuses on raw functionality, Power Line emphasizes appearance. Below, I turned on a few bars on a black background, for contrast. You can see that the lines are of different thickness, color and positioning. The Bad Free version is severely limited: Free versions unfortunately don't come with very much other than battery and signal strength indicators. If it's good enough for you, however, you won't need to buy a paid version. The watch available in the Power Line is predictably a line. For me, it made it extremely difficult to gauge the time - looking at the sun provided a more reliable estimate of time. It's hard to distinguish each line: You can distinguish each line only by changing color, width, transparency and positioning. Often, even with different colored lines, I found myself unable to tell whether my battery was overheating or if it was just low charge. Cool Tool Of two applications, Cool Tool has the most functionality, with less emphasis on aesthetics. It has a huge number of reading options, including GPS signal, cellular signal network power, free RAM, battery temperature and more. One of the most interesting features of The Cool Tool is that it can function as a task killer - although I don't recommend using this feature on any version of Android Newer than 2.2, Froyo. In addition, it has several custom themes that can be downloaded for free. Key features of GPS information: Cool Tool includes gps monitoring. Below you can see the strength of the GPS signal in purple. Usually any rating above zero indicates a functional connection. You can also install GPS to display as a graph that can indicate whether or not the GPS signal will fall soon. Adjustable Positioning: The Cool Tools display can be displayed anywhere on your mobile phone. To change your position, just use a virtual joystick to move the display. Text, histogram or graphic display: Cool Tool can display information in any text form (such as showing the battery temperature in degrees Fahrenheit) as histograms or graphics. There are several free custom themes for the free version. I suggest pairing Cool Tool with a custom theme and using a launcher such as Nova Launcher to rid yourself of bar notification. As a replacement, Cool Tool occupies zero and provides many times more information. Good themes: Cool Tool also offers a variety of free themes. Some increase the size of the graphs and Others change color. Cool Tool gives more leeway for those with custom icons and launchers. Highly customizable: There are hundreds of customizable touchscreen options in Cool Tool. Funny feature of the rich: It can control almost any metric available on your phone. The bad free version includes the ad, but it only appears during the customization process. Overall, it's not much of a negative. Turning on too many sensors will drain the battery faster. Complex: It may take some time to properly customize the app, as there are hundreds of configuration options. Concluding Comparison Cool Tool to Power Line for me is very difficult; over the past few months I have alternated use between them. Are they worth buying? Yes, although the Cool Tool Pro version only exists in the Amazon app store, and Power Line does not include advertising. It all comes down to this: If you prefer raw minimalism, go with the power lines. If you want more of a feature-rich app, give Cool Tool a try. For those of you who are looking for all kinds of hardware information on your phone, check out Erez at Elixer 2. I can personally vouch for the thoroughness of Elixer 2.
