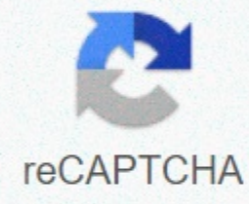

According to the Payscale.com, as of October 2018, the average elementary religious school teacher earns \$35,829, while the average high school teacher earns \$44,150.
