
Lego harry potter years 1-4 game guide

Rowling's Harry Potter series has worked its magic on an entire generation of readers. The cultural phenomenon comes to an end with the release of the latest film, Harry Potter and the Deathly Hallows: Part II, at midnight this Friday, but the influence of Rowling's world can hardly be considered more. After all, getting kids hooked on reading - millions of them - is no small feat. As a trading partner at the Barrett Book Store in Darien, Connecticut, 70-year-old Dottie Brush knows firsthand the series' unique ability to inspire young readers. Before, children come in and ask for the shortest book to go through it to school. But with Harry Potter, the thicker they got, the better they loved them. The terrifying length didn't seem to deter young Potter fans, who tore the pages with an appetite for Rowling's magical world. In a study by market research firm Yankelvich, 51% of children ages 5 to 17 reported that they did not read books for fun before the series began. More than 3/4 of the same children are credited to Harry Potter for making them more interested in reading other books. Everyone read books. People of all ages, says Sarah Flowers, president of the Library Services Association for Young Adults. People on the bus - everywhere you went you saw people carrying books. Around the world, bookstores hosted parties to produce each new part of the print series. Children lined up a few hours before midnight. Now the entire series has been released and a new, younger audience is picking up Potter's books. These new readers don't come of age with Harry, as their predecessors did, maturing over a decade with the main character. They can read books after book without downtime. Reading books in short sequence, though enviably, has its own set of flaws. Since it is an advanced LEGO set and requires considerable attention to detail, younger children have the potential to get bored or frustrated without the extra help from mom or dad. Keep this in mind if you are looking for a hands-off toy that will keep the kids entertained while you sneak into some much needed me time. El/Sarah Wassner Flynn Like most LEGO sets, this one comes with lots of bricks and other pieces divided into bags. In this case, there are 878 small pieces divided between six bags. Pro tip: Keep them all sealed until you've advanced to step by requiring a certain bag. Our kids threw all the pieces on the table at once, making it tough to find specific parts and challenge to ensure that no one gets lost. Spruce/Sarah Wasner Flynn Like all LEGO blocks, we found that these hard plastic bricks were easily rinsed clean in case of sticky fingers or spilled drinks. They are also a long-term choice for a children's toy, as they are hard to break down. But in terms of how much time will go into building it and then admiring and playing with the finished product- there is no doubt you will get a return on your investment. Or, for the starter set, go to the lair of the 157-piece Aragog, complete with a model of a creepy spider with posable legs and local fangs (MSRP \$14.99). Of course, the lower the cost, the less detailed the set, and most of it can't match the combination of fun and familiarity that the Great Hall model offers. And while this set has a cleaner price tag, at least it's more purse friendly than the mother of all LEGO Harry Potter merch, it's a 6020-piece model of Hogwarts Castle. Final verdict Yes, buy it. If you were looking for that big ticket item for an upcoming birthday or a special occasion, this is it. It really transports you to the magical world and keeps LEGO lovers invested and engaged for hours. 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
