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For the thousands of DC children aged three (3) and four (4) who participate in Head Start programs, the Universal Health Certificate is especially important. This includes all students in PK3 and PK4 classes in the name of 1 schools. If the forms are not complete, children may be provided with duplicate services to ensure compliance with federal requirements. Services particularly important for the Head Start program include: Hearing Vision Oral Health Height and Weight or BMI Last hemoglobin/hematocyte screen Last TB test and result and/or risk assessment of the latest lead test and result and/or risk assessment for hearing and vision screens, indicating that the screen has been undertaken or the risk assessment completed at UHC helps Head Start programs identify the next steps and follow-up steps. The full form of THES, responding to the D.C. Frequency Schedule, is largely on the path to reducing duplication of services and providing families with comprehensive services. The Contents Table Welcome D.C. Public Schools (DCPS) and D.C. Public Charter Schools (DCPCS) need your help to make sure they have the information they need to meet the health needs of D.C. students. The DC Universal Health Certificate (UHC) is the primary way to inform a child's health in school and is the main document used by schools to document that a child has received all the services they need. All public schoolchildren in the district must submit a completed HIA each year as part of the enrolment. The most important way health care providers can help is by ensuring that they follow the D.C. Frequency Schedule and completing all areas on the NHS, including a health problem section that notes any specific health or developmental problems. Oral health assessments are also needed for each student, each year as part of enrollment, so please encourage families to make an appointment with the dentist if they haven't already! If caregivers need help finding a dentist, they can call the D.C. Line at 866-758-6807. If children have additional health needs that need to be addressed during school - medications, dietary restrictions, asthma, allergies - please help caregivers fill out appropriate medical forms to document these needs. Remember that school nurses cannot provide medication or any other invasive medical care without a doctor's order! Thank you for helping the district better meet the needs of our students!
