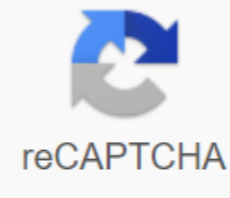

A classic beginner bug tries to use too many fingers to learn fingerstyle and fingerpicking. In this lesson we will use only the thumb, first finger and second finger. That's all. We can cover a lot of ground with just these three fingers. Here's an amazing video of guitarist Bert Jansch, who is a fingerstyle virtuoso: Your hand should be roughly above the sound hole, with your thumb pointing to the headpiece and fingers just below it above the strings. Where can I put my fingers on the guitar? Let's start with the fact that it's good to have a rule where we're going to place our fingers. Most of the time the thumb will mostly play thicker E, A and D strings. Your first finger and second finger will cover the thin lines of G, B and high E. What about the rest of my fingers? The fingers you have now left your third and fourth fingers. There are a few things you can do with them to help you with this classic technique. Anchor your fingers One method that many players use is anchor technique, this is where you use the body guitar as a platform to anchor your fingers. Place the third and 4th fingers on the body of the guitar and try it out. This can help with balance. This is a great technique as it will help you balance between the fingers you use on the strings and fingers you don't use! However your fingers can't stretch that far and it just feels too weird for some people, which is why so many guitarists just HOVER. Pointing your fingers if you have 3rd and 4th fingers doesn't reach more (or it feels too unstable), you can just hover over strings like this: Even if hanging your fingers can be harder to anchor than theirs, it can be helpful because it means that your 3rd and 4th fingers can be used to play extra strings. Ultimately, you have to find what is best and most comfortable for you so experiment with both of these positions and see what feels good. Fingerstyle Guitar Lessons - Exercise 1 Important, we get used to moving our fingers on the strings. In this first exercise we are going to go between the low E strings, strings and D strings using the thumb, first finger and second finger one by one. Notice how the tab has letters above the tab. All this means that the fingers you use. p'thumb i'first finger m'middle finger . This may seem very simple, but it is a fundamental exercise and a template choice for all aspects of fingerstyle guitar. Practice this pattern over and over again using different chord shapes and see how it sounds. Point of Action: Bounce back and forth between Em and G using this template. Fingerstyle guitar lessons #2 with a thumb are often neglected by guitarists, but this can be an incredibly useful tool for a guitarist. Using your thumb adds a softer texture to the guitar and can add a lot of dynamic range to your game. Before we start we'll choose a chord that we can use throughout all these guitar lessons. Let's go with the E-Major. Fabulous fingerpicking chords like this are great, bold and we can play all 6 lines. If you don't understand how to read chords, read our article. E chord should sound like this: . Fingerstyle Guitar Lessons - Using your thumb first, we're going to start with something beautiful and simple. All we're going to do is alternate between low line E and line A. It's really cool at getting your thumb moving through two lines and is a classic fingerstyle technique. Note: We only use the thumb here. . Fingerstyle Guitar Lessons - Using Your Thumb - Exercise 2 Now we're going to strum with our thumb. This can add a soft texture. All we're going to do here is just strum down and up using a thumbs-up side like this: The second exercise we'll look at is to add some bass notes to our strumming pattern. So this time, we're going to use our thumb to play E and strings separately. While between these notes, we're going to strum the chord. This should sound like this: . This is a classic fingerstyle technique used in thousands of folk and country songs. Continue reading on page 2: Page 1 Page 2 Page 2Fingerstyle Guitar Lessons - 5 Simple Ways to Sound Amazing Second Exercise We're Going to Do, has some strings flowing in it, it's a unique technique and can add cool chord textures. This finger selection style is great as it can often make your basic chords sound completely different! This time we're going to miss the middle line. The pattern of the line will go like this. E string: thumb, D string: first finger. Line: thumb, G string: first finger. D string: thumb, B string: first finger. G string: thumb, E string: first finger. Then to follow this model you just go back up the pattern: (remember, we're still just holding that E chord!) . Fingerstyle Guitar Lessons - Thumb and First Finger - Exercise 3 This exercise uses the first finger in different ways. We're actually going to use our first finger as a choice, while our thumb changes the bass notes. Again, this is another classic piece of fingerstyle technique. When we use our first finger, we're going to use our nail to strum the rest of the string. It works best with a downward strum to the floor. Our template will go like this: E strings: thumb, first finger: strum the top three lines. Line: thumb, first finger: strum the top three strings. It's a big step. Hold on. Be content to just play with your thumb and first finger for a while, adding a second finger as a bonus every now and then. Adding an extra finger adds all sorts of features and can create a lot of interesting models. We'll look at three different exercises to get finger picking chops up to scratch. Now we get into the pro-sounding fingerstyle technique. It's so great! It's often audible in acoustic music, mostly solo singers, as it adds an extra bass part. Our pattern will be like this. We will alternate our first and second finger between B and High Row E, while our thumb changes the bass note. Again, this often sounds popular and country music and sounds fantastic. It is also a great exercise to keep the first and second fingers heated. Our model looks like this. E string: thumb, B string: first finger, E string: second finger. Line: thumb, B string: first finger, E string: second finger. D string: thumb, B string: first finger, E string: second finger. . Fingerstyle Guitar Lessons - Thumb, First Finger and Second Finger - Exercise 3 Is the last exercise of a bit of a finger twister, so make sure you go slow when trying this! We're going to be finger-picking each line and going down each line as we go. So our model will be something like this. E string: thumb, D string: first finger and G string: second finger. Line: thumb, G string: first finger and B string: second finger. D row: Big B string: first finger and E string: second finger. Finger. . Fingerstyle Guitar Lessons #4 - Claw and Mute The last thing we'll look at is a technique that I think is often overlooked by many guitarists, however it is often used in all acoustic music. The claws use the thumb, first finger and second finger together to play a few chord notes at the same time. Where as dumb is used as a percussive technique to stop the chord altogether, it sounds useless on your own, but can create a unique texture combined with claws. Now we know that these techniques, let's get into some exercises that use them. Fingerstyle Guitar Lessons - Claw and Mute - Exercise 1 This first exercise will use our thumb, first finger and second finger, while we pluck every string at the same time. It is designed to create unique chord textures, as opposed to strumming the entire chord. With the help of certain fingers we can create sounds that would be difficult to create with the help of choice. For this we are going: Use our thumb on a low row E. Use our first finger on line G. Use our second finger on line B. Pinch all the strings at the same time! Here's the tab: It sounds like this: you don't have to use these specific lines either, you can experiment using different string combinations. Fingerstyle Guitar Lessons - Claw and Mute - Exercise 3 In this exercise we will specifically look at muffled strings after we've played them. First, strum your chord E. Place your hand on the strings after you have played the chord. You should be muffled with the lower palm of your hand. This will stop the sound of your strings almost instantly as well as creating a cool percussive sound to play the guitar. Although it is a simple technique, it is often used in fingerstyle play and helps cool and interesting sounds. The final exercise we're going to be watching is a combination of the two. This time we are going to add the rhythm of our game as well with this cool technique. With your hand of choice put yours: Thumb on low row E. First finger on line G. Second finger on line B. Pinch the strings at the same time! This time we're going to add a little rhythm to our chord as well as muting it after. Here's what it looks like on the tab.
