


## Sinnoh stone evolve guide

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With all Gen 4 cross-gene evolution debuted in GO, most cross-gene evolution in Gen 4 can be obtained with the help of Sinnoh Stone, an item that can be obtained in weekly scientific breakthroughs and as a PvP reward. This article examines the current best uses for Sinnoh Stone, with a heavy emphasis on PvE. We discuss the current and future competitions of these Pokemon, as well as exclusive steps to potentially hold out. Before we proceed, we would like to point out, with an additional emphasis, that it is better to save resources while absolutely necessary. If you develop Electabuzz today and Niantic surprises us with the return of Heatran as Raid boss a week later, you may wish you had Rhyperior instead. This is becoming increasingly important as Niantic continues to release exclusive time-limited moves. Several Sinnoh Stone Evolutions have now received exclusive moves, making it more important than ever to follow the advice of just developing what you need. These Pokemon may be the best options in your fighting party. Their performance makes them valuable additions to the lists of both established and new players. They face competition from other species, so your evolutionary priorities should reflect your current collection. For example, a player with multiple maxed grass types may find that they do not have to evolve in Roserade. If, instead, he lacks Groudon food, Rhyperior may be the best choice. The optimal use of Sinnoh Stone will always be the Pokemon you power and use. Mamoswin is one of the most powerful Pokemon from Sinnoh. It exists in a tier all its own. Given another ice and other terrestrial type of Pokemon both manages to crack the top tier, using Sinnoh Stone on Mamoswine is a powerful option to add to your raid lineup. This moving powder snow and avalanche probably represents the highest ice DPS game to ever see. Mamoswine's statistics are high enough that it is useful against types of grass, flight, earth and dragon. It's an obvious standout when doubly super effective (usually against the Dragons), but appears as the top counter against specific Groudon movesets, rivaling Kyogre. He trails a little behind the Moltres if the attack is grass types. Mamo's downside is his poor defensive type, giving him weaknesses that his colleagues don't have. Its use as a Rayquaza counter is unparalleled. While Ray may be one of the easier bosses to win, being the main spinner for one of the most useful legends in the game is enough just to put Mamoswine at the top of that list. Competitors: Kyogre, Moltres, Weavile, Glaceon, Dragons Mud Slap and Bulldoze While The draw with Mamoswine is an Ice moveset, having access to double ground STAB moves a big bonus. Mamoswine ranks behind Groudon in DPS but ahead of Rhyperior, another version of Sinnoh Stone. Again, Mamoswine's typing is getting The downside is here. The earth is effective against electric, poisonous, rock, steel and fire. Mamoswine is weak to 2 of those. It can really have a huge impact on the desire to use Mamoswine as a ground striker, but if you've maxed one for an ice striker, pay attention to what moveset you're struggling with. Mamo can be a great option. Competitors: Groudon, Garchomp, Rhyperior Looking Ahead with Mamoswine on Community Day aside, which is a non-factor. If you find Swinub you want to teach Ancient Power, save it at the end of the year at the Community Remembrance Day event. The only ice-type Pokemon that can give Mamoswine the problem is the ice type Gen 5 legendary, Kyurem. Its black and white versions in particular can be impressive enough to outpace Mamoswine despite not even having Ice moves. This time though typing Mamoswine may be an advantage here. It took a while, but we finally got the signature of the Rhyperior attack: Rock Wrecker. This titanic punch puts Rhyperior at the top of the Rock Type DPS chart, right under Rampardos, with a very good TDO to support this speed. The sheer force of this attack also has great utility in PvP as well, where it is basically a rock-like clone of Blast Burn, which is an attack known for its power. In short; If you are absolutely desperate and need a rock-type intruder now, save the rhydon for the next Community Day review because Rock Wrecker makes Rhyperior an excellent choice for your Sinnoh Stone! Competitors: Rampardos, Terrakion, Tyrannitar Mud Slap - Earthquake Ground Type is finally getting a makeover with the Gen 4 release. Previous attackers were Grudon and Rydon. Rhydon is still 93% as good as Rhyperior here, and both trail Groudon while remaining good budget options, better than the next best option, Donfan. Competitors: Groudon, Garchomp, Mamoswine Highest DPS Rock Type Attackers: Rhyperior's Performance as of February 2020 Rhyperior has seen its community day and it definitely stands as a winner in this regard. With high performance in both of its types, Rhyperior will probably stay where it stands now at least for a while; not an undisputed best choice, but a good choice nonetheless! This incredible evolution leads the charge among the electric attackers. Other than the fragile Deoxys, Electivire has the highest DPS against Pokemon weak to electric. It's weaker than Raikou, so it's not able to completely outsize another legendary version. The highest DPS Electric Attackers: Competitors: Raikou, Zapdos, Magnezone Looking Forward Don't count on an exclusive set of moves. Given that it already tops the charts, there is not much room to improve Electivire. It also has the shape of a baby (awkward for that was released in Gen 4 Hatchathon). The biggest drawback of the developing Electivire is its lack of utility in the legendary Level 5 raids. It's This. the best counters to Kyogre and Lugia, but no more. The evolution of other Pokemon may take precedence depending on the legendary rotation. Those who need an electric type of intruder should feel great about using their Sinnoh Stones on Electabuzz. Electivire should remain the best until Gen 5 brings a couple of electric legends, and that's not something to expect anytime soon. With Roserade getting the Grass Knot at 1/31/19, he climbed on his head and shoulders above his grass competition on the path of DPS. Previous 1-bar Solar Beam often disappointed trainers who found that Roserade would KO'd before being able to use the move. Grass is a useful attacking type, but there are many other good and available grass attackers, meaning Roserade may not be worth your Sinnoh Stone just for that purpose. Without the help of weather-boosting, grass intruders lag behind the best types of water against land and rock and for the best electric attackers against water type targets. For this reason, too, Electivire may be the best candidate. Grass types still remain second class attackers in Pokemon GO in general. The highest DPS Grass Type Pokemon: Competitors: Venusur, Sceptil, Breloom, Alolan Exeggutor, Tangrowth Poison Jab and Sludge Bomb Roserade also boasts the top DPS poison in GO. The poison has a smaller type of coating than grass, effective only against fairy and non-Poison herb types, but this dual role helps Roserade stand out. However, again, it needs improved weather to compete with Meteor Mash Metagrass or elite fire types in appropriate matchups. Competitors: Moltres, Entei, Flareon, Metagrass Looking Forward Roserade is a similar story with Electivire, making it an equally safe bet. There's a child-shaped and shiny has already been released in his mini event featuring an elevated shiny staks. With the exception of changes to Grass Knot or Frenzy Plant, Roserade performs just as well as Frenzy Plant Sceptile. As a venomous hitter, nothing threatens to place Roserade up to Gen 7, making it the least likely cross-gene evolution to become obsolete. Weavile currently has the highest dark type of DPS. As in grass/electric comparisons, the best dark attackers tend to fall behind the top ghosts, but both are boosted in fog. Thus, Dark's only advantage over Ghost comes from his defensive strengths against Psychic, Ghost and Dark Attacks, contributing to a higher TDO. Highest DPS Ghost Counters: TDO, where Tyrannitar really comes forward against Weavile. Dedicated players with armies powered by Giratina-O, Tyrannitar, and Gengar at the ready should reconsider the evolving Sneasel for dark specialization. Competitors: Giratina (Origin), Gengar, Tyrannitar, Mewtwo Ice Shard and Avalanche Weavile also Blessed with a powerful set of ice attacks. This dual utility promotes Weavile to be an excellent recipient of Sinnoh Stone. However, Mamoswine surpasses Weavile Weavile all aspects related to ice. Competitors: Mamoswine, Glaceon, Mewtwo Highest DPS Rayquaza Counters: Weavile has the most powerful ice and dark type of engines already, and will be a bit out of the left field as an exclusive move target. Anyway, if we ever see a repeat of the community days, Tyrannitar can use the momentum with Foul Play to put him back on top. Much of the pre-Gen 4 hype around Honchkrow was based on his training of Sky Attack, which is the best flying-charged move in Pokemon GO. It only happened 1/31/19. With Sky Attack, Honchkrow has the top tier of DPS against fight, grass and bug. It's still far behind Mewtwo and Moltres on the way to bulk, however. One of the main points against Honchkrow is that flying just doesn't have a good cover against legendary Pokemon, which often don't fight, grass, or bug type. Competitors: Moltres, Rayquaza, Mewtwo, Alakazam, Espeon Snarl and Dark Pulse Many of the same things can be said about Honchkrow that have been said for Weavile, although 'krow comes with less DPS and less bulk. Check the DPS table for Weavile. The Draw for Honchkrow is that it's much more common, but it doesn't help much when the Sinnoh Stones bottleneck. Competitors: Giratina (Origin), Gengar, Tyrannitar, Mewtwo, Weavile Looking Forward Murkrow received brilliant treatment on April Fools' Day 2018. Honchkrow doesn't have much room to improve its flying set, but it could potentially learn better about dark type moves. However, this probably won't close the gap between it and the myriad Dark and Ghost competitors. After receiving a wing attack, Moltres ousted Honchkrow from the position of bird boss. The flying competition is tough in future generations, including the trio of Gen 5 legends. These Pokemon will not lead any combat parties, but they are serviceable second string attackers. They may not even make your top 6. Competitors have less anxiety in developing Pokemon in this category because they are obviously surpassed. You either don't have a better choice or you use it out of personal preference. The final stop in the Line of Evolution of Togepi has an interesting claim to fame; mass and double resistance to combat attacks. This makes for a decent gym protector, although the latest stat nerfs typical of a normal-type gym wall leave the gym defense in a state of flux. A charm and dazzling brilliance finally with a fairy-like quick move, Togekiss finds himself as the second best fairy intruder. This gives Togekiss an interesting niche, although mostly surpassed By Gardevoir's PvE. In PvP content, Togekiss plays in all three leagues because of its input, stats and moveset. The note on PvP Togekiss is considered one of the best Pokemon in the Master League as writing this. This is best user Sharm, and a huge number of dragons in the tier means that Togekiss fills a huge huge Niche. Looking ahead While Togepi is a favorite of Pokemon, Community Day for it will deviate from the established precedent, given that it is a baby Pokemon with a brilliant version already released. It is unlikely that Togetic will appear in increased quantities and Togepi has never appeared in the wild. Togepi CD or Togetic raid day are both possible, but don't expect them. It seems like a travesty to list Tangrowth as a benchwarmer, despite his overall great, well-rounded stats, but there is too much grass competition. Every 6 months there is a new grass starter featured on Community Day, in addition to the established forms of Exeggutor and newcomers Breloom and Roserade. You could have a unique team of 6 best grass hitters, and Tangrowth wouldn't make the cut. Tangrowth has the highest TDO of all current grass hitters, which provides a cool niche. He can definitely survive Kyogre's Blizzard with HP to save, which would be great if Kyogre didn't just rotate out the legendary raids. Looking forward Tangrowth is one of the most likely Pokemon to get the treatment of Roserade, who later added a two-bar grass-charged move to his movepool. Its unimainable shape may learn how to herbal knot and Power Whip at some point. Either will benefit him, although he will still trail Venusaur in DPS. Yanmega debuts on par with Pinsir and Scizor as joint best bug hitters in GO. The problem is that they are the best of the dim crowd. Whatever mistakes can make, another type can do better. The only exception is when the error is doubly effective, for example, in the Shiftry raid. However, no legendary Pokemon to date is doubly weak for Bug. Looking ahead While the weaker type as a whole is stronger than the bugs expected in future generations, one of the most notable is Volcarona's Gen 5. Any improvement of Yanmega itself depends on fans of existing bug-type moves, which are already the best in the game. Magmortar, like Heatran, got a bad draw in the moveset lottery, hindering his viability as a fire contender. His best charged moves are Fire Punch and Fire Blast, both far inferior to overheating. Because it is strictly inferior to the ubiquitous Flareon, it cannot be high on Sinnoh Stone's priority list. Highest DPS Fire Intruders: While Magmortar lacks an established signature move for the promising Community Day, if it were given an overheating, it could provide the second-largest fire DPS behind the Moltres. This will serve it on par with Blast Burn Charizard, giving a reprieve to those who missed Community Day and lacked the resources for the legendary. While unlikely, it is not impossible for Niantic to release Magmortar overheating in a future moveset update. We already have a brilliant Magby, echoing many Gen 4 Pokemon with children's so Community Day seems unlikely. The problem with having blades for weapons is that Gallade can't dynamically kick (or counter, either). It's This. obstacles in the race for the fight DPS. Toxicroak, Lucario, and Heracross are all much better. Against the normal type of goals. Focus Blast Mewtwo also displays a higher DPS than Gallade. Confusion and Synchronoise Note: Must evolve during December Community Day or other similar events to get Synchronoise. Gallade's combat moves are so mediocre that Confusion and Synchronoise is a higher DPS moveset. But you could also use Alakazam or Espeon, which deal with higher DPS and have been around forever. Looking ahead there are many combat types of moves in Pokemon, only a small fraction of which are reflected in GO. Gallade definitely has a lot of potential for improvement, as his stats are pretty good. He just needs better moves. Gallade on Community Day came and went, gifting him just a decent psychic-type charged move. Mismagius is next in line for the Dark/Ghost Attackers. He sits behind Tyrannitar's DPS with a much lower TDO. It's a hard pass if you've already bought a matching hat, in which case Mismagius is a top tier Pokemon buddy. Looking ahead there's not much room for Mismagius to improve. He can't recognize Leake or Shadow Claw, and his attacking stats aren't that high. Even with these steps, it will reach the level of Sharpedo in DPS. These Pokemon don't have the crude power to make much progress like gym or raid attackers, but their more defensive distribution stat can borrow for use in PvP. The key word is use: we don't claim that these Pokemon will rock PvP meta. Gliscor benefits from a defensively oriented distribution stat, decent moves, and a unique typing with defensive utility. At a high level, this is viable in the Ultra League; It faces competition from Gligar in the Grand League, as both can minimax about 1500 CP. Lickilicky has a stat distribution and moves resembling Snorlax. His high energy-charged moves are a real drawback, however. You will run the sunbeam if you are going to use Lickilicky, otherwise it is just worse Snorlax. His CP max fits right into the Ultra League. In the Great League, Lickitung is strictly better. Exclusive move: The body slam for Lickitung Raid Day, and Lickitung and its evolution Sinnoh got the body slam as a time-limited exclusive move. While this step may be randomly returned, the nature of the event makes it difficult to plan. If you have a good Lickitung, you may want to consider holding on. With unique typing and access to some of the strongest moves in PvP, Froslass can overcome its suboptimal distributed statistics and 5 weaknesses. It's only really viable in the Great League, though. These Pokemon are largely useless without serving any meaningful function in attackers, defenders or PvP combatants. Porygon-I have great basic stats but suffers from its movepool. A normal type Pokemon can't get STAB and their attacks will be super effective, which already puts it back, even with its incredibly high attack. As a defender, this is another ball for the ubiquitous Machop. Looking ahead porygon is a former 10km Pokemon egg that seems to have been missed as a Community Day target. Without the brilliant version released, it would be a very reasonable Pokemon feature. Porygon also has a notable signature move in Tri Attack. A normal-type fast move, on the other hand, can make Porygon-Z in partly cloudy weather, comparable to Metagrass as generalized, although the efficiency of the type (1.6x) is more powerful than STAB (1.2x). With only 180 Attack, this one-eyed ghost unfortunately doesn't have much going on for it. One would expect Dusknoir to be good at PvP given his defensive distribution statistics, but his moves don't do it justice. In the Great League, Dusclops is the best choice. Looking ahead, as mentioned above, Dusknoir stats are tailor for PvP. Since the format is in its infancy, there is high potential for tweaks and balances in the future to improve The Prospects of Dusknoir out there. Pokemon may have flaws; that's what makes them unique. Being a normal type, having bad statistics, and not having any PvP utility, Ambipom can be considered the most unique of cross-generation evolutions.
