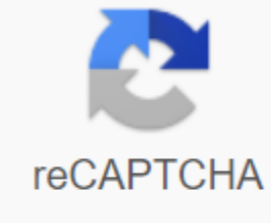

In 2018, he was awarded the National Blue Ribbon of the United States Department of Education. Our neighborhood public school encourages rigorous academics and conscientious students in a committed, diverse, environmentally conscious community. With the surrounding city as our extended classroom, teaching and learning in Greenfield makes the most of Philadelphia's vibrant culture and rich history. In the late 1940s and early 1950s, there were very few public schools serving families in Center City. Many children attended private school or were taken to schools outside Center City. In September 1954, parents and the Center City Residents Association (CCRA) pressured the Board of Education to open an elementary school in Center City West. City Center School, which was the original name, resided at the YWCA on Chestnut Street 2027. According to the CCRA, there were seven teachers and 153 children aged six to 12 when the school opened. In six years, there were 250 students and the YWCA space was becoming less affluent with the growing population. Again, parents and the community demanded better ease to support the growing needs of students/teachers. After a year of community meetings and appearances before the Board of Education, the Board bought the old Electronic Building 23rd and Chestnut streets in 1960. The idea was to use the building as a temporary school with the intention of building a new school in the near future. In 1963, parents and the community decided it was time to build a new building, so in 1964 the Board of Education bought all the properties the blog that is now Greenfield. By this point the student population had grown to 375. The construction process of the new building began in 1966 and doors were opened in September 1970, with an inscription of 780 children. The beautiful Albert M. Greenfield School that turned out is a tribute to years of cooperation between CCRA, parents and a number of hard-working officers from the City Center Home and School Association. It is also a tribute to the Board of Education, which in its wisdom understood that a qualified public school was crucial to the revival that takes place in Center City. – CCRA News June 1997 Mrs. Albert M. Greenfield officiated the cornerstone ceremonies for the elementary school named in memory of her late husband. Albert M. Greenfield was a prominent Philadelphia-based businessman who became influential in politics and philanthropy. His influence earned him the nickname Mr. Philadelphia. Greenfield died in January 1967 and the Philadelphia School District honored his legacy of public service in Philadelphia by appointing our school after him. The Greening Greenfield project was a three-phase initiative that transformed the building and school grounds from a mixed-use asphalt playground to a self-sustaining green space. The project was part of efforts by the Philadelphia Department of Water to solve the overflow problem caused by rainwater running through the city's paved streets creating havoc in the city's underground systems. Completed in 2010, Greening Greenfield helped win our national recognition of the school as a Green Ribbon School and Greening Greenfield remains a fundamental value of the school, its students and the community. The Greenfield School catchment is from the south side of Ben Franklin Avenue to the north side of Bainbridge Street, and from the west side of Broad Street to the Schuylkill River. When registering, you must bring your child's original birth certificate, vaccination records, your own government-issued photo document and your original gas or electricity bill since last month as proof of residence. Water or mobile phone bills are not accepted as proof of residence. (In the case of registration documents in the Kindergarten, it must be shown that your child will be 5 years old on or before 1 September the year of registration.) Guidance has been made to the nursery for 2019-2020. Guidance for the 2020-2021 school year will be announced at a later date.
