Photo: Marty Lederhandler (AP) If you've ever wanted to experience a symphony but couldn't - concerts are too expensive, you have kids who can't sit long stretches, tickets are hard to snag - that's your chance. Go to an open rehearsal. It's a little-known secret that orchestras - even some of the most prestigious in the world - hold rehearsals that are open to the public and often free or affordable. They tend to be pretty random, too. Each program has its own rules, but participants are often allowed to come and go as they want (great for those with wiggly children) and even interact with conductors and artists in intimate au. If you are a fan of classical music, rehearsals are an incredible opportunity to see how the orchestra improves its performance by replaying passages or drilling certain movements. And if you're a beginner, they're a cool way to get a taste of the gig without paying the full price. Here's not a complete list of open rehearsals for orchestras across the country. Hiroyuki Ito/Hulton Archive/Getty Images If you've never heard of Mahler's Symphony No. 9, grab a blanket, sit by the fire, and melt in the lush orchestration of Mahler so masterfully crafted. Mahler wrote this symphony, knowing that the end of his life is near. Some believe that the fourth movement represents five psychological stages of death: denial and isolation, anger, bargaining, depression and acceptance. Mahler certainly fits the romantic style to t; heartbreaking tension followed by all so sweet determination. One of Haydn's lesser-known works, this impeccable work of the classical period is perfectly balanced with emotion and art. The first melodies of movement float over rivers of low tones. The optimistic rhythms of the second movement necessarily make you dance; It's any pop music of any Haydn lover. The third movement menuetto brings images of court balls and high tea. The final movement skillfully brings the closing of the symphony and sends the audience home happy and satisfied. Although a little outplayed, it is good should not be excluded. Everyone knows the first movement when they hear it, as for the next movements, it's a different story. The second movement is not as heavy as the first makes it a great relief without losing its harmonious brilliance. The third movement includes similar rhythmic patterns as the first, which creates continuity. The triumphal orchestration in the fourth movement completes the symphony with an absolute victory. Also a lesser-known work, this Mozart symphony combines classical form with Mozart's vivid expressions. The first movement, though expressive, retains lightness in sound. Orchestration in the second movement gives its pastoral sound. The third movement begins with a unison melody that stays throughout its fullness. The finale gives you the feeling that you rushed... only in a good way. This symphony should have for those who love Mozart. Samuel Barber, an American composer of the 20th century, wrote this symphony in 1936. His orchestration is similar to Mahler's 9th, and its intricate chords and layered instruments give chills down the spine. This symphony is a great addition to any symphonic collection. Haydn skillfully creates another thoroughly enjoyable symphony, Symphony. It comes from the original German nickname Paukenschlag, which means bass drum beat. The soft melodies of the first movement and the lifting harmonies may have put you to sleep. Haydn, knowing this, created a simple melody, followed by a great impact in the second movement to wake up those who fell asleep. The third and fourth movements provide a delightful ending to this classical symphony. Dvorak created this symphony in 1893. It's hard to believe something that could sound this modern for over 100 years. Dvorak composed a symphony in the spirit of folklore of African-Americans and American Indians after coming to America. He achieved the greatest success at the world premiere of this symphony with the New York Philharmonic on American soil. Ives wrote this symphony after being influenced by Dvorak Symphony No. 9 (mvmt. 2), Beethoven Symphony No. 9 (mvmt. 3), Schubert's Unfinished Symphony (mvmt. 1), and Tchaikovsky Pathetics (mvmt. 4). He clearly had good taste! It is interesting to see how one person can interpret all these symphonies and put them into their own words. This symphony is a must for any collection. Brahms was heavily influenced by Beethoven. This symphony, although not widely successful, was the most significant after Schumann. It follows the normal four-movement structure as most symphonies do. His wealth in orchestration lies between Beethoven and Mahler. In the first movement, Brahms presents three different motifs simultaneously as the main theme. The fourth movement has a taste of the final movement in Beethoven's 9th Symphony. Last but not least, Beethoven's Ninth Symphony. Perhaps Beethoven's greatest work, almost everyone knows Oda's chorus to the delight of the final movement. Beethoven took the symphony to the next level, adding the choir to the orchestration. The text in the final movement was from Died Freud Schiller. Any symphony library will not be completed until the symphony is recorded. Its wide range of dynamics and orchestration provides hours of fun.
