Opening Photoshop or GIMP just to crop the image is silly. These powerful tools are great, but sometimes you just need a simple program. Here's how to make some of the most common edits with simple, free, online tools. When we asked our readers about their favorite alternative to Photoshop, GIMP was the overwhelming winner. However, it's also a great, clumsy app, if all you need is a quick crop or a light color adjustment. Instead of choosing the best overall photo editing app, we're going to go on to some of the most common photo editing tasks, and choose the best free tool for each one, so if there's a simple task you have to do every day, you don't need to wait for the GIMP to download to pull it out. All the editors represented here work in a web browser, so you can use them on any platform. Adobe Photoshop is a market leader when it comes to retouching photos, image editing, or even... MoreCropping: Fotor Crop photo can be as simple as removing something on the edge of the frame, or as specific as matching the image to the exact resolution. Fotor offers some of the most reliable pruning tools you'll find in the free app. You can trim the freeform, scale down the original dimensions, or install your own solution. It even comes with some built-in presets for sizes such as Facebook cover photos. To crop photos, follow these steps: Open Fotor.Click Change Photo. Choose the photo you want to crop. (If you block plugins, you may need to allow Fotor, otherwise it will hang when downloading.) Choose Crop from the left menu. Select the limit from the drop out of the menu. You can also set specific sizes in the boxes below. Choose Keep the proportions to make sure the box stays the same shape as you adjust the crop field. In the main window, adjust the handles on the crop box until it contains only a portion of the image you want to save. Click Apply.Click floppy disk icon to save the image on the disc. Pruning isn't a challenge, but if you need accurate tools, your average image editor can't impress you. In my testing, Fotor had the best tools for any situation with the least amount of friction. It also has basic turning and flip features that are handy if you need it. At the bottom, you can use Resize to adjust the size of the image without trimming it. Color correction: Pixlr Editor Sometimes the light didn't hit your photo just right, in which case a little adjustment can make it much better. The Pixlr editor has some of the most powerful, almost Photoshop-level tools to customize the image. While most editors have basic brightness, contrast or shade meters, Pixlr can go much more in-depth than most applications without charging money. To edit your photo with Pixlr, open the app here. You will be asked to open a file that you want to edit from your computer or URL. Once you open it, you can find several options under Menu. Here are some of them and how they work: Levels: Chances are good that you are familiar with brightness and contrast. Levels can really help you complete both tasks in one filter. When you select the levels, you'll see a histogram of colors in the image. The three handles along the bottom represent black, white and grey levels. By dragging these sliders, you can customize how deep your black is and how bright your white is. Typically, if you drag black and white sliders to the edge of the histogram curve (as opposed to empty flat space), you'll fix a lot of color balance problems. Check out this album for an example of how this adjustment works. Curves: Curves is one of the best color correction tools at your disposal. It's a complex tool and we can't go through it in one paragraph, but Digital Camera World has an excellent guide here. Unfortunately, it can't be used as a layer of adjustment, as in Photoshop, but it's still powerful in itself. Shade and saturation: Of all the filters on this list, these are the ones you're most likely to find in other apps, but it's nice to have them here too. This adjustment can make your colors brighter, adjust them to different shades, or bring lightness up and down. There are about a dozen other adjustments you can play around with. many of them can be used to perform the same task differently, but it's worth trying them all out. The interface can be intimidating, but they are pretty simple once you start playing with them. Layer: Pixlr Editor Another of the most useful features of Photoshop is the layers. Photoshop layers work just like attendee animations. You can work to change one layer without affecting any of the others and move them yourself. Fortunately, Photoshop isn't the only app that has this feature: the previously mentioned Pixlr editor has an excellent support layer. To use it: Open the image in Pixlr.Along the bottom of the layer box on the right side, click New. This will create a new transparent layer. Draw in a new area. You can also copy the selections from other images and insert them into your document. New layers for shuffled elections will be created automatically. Tap the slider icon in the bottom left corner of the Layers menu to include opacity and transmission options. You can adjust the transparency to make the layers partially end-to-end, and transfer modes to get unique effects. Of course, just having layers doesn't necessarily mean you can do so much with them. The Pixlr selection tools leave much to be desired, so it can be a little harder to take pictures of birds with guns than it would in Photoshop. Again, it's also a lot cheaper. Text and titles: Fotor Internet has turned words on text into something of a form Actually getting the text in the image is a little more difficult. Fotor is one of the best apps in this case, since it he View the fonts you choose when scrolling. To add text to the images, follow these instructions: Open the image in Fotor.Select text icon on the left sidebar. Choose a font from a list that slips. The name of the font can be seen in the font style itself. Click Add text to create a resizable text box. Enter the text in the box. In the field that appears on the right side of the image, you can change settings such as alignment, boldness and one, transparency, and intervals. Fotor can pull fonts installed on your own machine or Fotor collection of installed fonts. You can save some fonts for favorites, although you need to register an account to do so. One drawback is that Fotor doesn't seem to be able to add layer style, so you're limited in how you can make the text stand out. While Photoshop is the king of image editors for many good reasons, it's not without its flaws. For example, it is only available as a subscription service, and it has decades of outdated support and bloat features. You may even consider its versatility and a wide range of downside options if you only need to complete a simple task. For these and other reasons, you might be better off using something different, at least in specific situations. When the price of all that matters, I firmly believe that Photoshop-like part of Adobe's \$9.99/month bundle with Lightroom is more than worth the money, but not everyone feels the same. If you don't use Lightroom to sort and organize photos, then Photoshop is definitely more of a financial commitment. When other apps do the best job you can do almost everything in Photoshop, but you can't necessarily make it perfect or easy. You can, for example, do things like HDR editing and focusing styling, but Photoshop tools lag behind hyper-specialized applications such as AuroraHDR and Helicon Focus. If you want to do things manually, you can probably recreate the same results with Photoshop, but it's not the same. Similarly, the Control-Points feature in the Nik collection simplifies local adjustments than any tool in Photoshop. You can recreate the effect by combining some of the target mask functions, but you can't do it with a single click. Photoshop is the best general purpose image editor out there, but there are many situations where it's not the best specific image editor.
