Content Crossword puzzles are a bit like cobwebs; each answer is connected to the others nearby to form a woven network of letters. Pulling one string of letters affects all others, too. Most crossword puzzles are naturally divided into different groups of up and down clues, connected to the other groups by longer answers. With that in mind, working through the puzzle is a cluster of columns at once -- as opposed to going through all the clues at once, followed by all the clues down -- a good strategy. Every word you fill in will help solve the others around it. Ad Occasionally will draw crossword puzzles for their answers on other languages. But how should you know if the answer is in English or something else? You're going to have to rely on the clue to tell you. If the wording of the designation refers to a specific city or country, or if part of the clue is in a foreign language, that's a pretty surefire indicator that your answer should be in the same language [source: Sayles]. Few crossword enthusiasts are actually fluent in languages usually found in the clues, but a basic knowledge of articles, verbs and personal titles in some of the more common languages will go a long way. French, Spanish, German and Latin are especially popular with puzzles. Ad A popular strategy for taking tests is to go through all the questions and skip the questions you don't know. And even though they're not multiple-choice, you do the same with crossword puzzles - thankfully, without being judged on. End. Don't spend too much time tearing your hair out over a clue you just don't crack. Go to the easy one, because that strategy comes with a bonus: filling out the answers you know will be letters for those you don't. That That the possibilities are considerable, especially for indications where more than one answer might apply. Ad Are you stuck with a half-finished puzzle and a spinning head? Don't let it stress you out -- crossword puzzles are meant to be challenging, but they're also supposed to be fun. It's fine to just walk away for a while. Unless you're participating in the American Crossword Puzzle Tournament, there's no time limit, so don't go crazy trying to finish the puzzle on your lunch break. Sometimes the best thing you do is to take a break and clear your mind. Come back to it later, and you might be surprised at what's jumping out on you. Ad It happens to all of us. If you stare at a word long enough, it suddenly looks wrong -- even if it's a word you've been spelling correctly since high school. So it wouldn't be too strange to discover a spelling error between your answers, would it? Putting an E for one I can instead of the other way around can throw out the other clues in that particular part of the puzzle. There will also be times when answers originally come from a language such as Arabic or Russian, whose alphabets are completely different from the Latin alphabet most Western countries use. As a result, there are often a number of accepted spellings for these translated words. In those cases, the designation will usually be a parenthetical var. to indicate that there is more than one established way to spell the word in question. Ad Is there a puzzle clue giving you extra trouble? Does it have a question mark at the end? In the world of crossword puzzles, a clue with a question mark means that certain clue calls for a second look. Usually that bit of punctuation is an indication that the clue itself is a pun, as opposed to a simple question that demands an answer or a fill-in-the-blank [source: Sayles]. So, the most obvious answer is probably not the right one. Think about all possible meanings of the designation; you always ruminate on it as you go to other parts of the puzzle. Ad Many crossword puzzles have a title that gives insight into the theme of the puzzle. And, whether the puzzle has a title, it will almost always be a theme. Throughout the puzzle, the author will spread answers that bind back into the theme. These answers will usually be longer and contain more than one word. Often the clues will be a play on the theme, so the connection may not be immediately clear. Still, keeping the theme or title in mind as you go through the clues may have some insight to lead you in the right direction. Ad Let's call a spade a spade. But does that mean we call the spade a shovel? Or a pack of cards? Some words have not just one or two meanings, but some. If part of the puzzle doesn't come together, and one of the clues might have then an answer, try them all out. In particular, looking for words with multiple meanings in the question mark clues mentioned earlier. Puzzle composers and editors are a sneaky bunch; they will use multiple meanings to throw so-called solvers off the scent. Thinking outside the box, both literally and figuratively, will help you finish the job. Ad Are you waffling between more than one possible answer, or maybe just taking a stab in the dark? There will always be times when you think you know what the answer is, but you are not 100 percent sure. You take a chance and write in your guess, don't you? If the answer in question intersects with yet another maybe-it-is-maybe-it-no clue, save it for the time being. Writing wrong answers can lead you astray, especially if you're one of the brave souls who'd rather put the puzzle in the pen. Instead, rely on the answers you know are right to lead you back to safe territory. Ad It is absolutely no shame to rely on a reference book. Some of the main advantages of crossword puzzles are expanding your own knowledge and vocabulary. If you've solved all the clues in one cluster, but one of the resulting answers isn't a term you're familiar with, get your trusty Oxford English Dictionary off the shelf. You will either discover that the word is correct and add something new to your phraseology, or you will discover that some of your answers down need reconsideration. Other reference books, such as a synonym list or encyclopedia, are equally useful. After all, if you knew every crossword without trying, it wouldn't be so much fun -- and you wouldn't have a new clump of trivia to tape about at cocktail parties. Check directions that call for answers ending in S, ED, EST, or ING. Often these endings can be pocketed (but not always). Checking the crossers of these answers can help verify that the end applies. For example, if both the over and down clue is plural for two answers that cross on the last letter, chances are the letter is 'S'. Strange words will be marked directly, Friend: Fr. = AMI or indirectly, Friend, in France. Abbreviated answers are indicated directly, Whistlestop (Abbr.) = STA or indirectly with a shortened word as part of the clue, RR stop = STA. These cluing conventions are the accepted norm for American style puzzles. Do you know the names of the elements of their symbols?.
