[5] The seat and vice chairman of the Board of Governors are appointed by the President of the Sitting Governors. They both serve a four-year term and they can be elected as many times as president, until their terms on the Board of Governors expire. [1] All seven board members of the Federal Reserve Governors and five Fed Chairs direct open market operations that determine U.S. monetary policy through their membership of the Federal Open Market Committee (FOMC).
