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Eight years ago, the arrival of Iron Man in cinemas kick-start as Marvel Studios' cinematic universe and four years of heated debate over the likelihood of Marvel - or any studio, for that matter - shooting the kind of ambitious, interconnected movie studio plan envisioned for their films. In the years that followed (and movies) not only proved skeptics wrong, but also managed to change the conversation around their films. These days, it's no longer a question of whether Marvel can pull it off, but how long the studio can keep their wildly successful franchise rolling along. If there's an answer to be found in Captain America: Civil War, the last film in the studio's cinematic universe and the 13th film in general, it's that Marvel's train movie shows no signs of slowing down anytime soon. Civil War is an ensemble piece, chock-full of almost every costumed character introduced in the studio universe. Written by Christopher Marcus and Stephen McPhee and directed by brothers Joe and Anthony Russo (the same team responsible for 2014's Captain America: The Winter Soldier), Captain America: Civil War has Marvel superheroes dealing with the fallout from their actions throughout all previous films and face the deadly losses that their super-powered battles take on the innocent people around them. The Avengers soon find their loyalty broken when the world demands that the team respond to government agencies, and the gap becomes even bigger when a terrorist attack involves an old friend of Captain America, James Bucky Barnes - a former assassin known as the Winter Soldier. It almost seems like a disingenuous frame of the Civil War as part of America's captain's solo franchise. More than any of the previous films in Marvel's film-verse, the Civil War ensemble piece, jam-packed with almost every costumed character introduced in the studio universe so far (except Thor Chris Hemsworth and Mark Ruffalo the Hulk) and masterfully balancing their screen time so no one feels neglected. Of course, the philosophical war at the heart of the Civil War is primarily fought between Chris Evans' soldier-turned-superhero, Steve Rogers (a.a.a.s) and Robert Downey Jr.'s playboy industrialist, Tony Stark (Iron Man), but almost everyone seems to have their own, unique view of what's at stake and the best way to handle it. To his credit, there's actually a surprising amount of depth in support of Civil War characters, and what could easily have been a movie in which characters get smashed together under weak claims (a la Batman v. Superman: Dawn of Justice) ends up being surprisingly nuanced presenting some complex views on personal responsibility, collateral damage, and between freedom and security. Both Evans and Downey articulate their positions well - perhaps even better than their characters did in the Civil War comic book series that inspired the film - and most supporting characters who ally themselves with one character or the other offer some compelling case for doing so. That's not to say that not many crushing symbols together can be found in the Civil War, however. There's a lot of that too. Each of the major team-up movies in the Marvel cinematic universe has so far raised the bar when it comes to ensemble action sequences, from the novelty of seeing them interact in the Avengers to the impressive coordination of their efforts in films such as Winter Soldier and last year's Avengers: Age of Ultron. The same goes for The Civil War, which boasts some of the best, visually thrilling chases and fight sequences of any Marvel film produced so far. Where Age of Ultron upped the ante when it came to the scale of ensemble sequences and how much co-operative choreography he asked for his characters, Civil War takes things to the next level, drawing on scenes in which characters fight each other rather than hordes of digitally crafted robot villains. Given the strength of the characters, these battles unfold in the air and on the ground (and sometimes on a miniature level), often moving between both environments on the fly (pun intended) and moving certain match-ups from the background to the foreground as characters compromise opponents. The rookie franchise is more than living up to cheating. The end result is a wildly entertaining celebration of both hyper-detailed battle choreography and the creative team's deep understanding of the characters and the unique ways each character moves and acts. Among the returning actors for the film are the aforementioned Evans and Downey, as well as most of the cast from both Age of Ultron and Winter Soldier. Paul Rudd's Ant-Man character, Scott Lang, is also thrown into the mix. While it's all well and good (and Rudd is particularly good at the role he plays), it's the newcomers to the franchise who have been generating the lion's share of the noise leading up to the film's release - and they're more than live up to the hype. In his debut as the new Spider-Man, actor Tom Holland hits all the right notes, and plays with Downey and the rest of the cast well. Tonally, he captures the best parts of former Spider-Man actor Andrew Garfield's under-appreciated portrayal of the character, offering endless commentary on everything that happens around him and bringing the light-hearted tone of the scene he appears in. should leave fans feeling good about their future at Marvel. There's also a lot like about 42 actor Chadwick Boseman's introduction as Black Panther, a popular African superhero, during the Civil War. While the film's title suggests it's a Captain America movie, Black Panther Bowsman and Scarlett Johansson spy superhero Natasha Romanoff (also known as Black Widow), it seems to be positioned as the moral center of the narrative. Both Johansson and Boseman do a good job of conveying the uncertainty of their respective characters about the cases of transpiring around them and opposing, tough positions taken by the leader of each side. It's an interesting - and clever - juxtaposition, with the Black Panthers offering an outsider's point of view, while Black Widow is too deeply ingrained to fully commit on both sides. It's a difference that both actors seem to be well-informed in their performances, and adds another layer to the story told in the film. As the first installment in the Phase Three cinematic Marvel universe, Captain America: Civil War does an excellent job of creating a new status quo for the Avengers and the world in which they inhabit, and leaves the audience thirsty more without relying on the cliffhanger. It's not just a feat, and the film succeeds where so many other projects envisioned as chapters in a larger, over-archived story have fallen short. At a time when the failures of Batman v. Superman seem to have opened the door once again to discuss superhero fatigue, Captain America: Civil War offers a strong argument that the best is yet to come in the superhero movie genre.
