If you don't want it quite that ever-present then you can instead simply install it to start listening the second you run the app. so you don't have to push any additional buttons. And more recently, 'Pop-Up Shazam' has been added, which allows you to identify music when using other apps without having to go back to the main Shazam app. Shazam can now identify music that plays through headphones on your phone, and can even go beyond music, using visual recognition to identify posters, books and more. There's also wear OS support, and once you've identified a track you can access it on Spotify or Apple Music with a link to Shazam. (image credit: Spotify) Spotify StationsSpotify Stations is a more orderly alternative to Spotify's main app, but before we get ahead of ourselves, it's worth noting that at the time of writing this is only for those in the US or Australia (although we imagine that it will be launched more widely over time). With this caveat out of the way - Spotify stations allow you to listen to playlists (or stations) rather than select specific songs or albums. These stations can focus on genre, mood or activity. For example, you can get a Relaxing Jazz Station, or Workout One. You can also create stations based on the choice of musicians you like. But basically Spotify stations seem to aim at getting you to listen faster, without any typing or searching, and help you discover new music, something that it gets better over time as it learns what kind of things you like. Many of these things are in the main Spotify app too, but here it's front and center, without any distractions. You need a Spotify account to use the stations, but you don't need to be a paid member. However, if you are, you will be able to skip an unlimited number of tracks, and do not have to put up with advertising. SwootSwoot aims to make podcasts social by sharing what you listen to with friends who also use the app. This is primarily helpful to help you find new podcasts to listen to, especially since there is also a recommendation feature that allows you to actively recommend a podcast to friends in the app (optional add text to explain why you recommend it). Swoot also has the 'Trending' tab, so you can see what's popular with people who aren't on your friends list, and for all that it's a basic but competent podcast player, subscribe to podcasts, download episodes so you can listen offline, and change the speed of playback. else. Entries are stored automatically, named depending on the time of day, and based on the location tag. Clicking on the record then plays it back. Simple. You can also customize the quality of the recording, pause the recording and continue the same recording later, crop the record or edit the unimportant parts, and share records with people or apps as a web link, so there is no need for others to have the app or download a file to listen to your notes. You can also change the names of your entries and add bookmarks to important points in them, so you can easily find the key parts later. These bookmarks can have an attached note. Also, you can back time recording in the cloud so that they never get lost. There's a lot here, but most of it stays on the sidelines, so if you want to stick to the basics you won't find endless buttons and switches invading the experience. The Sound Amplifier amplifier is a Google app designed to improve sound when using headphones. Well, we're talking the app, but it won't appear in the app drawer, and you can't run it as such. Instead, you'll find it in the Accessibility of the phone's basic screen settings, and only when you plug in wired headphones. Once there, you can reduce unwanted sounds, adjust the volume of the microphone and zoom in or fine with the sound on one or both sides of the headphones. The main purpose of the app is to make the sound clearer by increasing quiet sounds without excessively enhancing loud sounds, and reducing background noise so that you can better focus on the audio. It did a pretty good job in our tests, but there is one serious problem, namely the need for wired headphones. This of course is a problem for those who prefer to go wireless, and even more problems on the ever-growing number of phones that don't have 3.5mm port headphones. The app also seems as if it can really benefit those who have hearing problems, but many such people use wireless hearing aids that will not be compatible with it. Hopefully Google will drop the need for wires before too long. DeezerRadio's Radio Deezer is a slick if bit of a mainstream radio player app, and while it comes from Deezer (the company is known primarily for its Spotify-like subscription service) it's free to use. The app has about 30,000 FM and online radio stations are sorted into different categories such as pop and rock. So you can view them that way, or look for a specific station. Stations that you've recently played or play most often will be added to my station tab, although there's no way to manually add stations to your favorites in a strange omission. You can, however, favorite songs that play, but if you have a Deezer subscription it will just show you a list of them, rather than actually letting you listen to them again. It's an app that needs work, but it looks good, easy to navigate and makes for a great companion to Deezer's core service. BBC SoundsBBC Sounds brings all THE BBC live radio content and podcasts into one app, so you can listen live on your phone and subscribe to and stream podcasts. BBC Sounds also lets you pick up where you left off on another device, so if you get halfway through the podcast on your phone, you'll be able to start this point on the tablet automatically. It can also recommend content based on what you've been listening to, so it's a good way to discover new things. It's basically an iPlayer for radio (actually a plan to make it replace BBC iPlayer Radio), and if you listen to a lot of BBC content it's arguably a smarter choice than listening on the radio or using another podcast app. At the moment the BBC Sounds app is uk only, but given that the iPlayer Radio app is available worldwide, we don't snook if BBC Sounds is one day too.SW True-Fi BetaSW True-Fi Beta aims to maximize the potential of your headphones by customizing the sound settings typical of the headphones you've connected. You do this by choosing yours from a long list of supported headphones, then True-Fi does the rest. But you can also adjust the sound according to your age and make manual settings for aspects of it such as bass. Adjustments only work when playing music through the SW True-Fi Beta app, but this shouldn't be a problem, since it not only can play local music files, it can also connect to Spotify and play music from there. Not all headphones are currently supported, which is the main limitation of the app, but if you don't, then you can contact the company to ask them to be added. Phonograph Music Player While many of us have switched to streaming music, there is still room for locally stored music on Android, and The Phonograph is one of the best players. The phonograph puts aesthetics and ease of use first, so it's always a pleasure to work with. The app has a material design look that fits into Google's Android vision, but it's also packed with a full album of art and color, so it's never a boring screen. You can also customize the colors and overall theme and appearance of the app, while the color of the main screen 'now plays' will change depending on the album art of the current track. The layout is also simple, with your music library sorted by song, album, artist or playlist, and you can switch between views using a napkin, while most other options are nothing more than tap away. While not as much as some players, Phonograph has a number of handy extras and switches like gapless playback, information and images pulled automatically from Last.fm, timer sleep, widgets and lock control screen.
