

The best job search sites overall in this first list, we present top job search sites for all types of job seekers and industries, so no matter what job you're looking for, you'll probably find something at least one of these sites! LinkedIn LinkedIn is one of the most popular professional job search networks out there. With over 645 million users from more than 200 countries, LinkedIn offers many opportunities to connect with people in your industry and find work locally, nationally and even globally. LinkedIn is currently advertising 20 million jobs, so there is definitely something to apply for! A quick review. The Biggest Pro and Con Biggest Pro: You Can't Beat reach What LinkedIn provides in terms of jobs and networks. With millions of users and vacancies, you're sure to find something that matches what you want (or at least someone who can connect you to a position). Biggest Con: Jobs often get so many applicants that it can be hard to get noticed. If you find a popular position to apply, be prepared for competition. Also, while the main account is free, LinkedIn Premium Account, which offers far more benefits and resources for job seekers, costs money. How to use this job search site Creating a LinkedIn account is both simple and free. If you have one set, you can write your profile (which is similar to your resume), upload a shot to the head or another picture, and add links to any portfolios, articles, websites that you have worked on, etc. To find a job, click on the Jobs link at the top of the homepage; there you can look for work by location or keywords. You will also get the recommended jobs on this page based on your previous job searches and what you have done as your career interests. Descriptions of vacancies on LinkedIn are usually quite detailed, with information about everyday qualifications, type of work, seniority level (i.e. entry level, middle level or senior level), and even how your assigned skills in your LinkedIn profile match the skills required by the job. You can also use LinkedIn's payroll tool to get an idea of what kind of salary you are (and should) do for the jobs and industries that you are interested in. Glassdoor Glassdoor is another popular job search site, with 12 million job listings, 1 million employers, and 67 million unique visitors each month. The site was based on the concept of increasing transparency in the workplace by aggregating wages and reviews of real jobs and businesses. Fast review: Biggest Pro and Con Biggest Pro: Glassdoor offers detailed information about companies that follow up on reviews from current and previous employees-feature that is especially useful for those who want a clear idea of what to expect when working for a particular company. Biggest Con: Emails can start getting spam quickly from Glassdoor, but you can easily fix the problem by turning them off in your account settings. The site also lacks a more advanced search function. How to use this job search site You can create a free profile on Glassdoor that summarizes your work history, skills, specialization, education and other relevant information that you would like to see potential employers. You can then search for work by name, company, keyword, and/or location using the search bar; You can also save jobs and apply for them later. To apply, click Apply Now on The Job, which will take you to the app page on that company's website. Jobs with the Easy To Apply button allow you to apply with either your Glassdoor profile or your email and resume. The job descriptions are usually comprehensive, with detailed information on responsibilities, qualifications, wages, benefits, type of work, and required years of experience. Really another eminent job search site really. Founded in 2004, Indeed offers job seekers a easy-to-navigate search engine that can be used to find work in the U.S. and dozens of other countries. Really gets over 250 million unique visitors every month - that's more than three times what Glassdoor gets! - and aggregates millions of job posts from a wide range of online job bulletin boards and company websites. A quick review: The Largest Pro and Con Biggest Pro: Indeed, is one of the most successful job search sites in regards to the number of interviews and jobs offered. The 2017 report showed that the popular job site accounts for a whopping 65% of employees and 72% of interviews from all leading job search sites. Biggest Con: There aren't many special features really, so the site can feel redundant if you're already using other, more comprehensive job search sites. Ltd., the owners of Indeed, so these two sites are no longer true competitors. A quick review: The Largest Pro and Con Biggest Pro: Local Work Feature shows you what the job market is like in your area. The job search site, which was founded in 2000, now has more than 80 million registered users and serves 80,000 employer jobs. With the search bar, you can search for open jobs by name or general keywords, such as customer service or restaurants. To apply, simply click apply for work; This will usually lead you behind the site to the initial job publication. Job descriptions here usually include detailed information about responsibilities, skills, qualifications and pay. Once you've made your account, you'll get offered jobs based on what you've filled out in your profile. You can also look for a job in a specific area by job name or keyword. An advanced search tool allows you to use such minimum salary, publication date, employment type and company. Dice Dice is a unique job search site specializing in information and technology. The website serves millions of job seekers and currently has more than 61,000 vacancies. It also receives an average of 2 million unique visitors per month. Many large companies advertise positions here, including Chase, Charles Schwab, and Dell. A quick review: The Biggest Pro and Con Biggest Pro: Dice is one of the most trusted tech job sites out there, with offers ranging from basic job search for a salary predictor tool and Career Ways feature that will help you figure out what professional trajectories you could take. Biggest Con: So many big technology companies are using this site to find new talent that you could end up casually looking at similar jobs at smaller, lesser known technology companies. How to use this job search site You can look for work on the bone by name, word, skills, or company name. The advanced search feature allows you to further narrow down the search by limiting the jobs found for you based on things like employment type, whether remote work is an option and distance/location. You can also create job alerts and create jobs that you'll find by creating an account. College Recruiter As you guessed the name, this job search site specifically targets college students and recent college graduates, providing messages for entry-level jobs, part-time jobs, seasonal jobs, and internships. Today, it is the most popular job site among college students and recent graduates. Many of the 1,000 companies and federal government agencies post jobs here. A quick review: Biggest Pro and Con Biggest Pro: This site works very hard to meet its college job seekers; it offers great blog career tips, a commute calculator to help you narrow down search-based commute times, and even a free summary of critics. Biggest Con: College Recruiter doesn't have an advanced search option, making it a little difficult to find the exact types of jobs that you're interested in. You can then narrow down your search somewhat by selecting a specific category of work, company, or type of employment. Job seekers are able to apply either with their social media account (Google, Facebook or LinkedIn) or with a college recruiter account. Job descriptions may include videos created by a company and generally have basic information about qualifications and experience, work responsibilities, education and pay. HigherEdJobs For people with solid work experience and an impressive education (think a master's degree or higher), HigherEdJobs can lead you to your dream of academic work, whether it's being a professor or working in college administration. Founded in 1996, this site receives 1.5 million unique visitors each month and is a leading job search site for higher education professionals. In 2018, more than 5,000 schools, including small liberal arts colleges and major research universities, have announced more than 250,000 jobs at HigherEdJobs. A quick review: The Biggest Pro and Con Biggest Pro: Search Options here are extremely useful; you can look by school type, category (e.g. administrative or faculty), type of work, or location (which includes remote jobs). The advanced search feature gives you even more criteria to choose from. Biggest Con: Some job postings are not actually offered by colleges and universities, so you need to check carefully jobs (especially remote). How to use this job search site Once you've made your free HigherEdJobs account, you can download your resume and search for work using the comprehensive search features described above; You can also save the jobs you find for your organizer and sign up for a job alert. Apply for Just click on the link in the job posting; this will usually lead you to the official work of the school board. Jobs are easy to read and usually include detailed information about tasks required for work, educational and/or professional requirements, wages and job categories. USAJOBS If you want to work for the federal government and/or in public service, USAJOBS is the place to go, as it is the official job search site of the U.S. government. In 2016, more than 500 agencies and organizations placed 350,000 positions on this site. Even more impressive is that since its inception, USAJOBS has more than 10 million users. A quick review: The Biggest Pro and Con Biggest Pro: The Hiring Ways feature site provides you with helpful tips on job types to search based on your background. Also, the listed salaries are accurate, so there's no more guesswork about what you'll earn! Biggest Con: Additional career resources are available, but usually only as virtual events at certain times. How to use this job search site you need to make a free account to apply for a job at USAJOBS. It also allows you to save jobs, download up to five resumes and subscribe to job alerts. After creating an account and creating a profile, use the search bar to find work on the keyword, job title, department, agency, etc. (within or outside the U.S.). In addition, I propose to use the Way of Hiring Filters to roll back specialty jobs open only to niche groups of people. The job descriptions are extremely detailed, with information about wages, responsibilities, benefits, qualifications, requirements, whether a trip is required, and so on. The posts also give you a job category and a list of similar jobs for you to watch. Mediabistro Mediabistro is a popular specialized job search site focused on media professionals, including those working with writing, editing and marketing. This is especially healthy for freelancers who are looking for short-term projects and assignments. The site currently lists more than 1,000 jobs in areas such as manufacturing, design, marketing, sales, and writing and editing. Fast review: The Biggest Pro and Con Biggest Pro: MB Unlimited, the premium version of Mediabistro, offers tons of resources, from online courses and pitching to special discounts on tools and events. It's not free, but it's worth considering. The site also makes a free resume assessment. Biggest Con: There aren't too many jobs to choose from there, especially compared to other job search sites, so you can feel the job is what you will find if all you use is a site. How to use this job search site you don't need an account with Mediabistro to view or apply to assignments, although with one you can sign up for job alerts, save jobs, download resumes, and access other, useful career resources. To find a job, put a keyword, position, or company in the search bar, and then enter your location. Some posts even include videos about the company. 4 Tips for Using Job Search Sites Here are some general tips to keep in mind when looking for work on top job search sites. #1: Vet Jobs before applying While you may be tempted to turn to all relevant-sounding jobs, it's worth it to take a few minutes to quickly check the work of the posting and the company, just to make sure it's a legitimate position and business. This is especially important on job search sites where anyone can place a job ad, such as Craigslist. One of the easiest and quickest ways to check the job is to make a quick Google search out (company name) scam or company name legitimate. If a company has super-low ratings and/or tons of scam charges, it's probably best not to apply for any jobs out there. You can also check the Better Business Bureau to see the class of this company. #2: Completely fill out your online profile You don't necessarily have to make an account on every job search site you use, but doing so and completely filling out your online profile can give you a great advantage and save time, especially if it's a work site that allows you to apply locally. While you don't need to include every tiny detail from your resume in your job search profile, the two should be quite similar. Try to fill in as many profile sections as you can (and as much as you like). Typically, the best information to include in the job search site profile is this: Your name is your contact information (usually your email and/or phone number) your (general) area/place of your education is your employment history (no need to put details-just dates and description should be sufficient) Links (if any) Relevant links to such things, like the articles you've written, the portfolios, etc. Some top job search sites allow businesses to reach out to users based on their profiles and resumes (s) they've downloaded, so this is one potentially useful feature that you can consider when creating an account. #3: Tailor your cover letter and resume for each The best job search sites often offer one click to apply buttons, which, while ostensibly useful, can actually hurt your chances of securing a job if you are unable to tailor a cover letter and resume/profile to this particular post. So be sure to set up documents with each job you apply for. I know it sounds super super There are no mistakes, but you won't regret it when you start getting more interest from potential employers! #4: Expand or narrow your search as needed, be sure to use filters and/or advanced search features on any job search sites you use. For example, if you don't find the job you want in your area, you can expand the search to include places a little further or jobs with a slightly lower wage range. On the other hand, if you find too many jobs in your area (most likely to happen if you live in a big city such as New York or Los Angeles), then you can narrow down the search using filters for type work, category, distance, wages, commute time, etc. What's next?
