Content and length. It's a laborious task as anything that rotates the world of architecture yet where there is going to be a way. Keep that in mind. Too often the first portfolio includes everything that the person has ever created. Big mistake. The approach to the firm requires the presentation of the portfolio in an interview, and a brief email of at least a two-page portfolio of architecture. Solution? The two portfolios you need are best in the short and the top two, three, five following in the extended version. The third portfolio can be presented online, the online version is easily available on the link each of them can often come in Mistakes and Typos can happen easily in a state of stress, it is always advisable to ask fellow architects to correct your work, better safe than sorry. File size can be a problem, as you well know by now, large files are problematic. The exact file size for each view may be different, but keeping the file size below 15MB should help a lot. Creative Flow is really important in the portfolio, but it should never negatively affect what you are actually trying to demonstrate, stay focused. Graphic focus and balance. Yes, there are architectural portfolios that focus solely on technical drawings, illustrations, visualizations or conceptual sketches, but keep in mind that they were provided in this way, they demonstrate strength, and you certainly want to do the same. You send a portfolio tailored to the position in the office, imagine what the portfolio has to contain to get the right answer. You can always create a rendering portfolio and a technical portfolio for different practices. That being said, all portfolios should have all parts of the creative design process in place. One simply shows that he fully understands the process and has the versatility to adapt to the new task if necessary, while his strength in a certain area will be allocated accordingly. Layout. Always strive for pure expression, avoid clutter and embrace the white space. If you want to avoid white spaces the design piece has to be easily digested, a rather difficult task is definitely not impossible to achieve given the myriad elements that portfolio shelters. Note the structure and readability, the portfolio will tell your story. Cohesion and detail. Design strengths lie in the details by now, we know it. Use certain design motifs and signals throughout the portfolio to create cohesion, identity, authenticity. Print. Print it out. Printing it at least once to see it yourself, it's an archive of your own creative though the process and having it in your library would be a great feat. It is common practice to send a copy of your printed portfolio to the office of your choice, do so only when you are sure that the portfolio and officer are in sync, for the perfect print experience, we recommend Blurp.
