Pre-mixed kits are a good option if you have some experience with home henna tattooing, but are not advanced enough to mix the henna itself. Also known as mehndi, henna refers to the tradition of body painting with a paste made from the powdered, dried leaves of the henna plant, aka Lawsonia inermis. Typically done on the hands and feet, Henna seems to have roots in different parts of the world, but is perhaps best known for its significance as a pre-wedding staple throughout India, where it is also an important part of many festivals and ceremonies. It's hard to tell exactly where henna came from, because people in Africa, Egypt, the Middle East and India used it more than 5,000 years ago, says Assar, who is the chief executive artist at Los Angeles-based Neha Assar Henna Artistry. Traditionally, wedding henna has always had the name of the important other written in it. It is believed to be carefully hidden from being searched for it on the wedding night. In the past, arranged marriages were very common, so this tradition was used as an icebreaker for the couple to get to know each other better. Henna designs are often complicated and symbolic, coming from a single point, or bindu that represents the Supreme Reality. Artists can paint a wide range of flowing designs coming from that point, including geometric shapes, mandalas, animals, plants and more. While historians may differ on details, they find common ground in the conclusion that henna use as ornamentation dates back to at least the Iron Age, says artist Mangala Bühler-Rose of New York Citybased Mehndi NYC. Evidence supports this early cosmetic use in ancient Egypt, Mesopotamia and elsewhere. Ad The cost of getting a henna tattoo depends on many different factors, including where you live, the size and complexity of the design you want and who does the tattoo application. Some artists charge by the hour and some by design, but, on average, you get a henna tattoo for anywhere from \$20 to \$200. Some keep this art very sacred and it is important to ask your artists the difficult questions so that when people ask you, 'what it means and where it comes from', you answer enthusiastically and confidently. While henna design is prevalent in South Asia, many communities - Eritrean, Somali, Roma, Moroccan and Iranian to name a few - share a huge rich history of henna design, Bühler-Rose says. It is important for customers to note that symbolism in many henna designs is sacred. Some communities even considered disrespectfully, sensitively and expertly. For example, placing an image of the deity Ganesa on the feet would be considered disrespectful.' If art continues to spread around the world, it is essential to remain educated on its origins and traditions, says Haque. It is also important not to ridicule the art or use it as a costume. Nowadays, people from all backgrounds receive and apply the art. If you are someone who applies the art, please be mindful and not use cultural terms to promote your henna business. Don't call yourself a Guru or change your name just to get more customers. While the rising popularity of has resulted in some distortion and obfuscation of the original meaning, many artists are committed to keeping the tradition alive. I've been artistic all my life, says Assar. I often visited India as a child and and from architecture to textiles in fabric really inspired me to pursue Indian art in general. I'd done my henna on a certain opportunity and absolutely loved it. I started doing henna professionally in 1994. I was 14 years old and my very first client was a bride. The rest is history. For Bühler-Rose, henna is a way to preserve and perpetuate its history. The use of henna was brewed and applied, she says. The symbolism and images associated with henna use parallels my own spiritual beliefs and religious practice. Thus, henna design is a harmonious experience for me, one in which I access and use various facets of my identity to be present with, and benefit, people. For Haque, mehndi is a very personal practice that she has been able to share with customers from all cultures. Growing up in a traditional Pakistani home, henna was applied for religious holidays, special events, weddings, and was also applied as a self-care ritual, she says. I remember going to Pakistan to stay with my cousins and we were going to make beautiful designs for each other. I loved the process. My aunts would tell me that it is a good practice of patience and grace, if you need to be aware if you let the henna dry and in the skin. As a young girl, I always wanted to be an artist, but my immigrant parents weren't always supportive. When it came to mehndi art, they allowed it because it kept me close to my culture and it made my family members happy when I applied it to them. After more than 10 years of being a henna artist, it has now become a way for me to show my culture and where I come from, to express myself artistically, a way for me to help people mark milestones and bring more intent into their lives. And while Haque encourages both henna artists and clients to respect the sanctity of tradition, she also believes that a modern and gracious interpretation of the practice is possible. I also believe in the evolution of art, she says. There will be new traditions that will develop over the years, but [it is important] to always honor its roots. Henna is a simple plant, it has become the basis for important milestones in the lives of people around the world and should be treated with reverence. Respect.

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
