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Android only: Creating folders on your home screen and then finding and dragging apps into them, not fast and accurate. The app organizer and his broader cousin Folder Organizer make it much easier to create and access packages of apps, contacts, and bookmarks. Instead of creating a folder and doing a lot of scrolling and dragging to fill it out, Apps Organizer lets you create Labels, which you can then add apps from one list of your device's apps. The organizer comes with multiple labels pre-loaded, but you'll probably want to create your own, give them a unique icon (from stock selection or own images), and place an icon where you want from shortcuts or menu widgets. If you want to quickly change the rotation of a particular label, you can create a label to the Label Starred Apps. If you want to get another geekier with home screen labels, you can download the Folder Organizer app of the same developer, Lite or Full, to create automatic update labels and widgets that contain apps, bookmarks, contacts, and anything else that you can fit on your home screen. Translation You don't speak the language, you don't want to futz with the Google Translate web interface. The Translate app offers a cleaner way to quickly search for translations. Use your phrase and set the tongue from and to and go - up to 150 language pairs are available! This is one must-have for international travelers. Musical performance Although music is not always under the umbrella of personal performance, there are still a few Android apps that allow you to get music-related tasks done a lot faster. Ringdroid Turn any MP3 on your phone to the ringtone without touching your desktop with Ringdroid. Using the app, you select the beginning and end of the tone in the Song Chronicle and view it before saving it. (This is the sound you hear iPhone owners eating their hearts while they manually sync the tunes from iTunes.) Shazam Just like the popular iPhone app, Shazam identifies songs you hear on the radio or elsewhere. Just hold the phone's microphone next to the radio speakers while it plays the song in question, and Shazam will guess what it is. Shazam only works with recorded music, not humming or live versions. Scroll down the result to search for songs on YouTube and Amazon MP3 (included over the phone so you can purchase the melody on the spot). TuneWiki See the texts displayed in time with music videos using TuneWiki, an awesome app that will finally settle the debate about what the hell this line was, anyway. YouTube videos also work (pictured), although the lines aren't always synchronized, but you can click on the screen to move on to the next one. There have been various slide-to-unlock techniques and OEM manufacturers always put their own spin on things. As it turns out, there are also many screen lock apps in the Play Store that can do even more. These days, we usually recommend that people simply use a fingerprint scanner to bypass the lock screen altogether. That's fine if you don't want to do it, though. Here are the best lock screen apps for Android! It's important to note that locking the app screen is a bit of a dying breed. Most biometric security measures bypass the lock screen completely, and many people don't even look at it anymore away from maybe checking notifications or times. We don't see a lot of new developments in this space, and most of what's available doesn't have the same security as the lock screen stock. So we've compiled this list that a few good lock screen apps remain in active development along with a few old favorites who can't see active development again. It emulates always on lock screens devices like Moto X, Galaxy S8, and others. Users can play with notifications without unlocking the display. It also has some tweaking. For example, it can only work at certain hours to save battery life. More and more devices are coming stock with something similar. Thus, we recommend AcDisplay only to those who have older devices that do not yet have this feature. The last update was in 2015. We're not sure if the developer is doing much with it anymore. At least it's free to download and play. Always on AMOLEDPrice: Free/\$1.99/Other Options Always on AMOLED is not a lock screen, but it does emulate one. This basically mimics the always on display feature of many smartphones. The app shows things like time, notifications and other similar things. It also includes features such as motion clocks to avoid burn inch The app can even initiate a nap mode while working. We recommend this only on devices with ANED display, including AMOLED from Samsung. It loses a lot of its luster on lcd screens. We also recommend this only on older devices that don't always show up as a native feature. Native versions almost always work better than third-party apps. FloatifyPrice: FreeFloatify is a popular, somewhat modern option to replace the lock screen app. It actually looks like a stock lock screen. It's a simple background with time at the front. You can add things like weather, notifications, and other data. You can also set up shortcuts at the bottom of the lock screen. It also has other modern features such as turning on the display when you pick up your phone, theme, and chat chapter feature similar to Facebook Messenger. It's actually surprisingly good for replacing the lock screen. It hasn't seen an update since late 2017 though, so we're not sure this one is in active development anymore. Hi LockerPrice: Free/\$1.99Hi Locker is a fairly typical lock screen replacement app. It will show you the basics such as weather, notifications, calendar events etc. you can also have it greet you with funny jokes and greetings. It even has fingerprint support on devices with fingerprint readers. You can also have it automatically set wallpaper from Flickr. There are several customization options as well. For example, you can hide notifications from certain apps so people can't see them. It's not even close to the most complex lock screen applications, but it's a great replacement for those who don't need a ton of features. KLOCK Kustom Lock Screen Free/\$4.49KLOCK is to save developers of the popular KWGT Kustom widgets and KLWP Live Wallpaper apps. Basically, this app allows you to concoct your own custom lock screen. He uses a simple editor with a bunch of bunch You can add notifications, different shapes, your own graphics and backgrounds, and more. It also allows you to add things like Google Fit data, weather, live maps, music player features and even an RSS feed. This thing even comes with Tasker support. It's still in early beta. So you can expect errors. However, in 2018, if you want a custom lock screen, this is the one we recommend. Lockscreen WidgetsPrice: \$1.49Lockscreen Widgets is one of the new lock screen replacement apps. This actually just brings back the old Android feature where you can put widgets on the lock screen. The app allows you to put one widget on the page and you can have several pages. This is great for people who want some extra information on the lock screen and those who miss the feature from Android 5.0 Lollipop. The app is at the beginning of the beta at the time of writing this article, but it worked very well in our testing. It works for \$1.49 without in-app purchases or ads. LokLokPrice: Free/Up \$1.49LokLok is different from most screen lock apps. It's almost a kind of mash-up of the lock screen and Snapchat. Turning the device on will open your camera. You can take a picture, draw it in this picture, and then send it to your friends or family. They will see the image when they unlock their phone further and can respond accordingly. It's not great for sending risky photos, but it's great for reminding someone to grab milk on the way home from work. The app is free to use. There are in-app purchases for things like sticker packs, but they are not necessary for functionality. This one has also not been updated since 2017, so it may no longer be in active development. Solo LockerPrice: Free/Up \$5.00Solo Locker is one of the best DIY lock screen apps. You get access to a bunch of customization features and lock screen items. Then you can build a lock screen as you want. It comes with a variety of locking techniques, wallpapers, and even widgets. You can use them to make your screen lock. You won't find a ridiculous amount of depth here, but there are enough options to make it fun. The basic app is free and you buy extra things with purchases in the app. Pre-made KLOCKPrice theme: Free/Varies We talked about KLOCK earlier in this post, and it's great to create your own lock screen. However, there are a ton of KLOCK themes in the Play Store that do most of the work for you. Some examples include Liquify (linked on the button below), Evonix, Grace, S9, and many others. Themes that look like other devices and some just look nice in general. Also, some of them such as the S9 actually work for KLOCK, KLWG and KLWP bundled kit for some serious customization. They are not standalone lock screen applications, but they all work with KLOCK and take away a lot of guesswork. You can also search for more KLOCK themes in the Play Store. Use your screenPrice lock: screenPrice: thing, people. Google has blocked a lot of the functionality of your lock screen over the years with new versions of Android. Third party replacements don't have the power they once did, and you no longer have neat things like lock-screen widgets (and, like extension, DashClock Widget and similar apps). The stock lock screen can show you notifications, stick to the intruders, and always be on if you need it. Unfortunately, with screen locks kept to a minimum as much as it was, that's all you can do even with third party replacements these days. We recommend sticking to the stock lock screen if you can, because third-party options quickly fall out of fashion.
