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Let's face it: None of us want to face life without our Keurig. We came to rely on this magical little machine that makes coffee at the touch of a button. But just like cleaning the oven, cleaning the dishwasher and cleaning the washing machine, you can't rely on this appliance to take care of your own cleaning and maintenance. That's bad news. But the good news is that it's generally not hard to clean Keurig, and you have different cleaning options ranging from the items that you already have in the kitchen to purchase the company's descaling solution. Here we have put together a quick and simple guide to keep your coffee maker lean, lean, medium, and clean, so you can sip an espresso in a bacteria-free world. How often should Keurig be cleaned? The appearance of your Keurig should be cleaned about once a week, at least, or more often if things get heavy. Keep in mind that the drip tray can only enter eight ounces, so you will need to empty it every once in a while. It is recommended that the reservoir and pod holder get a weekly cleanup, but descaling - or removal of mineral buildup - can be done less frequently, about once every three to six months. Descale light tends to flip when the time has come, but you'll probably be able to say on your own anyway. Brewing can become slower and your cup can't fill all the way. As for replacing the filter, that can be done every two months or so. How to clean the outer part of Keurig? With a wet, soapy cloth free of lint, wipe off dust or spray. Then gently slip out of the drip tray, empty, wipe and return to your position. But never, ever put a car in the water. It's an electric device, after all. How to clean individual parts of Keurig? Turn off and off the machine and let it cool. Then lift the lever to disassemble the K-Cup pod holder and funnel, and wash both parts in the sink or on the top shelf of the dishwasher at a low temperature cycle. While you're at it, loosen any potential clogs from the input needle (that's the thing that pierces the pods) as well as exit the needle under the pod holder using a clean paperclip. (But beware, these things are sharp!) Remove the tank and cover and wash like soapy water in the sink, not a dishwasher. Rinse thoroughly and spray the filter with a faucet hose, or shake the tank to create a stronger flow of water. But when you're finished, don't towel dry inside as you could leave some pile behind. How to clean Keurig with help Lower the reservoir and, if applicable, filter. Turn off the car. Fill the tank with 10 ounces of white vinegar. Next, place a large, ceramic (not paper!) under the spout and adding a K-Cup), hit that favorite boil button. How can I get a taste of vinegar from my Keurig? Clean this mug, then refill the tank with 10 ounces of water-only water and repeat, allowing Keurig to sit for 30 minutes when full. (Some people choose a tablespoon of baking soda, just to make sure it's very clean.) Then remove and rinse the tank, fill it to the full line of fresh water and repeat the cooking cycles until all the water disappears. Perform the above functions, but instead of using vinegar, fill the tank with a bottle of descaling Keurig solution. Before moving on to the next step, filling in now an empty descaling solution is a bottle of water and pour that into the reservoir as well. Hit the boil button to perform the cleaning to cook in a ceramic mug (remember, don't use the paper here!). Repeat until the water is illuminated. At this point, let Keurig rest for 30 minutes. Then remove and rinse the tank, fill it to the full line of fresh water and repeat the cooking cycles until all the water disappears (or 12 times, as recommended by the solution manufacturer Keurig Descaling). In addition, the color touchscreen display senses the size of the K-cup that you inserted into the machine, and instantly raises the quantity parameters. It's so simple, even someone decaffeinated in her system can do it. While we were understandably thrilled with the prospect of making one big pot in the same machine we use for quick grab and go cup in the morning, we found when filled to the maximum, the carafe contains only enough coffee to fill three mugs. This means that Keurig 2.0 will satisfy you if you enjoy the second or third throughout the morning, or if you regularly make coffee just for you and your husband. But if you're looking for a caffeine full table brunch guests with one carafe, this probably isn't the model for you. However, the future of smart coffee makers looks bright. The Keurig 2.0 display shows that for future iterations, the company is brewing even more options for taste and customization in sizes - including crowd-friendly carafe. Pop into a pod, click, and after a minute or so, your mug is full. But if you want to make sure everything goes smoothly, you need to develop a maintenance mode. While this article is aimed at Keurig machines, many of these tips also refer to the best coffee makers and the best espresso machines. What can happen if you don't clean your Keurig coffee maker? Here are some things that can go wrong if you don't clean your car regularly: the needle can get clogged. This means that the coffee grounds may end in your cup, or you can get a short cup instead of the usual dose. Your coffee can start to taste bad. Mineral deposits can be created inside the machine, slowing down brewing. Bacteria and mold can grow inside the coffee maker. You may not see it or even try it, but it's there. Fu! These steps may seem complicated, but they only take a few minutes. And other than a simple weekly wash, you don't have to do them often. Winning big: great tasting coffee. Be sure to visit the Keurig website, which has short but very useful videos showing each procedure. What to do every week (or more often if you have time)With dishwashing detergent and hot water, wash all the removable parts of your Keurig, including reservoir, lid, mug tray and K-cup holder. (Image credit: Keurig) What to do every two monthsInstively filter cartridge for water. After soaking the new cartridge in fresh, cold water for 5 minutes, rinse the cartridge for 60 seconds or so. Then wash the mesh part of the lower filter holder. Put the cartridge in the top filter holder, and snap on the lid, locking it in place in the water tank. What to do every three to six months Every so often, you need to de-scale your Keurig coffee maker to remove mineral deposits. How often depends on how Your water. If you notice that your machine is slowing down, it's definitely time to de-scale. Start the process by filling the tank with 10 ounces of plain white vinegar. Or you can use the descaling solution Keurig. Then run a couple

of brewing cycles without the K-Cup, making sure to place the mug under to catch the liquid. Finally, run the cycle with 10 ounces of fresh water to rinse the vinegar. What to do as often as it needs Whenever you see the bases in your K-Cup holder or cup or you are shortchanged on coffee, clean Keurig needles that pierce the K-Cup. To unpack the needle output, remove and disassemble the pod holder, and then use a straightened, unwrapped paper clip to clear off any debris. Lift your head, and use a team to clean the holes around the entrance needle. Before reassemble the pod holder thoroughly rinse it. You run two cycles with water only, and then you will be ready to go. If your java tastes like oolong or you make hot cocoa, run the brushing to cook without a K-cup. Keurig also sells rinse pods that can help eliminate the transfer of taste. It is a good idea to run a cleansing cycle once a week if you brew many different drinks during the week.
