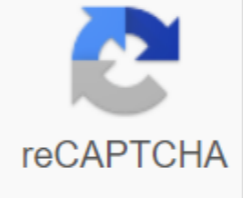

Vocabulary on the ACT is far from the most important thing you can do to prepare. You won't be tested on obscure words or need to memorize definitions to be successful. Spending hours memorizing the difficult, secret words vocab won't help you on the ACT. This is because the ACT tests medium-complexity words in the context of sentences and focuses on multi-meaning words. For more information on this, read our article on act vocabulary - it's a must read before you start learning! In short, make sure you don't just memorize your vocabulary and assume that it will help you prepare for ACT English and ACT Readings. You should focus on being able to identify vocabulary in context and recognize words with multiple intentions. Many preparatory programs over-emphasize vocabulary memorization because it is easy to teach. However, learning vocabulary is important for the ACT (we recommend using the waterfall method to study), so we're including lists of words and resources here. Keep in mind that you should consider vocabulary as just one component of ACT Reading and English. Don't neglect to learn grammar rules or reading practices. It's important that your ACT study regimen is balanced. Don't spend so much time on one skill you neglect another. ACT Vocabulary Word Lists As we discussed above, the ACT is all about testing vocabulary in context rather than weird, obscure words. Beware of any super-long lists of words that claim to be for the ACT - they're probably just old lists of SAT words with a different name. Focus on learning medium-complexity words very well, so you know them in context, and less on learning as many words as possible. I recommend starting with our List of PrepScholar. We focus on words with multiple meanings that may appear on the ACT. Our 150 words ACT also includes some vocabulary to help you in the science section. If you are still struggling with vocabulary after learning our 150 words, you can also learn these 100 words from Scholastic. Technically, this is an ACT/SAT list, but it focuses on the medium-complexity words that appeared in the scholastic publication, so this will be useful for the ACT. Finally, you can learn 50 more scientific-specific vocabulary words to help with the science section. If you have these words under your belt, you To have the base you need to do well on ACT Reading and English. Remembering a bigger word will have a decrease in profits, as again, obscure words are not checked by the ACT. And more importantly, you should practice the possibility of defining words in context. ACT ACT Practice will be just as useful for learning that skill. Memorizing hundreds of vocab words will not. Flashcards, games and other resources Here are some additional free web resources that can be really useful for learning the ACT vocabulary, and specifically to study words in the context of great articles or passages. The first two would be great resources for any student. The last two are useful for students who are auditory students or learn best by example. The quiz is a flash card website that you can use to learn the vocabulary of words. If you make an account, you can use their website, but also mobile apps for iPhone and Android - which means you can learn when you find yourself with a free moment. You can search through thousands of existing flash card sets on the quiz. You can make your own sets using the lists above, or search the ACT dictionary to access the pre-made flash cards other users have made. Just be careful you don't pull up the supposed ACT Vocab map set that's actually just an old SAT dictionary. (Any lists longer than 250 words are too long.) You can also search for ACT Science to view more vocabulary science. I personally used this app all the time in college for my language classes and found its format very useful. I could make flash cards on the quiz much faster than writing them out manually. Also, I wanted to pull up the app when I found myself with free time (waiting in line somewhere, for example) and learn a few words. ProfessorWord is an app for your browser that pulls ACT vocabulary words from articles and pages and identifies them for you. This is really cool, because if you read articles online, especially in publications such as The Economist, Time, or The New Yorker, you come across tons of ACT vocabulary words. This app just passes and points to them, so you don't miss them! It's a great way to learn words in context, which is super useful for preparing for ACT Reading and English. Even if you only read one article a day, despite the highlighted words and testing your knowledge of them, you can improve your ability to define words in context. It's a great way to practice to act vocabulary as well as a fun way if you like reading articles and blogs. No, Mum, I'm not just reading Game of Thrones for fun, it's for the ACT! You can go through the SAT Common 300 list, as it has many words that intersect with the ACT vocabulary. You can also go to the Master list to look for the words you are having problems with. Vocab Sushi If You Are You Online quiz, Vocab Sushi is a fun site that lets you test your vocab knowledge with quizzes and teaches vocab words using them in sentences. This site is particularly useful for the ACT because it emphasizes meaning in context. Vocab Sushi draws an example of sentences from real newspapers and magazines, helping you see how words are actually used in the real world. First things first: Don't overdo Vocab before you go into resources, we have important word tips - don't overdo the vocab of studying the SAT. SAT Vocabulary is based on the understanding of words in context, in subjects ranging from literature to social sciences to science. In other words, you don't have to know the definition of a random word without external information. Instead, you should figure out what the word means based on the information around it. So it's best to use your research time to learn the high value, medium difficulty of words, rather than cram your head with lots of obscure vocabulary. Be careful with any preparatory programs that promise to teach you SAT Vocabulary, especially those with super long word lists (500 or 1000 words). It's a waste of time! These programs are still based on the old SAT, which tested a more obscure vocabulary. However, if you struggle with vocabulary in general, it may be good to do some individual vocabulary research to help you tackle reading passages, some of which will be more difficult than on the old SAT. For example, take a look at this question from the PRACTICAL SAT exam: a test question from SAT Practice Test 1. If you have no idea what the word ambivalent means, it can be difficult for you to decide and find out what duality means in this context. (For the record, Merriam-Webster defines ambivalence as as mixture of opposite feelings.) So how can you figure out if you need to do some special vocabulary research, or if your existing vocabulary base is sufficient? Take the practice of the SAT by focusing on reading and writing sections. When evaluating your answers to reading, if you missed half or more vocab questions (those that start as used in a line, the word most almost means...), then you should make learning vocabulary a priority. Also, when correcting other reading questions, try to find out why you got them wrong. (Learn more about how to get most of the practical tests.) If you notice that you are missing questions because you misunderstood a word or phrase, either in a passage or question, it can also be helpful to get some SAT vocabulary under your belt. Finally, keep an eye on the accurate questions in the Letter section. These questions you compare different variants of words, for example, so, thus, more than that, and, however, and choose the one that works best in the passage. Again, you should be able to understand how the meaning of a word works in a sentence to get those right. If you take a hands-on test and skip only a few or none of the reading vocab questions, and none of the Writing Accuracy questions and your incorrect answers because of various questions (timing, misunderstanding of the larger pass value, etc.), then don't waste time studying vocab! Focus on other weaknesses. (Check out our final guide to studying SAT Reading Ideas.) But if you're struggling on any of these questions, check out the vocabulary lists below to help you learn the high cost of words for the SAT. SAT Vocabulary Word Lists If you decide that you need to work on SAT vocab, we recommend using these vocab lists. They focus on the common, simple to moderate complexity of SAT words that are likely to be tested. They also do not overestimate the vocabulary - none of these lists are longer than 200 words. Remember that spending hours memorizing vocabulary is not an effective use of training time for the SAT. Start by studying one list of words and then take another practice test. If you're still struggling with vocabulary issues, move on to the next list. PrepScholar's 200 SAT Words PrepScholar in 150 Top ACT Words Scholastic in the SAT/ACT Top 100 Words Kaplan 100 most common SAT Words Save this list for the latter because it contains more complex words that are less likely to be tested on the current iteration of the SAT. However, these are still good words to know because they can be used in more complex reading passages. You can make your own flash cards to study these words, or check out the resources below for virtual flash cards and educational resources. Happy studies! Flash cards, games and other resources besides just give you lists of words, we also like to give you more tools to learn vocabulary. These are a few resources that are also free and can help you learn SAT vocab. I have selected a number of websites to help different types of students. These are all great resources and you should use them if you find them useful. All in all, when you're looking for SAT vocab resources, avoid services promising to teach you over 500 words (too much time) or any services you should pay for (not worth considering the amount of free resources). If you make an account, you can use their website as well as their mobile apps for iPhone and Android - meaning you can explore your SAT vocab on the go! This app is handy because as you browse the words, you can star the cards that you are struggling with, allowing you to just focus on the weaknesses. You can make your own set of cards focusing on problematic words or searching advance lists. For example, here's a list of the top 100 Kaplans! I personally used this app all the time in college for my language classes and found it very useful. I strongly recommend using it to study your SAT vocabulary. ProfessorWord is an app for your web browser that highlights SAT/ACT vocab words from articles and web pages and identifies them for you. This is really cool, because if you enjoy reading articles from publications such as The New York Times, The Atlantic, or Wired, it's likely you come across SAT vocab words in your daily reading anyway. This app just passes and points to them, so you don't miss them! It's a great way to learn words in the context of your day-to-day web browsing. Especially given the SAT's focus on understanding vocabulary in context, I strongly recommend using ProfessorWord to find and study vocabulary. Professor Word can turn even your leisure reading into a study exercise. The image is via wired. For best practice, run ProfessorWord and check out the highlighted words on the web page. Before you click on the word to see the definition, quickly write down (either on a piece of paper or in a NotePad document) what you think the word means based on how it is used in the article. Then read the official definition. Compare your guess with the official definition and see how close you got. If you do this exercise several times a week, you will improve your ability to figure out the meaning of a word based on its context, plus, you will generate a list of SAT words Study. Wint Vocab Forward If you like the words explained out loud, check out the video on Vocab ahead. These videos are very useful for students who learn best by hearing rather than reading, or with concepts explained to them. Number tab and select SAT 300 Common from the menu falling down. Videos for each word last about 30 seconds, and include a definition and at least one example. It's also a great resource if you have a specific word that you're struggling to understand based on its dictionary definition alone. Vocab Sushi If you like online quizzes, Vocab Sushi is a site that lets you test your vocab knowledge with quizzes and teaches vocab words using them in suggestions from actual news. It's a great way to learn new words from real-world examples, not just dictionary definitions. Give this website a shot if you're struggling with memorizing basic definitions of words and/or if you want more practice teaching vocabulary based on its context. What's next?
