

Most eyes were on the Samsung Galaxy Note 3 and Samsung Galaxy Gear during the Samsung Principle press event at the IFA yesterday, but there was also another piece of information that will bring a smile to millions of Samsung Galaxy S3 and S4 owners. According to Samsung, the company plans to roll out Android 4.3 for both devices during October. The Galaxy S3 launched in 2012 with Android 4.0.4 Ice Cream Sandwich and during this summer an update for Android 4.1.2 was rolled out. However, the update was not without problems. When Verizon released the 4.1.2 update, which also added support for features such as Multi-Window, Multi-Screen and S Beam's Auto Share Shot, problems with 4G LTE connectivity began to appear in its network reports. Verizon pulled the new version but within a couple of weeks the new release was made available which fixed 4G issues. Since then various rumors have hinted at Samsung's move straight to Android 4.3 and the 4.2.2. The Galaxy S4 pass, which was launched earlier this year, comes with Android 4.2.2 and an update to Android 4.3 should be a hassle free, given that Google Play Edition S4 is already running. One of the devices notable for its absence from the Samsung ad was the Galaxy Note 2. The Note 2, which was released this time last year, is currently running Android 4.1 and it was assumed that Samsung would upgrade it to Android 4.3 along with the S3 and S4. Since the new Galaxy Note 3 will come with Android 4.3 it is very likely that the latest version will come to the Note 2, but we are just waiting for confirmation and dates from Samsung. Android 4.3 is still an Android Jelly Bean option (along with 4.1 and 4.2), but this brings some interesting new features including limited profiles (a much better way to handle multiple users on the same tablet), Bluetooth 4.0 low energy support, OpenGL 3.0 support, T9 dialer and improved notification system. This is all good news for the owners of the Samsung S3 and S4, but of course now the problem is that Google seduced us with thoughts about Android 4.4 KitKat! I was apprehensive at first because I wasn't a fan of the previous Tab S3, but Samsung assured me that the new S4 added some new functionality that would change my mind about the entire system. I wanted to enjoy this tablet. For months, I've been looking for something small enough for my camera bag, which does pretty much everything I need on a daily basis. So far, I use the Pixelbook, and I liked it quite a bit, but the laptop just didn't give me the extreme portability I craved. This is our review of the Samsung Galaxy Tab S4. Design! shared feelings about the design of the Galaxy Tab S4, and I mean that literally. The front of the tablet looks relatively smooth and modern, with much smaller bezels than the Tab S3. This results in the removal of the Home button and fingerprint scanner, which reduces functionality but looks better. The fingerprint scanner has been replaced by the facial and iris scanning functionality, so you'll still have a quick and secure way to unlock the device. The oblong fingerprint scanner from the last few Galaxy Tabs has made the tablet feel cheap and outdated, and this new slim bezel design makes room for a larger 10.5-inch Super AMOLED display that looks great. Samsung knows how to make good displays, and it hasn't skimped on the Tab S4. Its screen has a resolution of 2560 x 1600, which is good for almost any situation. The front may look smooth and modern, but the back unfortunately looks straight out of 2012. I don't know why Samsung insists on keeping this old, square design. I personally hate him. Changing the shape of the camera may have made it feel more modern, but Samsung is stuck on its guns with the form factor. Moving to the sides, you'll find a USB Type-C port, headphone jack and quad-core stereo speakers. These speakers are configured by AKG and support Dolby Atmos, resulting in some pretty great sound. I'm surprised at how loud it got when listening to music and watching movies. Its clear Samsung put a lot of effort into making content consumption a top priority on this thing. On the right side you will find the keys of power and volume, as well as the SIM tray for the LTE model. The other side is reserved for POGO pins for the keyboard case, which helps connect the tablet to the full WERTY keyboard. My biggest problem with this is how Samsung obviously sees the keyboard as the main part of the experience, but still sells it for \$150 a premium. This keyboard case is especially important for the new software tricks the company is pulling for this time. It's frustrating to just get some of the supposed experience when you buy the tablet itself. EquipmentCa Galaxy The S4 runs on the Snapdragon 835 SoC with 4GB of RAM, which holds up very well for daily use. I haven't noticed any serious hiccups or stutters on this device, though I can't say, say, it will perform over time. Many people have reported that their Samsung devices don't hold up well after a year or so, but we need to see how this device works over time. You will find cameras on the front and back of the device, with 8MP permissions in front and 13MP on the back. I didn't take a ton of photos with this thing for fear of being this guy, but the ones I took seemed extremely mediocre. I don't want to keep comparing this thing to Microsoft's new Surface Go, but this camera is stellar. I would like to see Samsung improve the quality of the front side of the shooter at least. Tablets are really only good for a video call, so the camera should at least be better than the rear shooter. The battery in this stuff is 7300mAh, which is a pretty big hit from tab S3's 6000mAh offering last year. The battery lasted about a day and a half of writing articles in the cafe. This is definitely a big plus for this tablet, considering Samsung is marketing it to performance-focused consumers. As for storage, Samsung offers this device in 64 and 256GB variants. The 64GB seems pretty small, especially when Samsung wants you to replace your laptop with this thing, so I wish they would at least start with the 128GB option. You can expand the storage to 400GB with a microSD card, but that means spending even more money to get this tablet where Samsung had to ship it in the first place. Software! What really piqued my interest from this tablet was the new Samsung Dex mode. Originally designed to harness Samsung's phone equipment for a desktop experience connected to an external monitor, Samsung has decided to incorporate the same technology into its new S4 tablet. The idea is great in theory, but there are many reservations Samsung will have to get around before I even start thinking about replacing my laptop with this. To be fair, Dex mode looks great. It's formatted just like a traditional Windows PC, so many will feel comfortable using it. That being said, it's still Android skin, with all the usual attendant quirks. Because it's still Android, Dex has to run android apps. This means that you will have to use the mobile version of your browser to visit the mobile version of any website you want to open. Tab S4 effectively stretches the site from portrait orientation to landscape, which distorts the pages. Many websites will prompt you to download their app from the Play Store for a better experience, but they will be stuck in a portrait orientation that doesn't really use the Tab S4 screen. If you're using Chrome, we recommend you switch to the Desktop site option, although you'll have to do so with each new tab. Dex still feels half baked on this. Several apps felt useful to have from the Play Store. Facebook Messenger works great with its floating floating and using Spotify in the background is actually the same as using a desktop app on a traditional laptop setup. However, the whole experience just feels awkward, and as long as the apps are able to effectively size through the orientation of the screen it's hard to see yourself getting a lot of work. In non-Dex mode, this tablet works just like any other Android device. This is definitely the optimal mode to be if you're just surfing the web or consuming content, and browsing the web is more enjoyable on Samsung's own browser in this format. Apps will expand correctly too. I'd save your tablet in this format while consuming content like Netflix and YouTube. Otherwise, it's the same old Android you're probably used to. It runs android 8.1 Oreo with Samsung Experience version 9.5 leather, and feels very similar to Samsung smartphones. Accessories! For \$150, Samsung will sell you a folio-style keyboard case tab S4. This is unforgivable to me because Samsung has obviously designed the Tab S4 with a keyboard in mind. Buying only a tablet, you deprive yourself of the main appeal of the software of this device. Without a keyboard, it's just another boring Android tablet. The keyboard itself is just fine. The buttons have normally tactile feedback, but they're not as good as something like a Microsoft Surface keyboard. It's also pretty cramped, covering horizontal space almost equivalent to a pill. I often found my fingers tripping over each other. The materials in this keyboard definitely don't feel like they cost \$150, but you'll have to get it if you want this thing to be a performance machine Samsung touts. Probably the worst part about the keyboard as a whole is the lack of a trackpad. Samsung strongly recommends you get a Bluetooth mouse for the navigation experience, despite the advertisement being able to work on the train with this thing. Navigating the Dex interface without a trackpad is extremely difficult, especially when you consider that it's made to work more like Windows. Good luck trying to click on small items or copy and paste the text with your fingers. It sucks. The Tab S4 also comes with a special S Pen that looks more like a traditional handle than something from the Samsung Galaxy Note line. Unfortunately, it feels very cheap as it can break at any moment if you put too much pressure on it. This is unfortunate given that it currently maintains 4.095 levels of pressure sensitivity, but at least it is included in the purchase. Unfortunately, you have nowhere to attach a pen if you spring that \$150 keyboard case, meaning you'll probably lose it. Accessories are too expensive and should have been included. Samsung also sells USB Type-C HDMI adapter to connect tablet to external monitor, but it will cost you an extra \$50. External monitor Dex display while the tablet returns to its standard mode, meaning you can't extend the display, which is disappointing. You will need a completely separate Bluetooth mouse and keyboard to do this to work efficiently too. The Samsung Galaxy Tab S4 won't replace your laptop. While the new Dex mode offers a great experience, in theory, it feels very half baked - you'll be constantly disappointed when using it. Since the keyboard is separate but almost necessary, this tablet will run you almost \$800, which is far too expensive for a tablet with mobile SoC, 64GB of storage, and 4GB of RAM. You can buy a pretty decent Windows computer for that cost. The small pieces of convenience that Android provides you completely outweigh the mediocre experience. If you really, really want an Android tablet, you shouldn't buy a Galaxy Tab S4. Go buy a laptop instead. Or an iPad. Just don't buy it. Related to that. Related hard reset android samsung s4 mini
