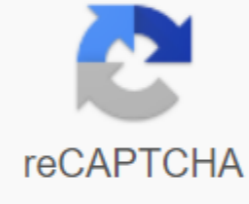




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Seekonk High School has a 205-day program that provides a structured learning environment within the public high school inclusion environment. The goal of this program is to get students from alternative programs to their home school district. This class provides comprehensive educational services to students with emotional and learning social disorders in grades 9-12. Seekonk High School has an average enrollment of 5 students, and students are supported with a 2:5 ratio of staff to student. The main objectives of the Seekonk High School classroom are to promote student self-regulation and enable students to reach the general education environment as close as possible. The academic program provides differentiated education through the use of the inclusion of general education and therapeutic/academic support within an autonomous environment, according to the needs of individual students. All students participate in general education inclusion courses with their peers. Students attend general education courses with the support of SCEC staff who attend each inclusion class with students, to provide academic and social emotional support, following all IEP objectives, objectives and accommodations. Both inclusion classes and SCEC program classes are aligned with Massachusetts curriculum frameworks. This inclusive approach closely aligns with sccec's goal of improving students' academic performance in the less restrictive environment. Seekonk High School students also participate in school-level activities along with their peers, including bullying prevention programming, high school prep assemblies, after school clubs, and school dances. All students have the opportunity to participate in the unified sports program at Seekonk High School. This program is sponsored through the Special Olympics and both basketball and athletics and the court are offered to SCEC students at Seekonk High School. Seekonk students before this high school at nearby East Providence High School in East Providence, Rhode Island or Tolman High School in Pawtucket, Rhode Island depending on the area of the city where they resided or private high schools. When East Providence High School was unable to continue accepting Seekonk students, the 1966 class of students from the south of the city attended Dighton-Rehoboth High School. The new Seekonk High School was finished in time for the 1967 class to return for their junior (1965–1966). Some students chose to stay in Dighton-Rehoboth or other schools.
