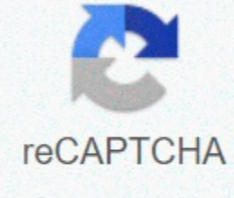




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Byu study abroad 2021

Four-decade-old BYU students have just called me to the London Centre home. When they don't study, eat or sleep in these historic West End mansions, students use the Centre as the basis for discoveries in the city, the British countryside and beyond. A semester at the London Centre remains one of the great bargains at BYU. The program cost listed below includes not only more travel and better accommodation than most foreign studies, but also healthy chef-prepared meals four to five days a week. In the spring of 2021, promises to be a particularly vivid term for the London Centre as the city will be alive with great theatre, concerts, festivals, and a programme led by BYU professors with a wide range of foreign experience and expertise in British popular culture: European literature, art, history, culture, and experience design. Participants in the program receive 12 credits towards graduation, develop close relationships with faculty mentors and their families, and tour the world's largest museums, cultural heritage sites, participate in unique structured experiences and visit interesting locations. Inside London, students take part in the West End and musicals, meet people and cultures from around the world and visit iconic venues such as the British Museum, the Tower of London, St Paul's Cathedral, the National Gallery, and perhaps even Platform 9 3/4. Our bus journeys across England and Scotland include stops, include, The Cotswolds, Oxford, Stourhead, Bath, Cornwall and Fountains Abbey. We're also studying Shakespeare on the banks of Avon and Beatrix Potter in the Lake District. As this program has an emphasis on popular culture and experience design, we will see Shakespeare performed at the renovated Globe Theatre, attend a Premier League football match, learn about the Beatles in Liverpool, retrace the steps of early tourists travelling to the Lake District, and visit places that have been the film adaptation of Jane Austen's novels. The programme will also feature a five-day trip to Scotland. 31-6 August 2021 The Centre is a short tube ride from most central London attractions and is just metres away on foot from Kensington Gardens, Notting Hill, and hundreds of shops and restaurants. The program includes a self-service breakfast, chef-prepared dinners and money for every day except Saturday. Students usually have lunch with pbJs or the previous evening's leftovers. The centre offers free laundry facilities, a library, a lounge and Wi-Fi access. COURSES Students receive 12 credits that meet different GE and main/minor requirements or are considered general classes towards graduation. All students take the same four courses: EXDM 300: Creating a Good Life (3 credits, Professor Peter Ward). It fulfills GE's global and cultural awareness and counts significant experience in design and management and several minors at the Marriott School of Business. IHUM 280R: Humanities and British Pop Culture (3 credits, Professor Kerry Soper). It meets the GE Letters requirement and counts towards interdisciplinary humanities. IHUM 202: Western Civilization II (3 credits, Professor Kerry Soper). Ge Civ meets the requirement. UNIV Soc 218R: Religion and politics in a global city (3 credits, Alan Phillips). All accepted students living within 90 minutes of Provo must also register for IAS 201R (1 credit), a required pre-departure preparation course taught by professors Soper and Ward during the second block of the Winter 2021 semester. COST \$10,400 to 10,900 (final amount depends in part on US/UK exchange rates 2021) Program cost estimate includes full-time LDS university tuition (costs higher for graduates and non-LDS students); in the centre; breakfast and dinner most days except Saturday; access to programmes, museums and historical sites; intra-London transport; travel, accommodation, and most breakfast and dinner program trips to the UK and international health insurance coverage. Part-time BYU and non-BYU students will have to pay an additional \$250 for the 2021 winter preparation course. Does not include: airfare London, meals on Saturdays, passport fees, and personal expenses. TRAVEL Students are responsible for purchasing their own airfare and program sites. Students should contact byu travel agency: BYU Travel | 801-422-6293 | travel@byu.edu | 280 HRCB funding sources for BYU tuition scholarships, Pell grants, and federally insured student loans can be applied to study foreign programs. BYU students are strongly encouraged to ask for experience education through funding for their home class and/or college and the ORCA program. Those who complete the financial aid section of the ISP application and submit a current FAFSA form to byu financial support agency (A-41 ASB) should also consider the need-based study for foreign scholarships. Students can also receive private scholarships and scholarships, including kennedy.byu.edu/scholarships-nal listed online. APPLICATION PROCESS Students must be adults 18 years of age or older. While the London Centre programs primarily serve students at BYU, students at other universities who are committed to rigorous academic experience and adherence to BYU's Honor Code are also invited to apply. Interested students can contact the faculty's principals at any time. Apps are available online kennedy.byu.edu/apply. Although the final application deadline is February 1, 2021, the directors will continue to interview candidates and will hire strong candidates at the end of 2020. Therefore, their submission to polished, scientifically focused applications improves their chances of acknowledging that we are likely to prove a very selective program. Dr. Peter Ward is an associate professor of experience in design and management at the BYU Marriott School that has directed five foreign study programs and research trips to Europe, Iceland and Uganda. His research focuses on how to conceptually, implement and evaluate experiences. It particularly enjoys customer journey ratings and works to improve the consumer experience at critical touch points. This summer at the BYU London Centre we will study how stories, memories, and lectures will help you make up the taper of Britain's identity. Together, we will assess England's political, economic, social and religious history, as well as the wider British Empire - from anti-ancient times to the present, focusing on remembrance and commemoration as political and cultural phenomena. We will think critically about how communities, individuals and websites use performance and commemoration to create artistic, cultural and historical meaning. You can also treat the city of London as a unique performative space capable of rendering meaning when placed in the broader context of history and expressions of culture. In addition to meeting london's traditional performance and performance spaces, which the city is well known for, students also come across examples of performativity as they explore the city's parks and green spaces, markets and restaurants, religious and government buildings, and other cultural sites. Our studies will also take us from London to Coventry, Stratford-Upon-Avon, and Wales, followed by York, the Lake District, and Edinburgh. 22 June-9 August 2021 house and food students live and take classes at the London Centre in the vibrant, comfortable west end neighbourhood of Bayswater. The centre offers free laundry facilities, a library, a lounge and Wi-Fi access. DINING AT THE LONDON CENTRE All dinners and breakfasts are prepared and served communally at the London Centre. Students should help with food preparation and cleaning. Due to the communal nature of the food, the BYU London Centre is unable to meet all specific nutritional needs and provide a safe environment for people with food allergies. Please note that students outside the microwave do not have individual cooking access in the centre and cannot bring their own small appliances or prepare meals for themselves. If you have dietary or allergy concerns, we recommend that you speak to the Office of International Study Programmes or program managers before applying. COURSES Students ensted in 6 credits, which meet different GE and higher/lower requirements, or are considered general classes towards graduation. The courses will be classroom. All students have the same courses: Univ 214R: Performance and city. This survey or introductory approach questions the arts. Topics may include, but are not limited to, music, dance, fine art, design, film, interdisciplinary humanities, or field studies. This course meets the GE Arts Requirement. EUROP 336R. Basic course in social sciences. In the summer of 2021, students will assess the political, economic, social and religious history of England, Scotland, Wales and Ireland, as well as the wider British Empire, from anti-ancient times to the present day, focusing on memory and commemoration as political and cultural phenomena. Participants are not allowed to participate in other courses in this program, including BYU Online courses, without the approval of the Program Manager and the ISP. All accepted students living in Provo within 90 minutes must also register for IAS 201R (1 credit), a pre-departure preparatory course to be taught by Professors Jensen and Hodson in the second phase of the 2020 winter semester. COST \$5,400-5,900 (the final amount depends in part on the US and UK exchange rates for 2021) The programme's cost estimate includes full-time Latter-day Saint university tuition (higher costs for graduate and non-Latter-day Saint students); in the centre; breakfast and dinner every day except Saturday; access to programmes, museums and historical sites; intra-London transport; travel, accommodation and meals on excursions; and international health insurance coverage. Part-time BYU and non-BYU students will have to pay an additional \$300 for the 2020 winter preparation course. Not included: airfare/from London, meals on Saturdays, passport fees, and personal expenses. TRAVEL Students are responsible for purchasing their own airfare and program. Flight bookings must be booked through BYU Travel.
