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Screenshot: David Murphy/iOS/Android: Second everyone started talking about this crazy new smartphone feature called Augmented Reality, I thought two things: Most AR apps and games will be gimmicky AF, and I sure hope someone makes a great measurement of the app because I keep my tape wrong. Apple and Google have their own measurement apps for iOS and Android, respectively. The first arrived courtesy of iOS 12 public beta, and the second launched for all ARCore compatible devices a week ago. Sure, most people probably only have one smartphone, so the choice was made for you, but I'm still curious: How does each app measure up? I have both the iPhone 8 Plus and the Pixel 2, so I thought I'd take everyone on a short journey through my house to see how accurate they are when measuring everyday objects. While I'm not going to toss my tape measure into the trash just yet, there are definitely times when it's more convenient to use an app to measure an item or at least get a decent idea of how big it can be. Update (6/30): Just a quick moment of clarification. I'm trying to get as close as possible with each dimension, knowing completely well that each app can be a little fussy about the end points. Apple can snap on the edge of something that doesn't really edge, while Google measuring the dots you're dragging have this strange flicker effect underneath, making it tricky to be incredibly accurate. Not to mention that each app does airplane detection differently, which can reset it all. Generally speaking, both apps do a decent job of evaluating measurements, and Apple is a little more accurate if nothing else, than it's easier to navigate and press the measuring point than dragging awkward sliders around that I discuss in the conclusion of the article. Round 1: A Drinking Glass/Every writer needs a good glass of drinking on his desk, whether it's your water preferences or something a little more fun to get you through the 2,000-word daily quota. I'm not going to go into how each app uses ARCore or ARKit to analyze the real world and discern how big or small things are, because we'll be here all day. Instead, let's go straight to the measurements: Apple Measure app (3.5 inches) Google Mera App (3.5 inches)Final results: 3.5 inches! Not bad! Both Apple and Google were in place from the height of the drinking glass. I thought they might have a few issues given the reflective surface of the glass sitting on and the transparency of the glass itself, but they both nailed it. Ten points to each house. Round 2: Tape Measure/If the app can't measure roulette correctly, particularly the five inches worth of tape measure- we have a problem. Apple Measure app (5 inches) Google Measure app (5 inches) Another tie! We are on a roll. Apple and Google. Ten more points for both as I begin to ponder how long it may take to create a second Triwizard Cup. Round 3: Pua Pig/While I'm not sure how often I need specific measurements for Pua, the loving pig from the Moana movie, it never hurts to have this information in my back pocket. We look at the length and height this time (not the width as Pua is sensitive to such things). Apple Measure app (10.5 inches) Google Measure app (11.5 inches)The actual length of Pua: 10 inches (meow to muzzle) Apple Measure app (8.5 inches) Google Mera app (8 inches)The actual height of Pua: the 8 inchApple Measure app was generally closer in its measurements than Google, due to a fairly large number of google app tacked further to the length of the Pua. However, the Google app nailed the height perfectly, while the Apple app has never had any measurements on the nose. While Pua is neither a horse nor a hand grenade, I could go with Apple on this, simply because the semi-residency is a much more forgiving distance than an inch and a half. Round 4: The Mirror/So bathroom, this one is a bit unfair because I had a pretty strong suspicion that the way ARCore tracks airplanes would make it impossible to get a reading from a mirror attached to the wall. Apple wins by default on this only for being able to take measurements (in a dirty space no less), but how accurate was its digital assumption? Apple Measure app (27.5 inches)Actual mirror measurement: 29 inches Google measurement: 0, but I got a lot of exercise swinging my arm around to try to get the app configured. While the Apple Measure app isn't exactly a nail-height mirror, the 1.5-inch difference is at least good enough to ballparking it with an object of this size - just five percent of its total height. While I might not use the measure if you need to make an exact fit for new home decorations, it's at least good enough to give you a rough idea of how big the object is. Round 5: Giant picture Of Me/Don't ask. Well, well, you might ask. It hung in the lobby when I starred in one of the best musicals ever, Forever Plaid. He's sitting on my floor behind the door, not hanging on the wall, because with the giant picture I'm looking at, I'd feel a little weird. Don't you? According to the Apple Measure app, I'm 25 inches by 32 inches. Google, which hates putting things in inches seems to have me 26 inches across... The final result? 24 inches across... Both applications came within inches of actual horizontal and vertical measurements for this great photo. The Apple app was a little more accurate because of its stronger horizontal measurement (per inch). Again, I'd use either app to get a general idea of Great object, but not the picture is perfect, needs to form exactly in this measurement space. Round 6: Banana/Because all this dimension made me starve. Apple Measure 7 inch Google Measure app: 7.5 actual banana size: 7 inches I mean, I wouldn't mind an extra half a ton of banana to eat, but Apple nailed the measurements on this. Update (6/30): As stated in the comments below though, google's point measurement app appears smidge from the points the apple app measures. This may well explain the ponchai difference, but overall, the banana is much closer to seven inches in length (as measured) than 7.5 inches in length, so I think Apple still wins the day. (Anyway, Apple's measurement is smidge short compared to what I actually measured with measuring tape.) However, half an inch is half an inch, and the Google app does note the ponchum variance possible, so there you go. Generally speaking, both apps were nearly enough on the banana contest that it really isn't a factor in my overall conclusion. I just wanted to make sure that either app doesn't go crazy and say I had a foot-long banana or anything like that. Round 7: Imagine IKEA Furniture Assuming you want to ignore my advice and use your smartphone instead of a ruler or tape measure for important purchases like furniture that should fit in a certain place, how accurate is each app? Will you even be able to get your FURRLSV through the front door? Apple Measure app: 49 inches long, 23 inches tall Google Measure app: 50 inches long ... Again, no app was measuring perfectly. Apple was two inches long and one inch in height, and Google was three inches long and one inch in height. This test also reminded me of the importance of making sure that your measurement application is now reasonable. When I first tried measuring the shoe rack, the Apple app quoted a height of more than four feet in height - a bit of an excess. However, I realized that I use the app by hanging out on the shoe rack at an angle, which is not an ideal position if you need the height of the object. Augmented reality apps are smart, but even sometimes they get confused. As soon as I moved my smartphone to shoot the shoe rack right on, the Apple numbers were a lot more accurate (but not perfect, of course). Winner: Apple Measure App in general had a better experience with the Apple Measurement app than the Google Measure app because of the slightly better accuracy of the first and, more importantly, ease of use. Swinging your smartphone around a bit allowed Apple's app to pick up its planes pretty quickly, and the interface is much faster to work: just point the target at what you want to measure, tap, and move the smartphone while the target is at the end point and then click. Boom. Measurement. The Google app requires you to drag around the markers and it takes too long. Apple was also better about the auto your goal goal like that. However, both apps will probably have a lot of improvements in the future, so we'll see how each pan is over the next year or so. These measurement apps, after all, are ideal cases of use for augmented reality- the kinds of applications that everyone with a smartphone will use on a regular basis. At least I think I'll get a lot more benefit from a virtual ruler than a dinosaur that yells at me in my bathroom or an augmented reality infusion game that I could just play in real life.
