It also has the support of remote access protocols such as FTP, and you can even use it as a root file manager. Even for advanced users, it packs a punch. On top of that, it's also great. Of course, most of the same features are in Solid Explorer for \$1 less. FX File Explorer is also a great option for users who like to design an ES Explorer file but don't want to be junk.
