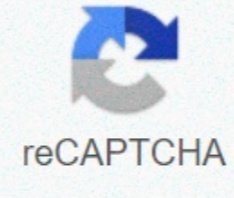

How to cite the constitution apa 7th edition

by Chelsea Lee We the People of the United States, in order to form a more perfect Union...— Constitution of the United States, PMBL. Those immortal words open up the Constitution of the United States. But how to quote it in an APA-style document? The answer is in the Bluebook - no, not that cheerful publication manual of the 6th edition covered in blue, but The Bluebook: A Uniform System of Citation (18th ed., 2005; www.legalbluebook.com). The Bluebook sets the standard for all legal subpoenas, and the style for legal citations you see in the Publication Manual (see Appendix 7.1: References to Legal Materials, pp. 216-224) comes directly from the Bluebook. Although the publication manual includes a variety of examples of legal citation (cases, statutes, bills, and more), citing constitutions is not among them. So, before continuing, keep in mind that if you need more guidance on legal citations, you should consult the Bluebook or your friendly local law librarian directly. First, if you just want to make a passenger reference to the U.S. Constitution in an APA-style document, you can mention it in the text without a reference list entry. Law students described a great affinity for the U.S. Constitution in their response documents. However, if you're using a part of the U.S. Constitution as evidence to support a point you're making in your document, you should build the citation using Bluebook Rule 11, which covers federal and state constitutions. All citations of the U.S. Constitution begin with U.S. Const., followed by article, edit, section, and/or clause numbers as relevant. The terms article, amendment, section and clause are always abbreviated art., amend., § cl., respectively. The preamble is abbreviated pmbl. The article and edit numbers are given in Roman numerals (I, II, III); section and clause numbers are given in Arabic numerals (1, 2, 3). The Bluebook states that for some parts of the Constitution currently in force, they do not include a date. If you refer to a part of the Constitution that has been repealed or amended, include the year in which the part in question was repealed or amended in parentheses. Using rule 11, here are the sample entries for the text citation and reference list. Note how similar they are: in the text: the founding fathers have faced the process by which the new states can join the union (U.S. Const. art. IV, § 3). Reference list: U.S. Const. Art. In the text: Women obtained the right to vote in 1920 (U.S. Const. amend. Reference list: U.S. Const. Amend. In the text: During prohibition, the sale of liquor was made illegal (U.S. Const. amend. 18th in 1933). Reference list: U.S. Const. Thank you for giving us the Constitution! To quote an entire federal or state constitution, a subpoena is not required. Just refer to the Constitution in the text. The U.S. Constitution has 26 to 26 The Massachusetts Constitution was ratified in 1780. Create reference list items and text citations for quotes to articles and constitutional changes. In the reference list and quotes in parentheses, shorten the U.S. Constitution to U.S. Const. and use the legal state abbreviation for a state constitution (e.g. Md. Const. for the Maryland Constitution; see a list of state abbreviations for legal references to the Legal Information Institute in . In the narrative, he uses the United States or the United States for the U.S. Constitution, and explains the state's name for a state constitution - for example, the Wisconsin Constitution. The numbers of articles and amendments to the U.S. Constitution are Roman numerals. The numbers of articles in the state constitution are also Roman numerals, but the numbers of the amendments to the state constitution are Arabic numerals. URLs are not required for the reference. Capitalize on all major words in the title of the act. After the title of the act, add a comma. Source: Minn. Then, add the official source for state statutes. For Minnesota, it's the Minnesota Statutes. Use the official abbreviation, which is Minn. Stat. Keep in mind that there is a period after each abbreviation and there is a gap between each abbreviation. Section number: § 321.0101-1208 Next, add the section number of the articles of association. Before the section number, add the section symbol (§). Next, add the number of the first section, a hyphen, and the last section number. Do not add a period after section numbers. NOTE: You can find the symbol for section numbers in Word by following these steps: click the Insert tab, click Symbol, click More Symbols, and then click Special Characters. Year: (2001 & rev. 2004). Next, add the year in which the statute was codified in the state statutes. This statute was first codified in 2001. It was revised in 2004. After the date the statute was first codified, add an e commercial (&), then the abbreviation for magazine (rev.), and then the date on which it was revised. URL: the reference with the Web address (URL) where the deed can be found. For most course documents, you want to remove the hyperlink from the URL. Also, don't add a period after the URL. NOTE: Check instructor preferences for live hyperlinks. In general, if assignment is an online assignment (for example, whiteboard discussion, web page, etc.), so keep your hyperlinks live. If the assignment is a document, remove the hyperlinks. Add a period after each initial. Separate each author with a comma. Insert an ampersand (&) before the last author. Parenthetical & narrative quotes For one or two authors, list all authors in the reference. For three or more authors, list the first author followed by et al. Url Official federal regulations are published in the Code of Federal Regulations - Code of Federal Regulations (annual edition) or in the Electronic Code of Federal Regulations. In the reference, provide the title or number of the regulation, the volume number in which the regulation appears in the Code of Federal Regulations, C.F.R., the section number and the year in which the regulation was codified. If the regulation is available online, provide the URL. Federal regulation, codified codified of Human Subjects, 45 C.F.R. § 46 (2020). Parentetic Citation: (Protection of Human Subjects, 2020) Narrative Quote: Protection of Human Subjects (2020) Federal Regulation, not yet codified If the regulation has not yet been codified in the Code of Federal Regulations, it will first appear in the Federal Register. Indicate this with the abbreviation F.R. instead of C.F.R. Also include the section of the code of federal regulations in which the proposed rule will be codified. Model: Title or Number, Volume F.R.
