The Cold War has made American citizens constantly aware of the possibility of an attack, and every presidential administration has introduced new kinds of urgency. President John F. Kennedy, for example, called on Congress to provide more than \$100 million to build public fallout shelters, and when he advised Americans to build their own bomb shelters, millions of families followed suit. But easing tensions between the two superpowers at the turn of the century seemed to erase the possibility of nuclear annihilation. But if you look at the news these days, you might think we're on the brink of another nuclear arms race. But what if you don't have the money to have someone build a bomb shelter for you? Or, what if you don't have time? If you get a sudden warning or attack, and there is no shelter nearby, is there anything you can do to protect yourself and others around you? In this article, we will look at how a rain shelter increases the chances of survival during a nuclear attack. The purpose of the fallout shelter is, of course, to protect people inside from the harmful effects of radiation. As with sunscreen bottles, there is a special number that describes how much protection the substance provides from sunlight - SPF or Sun Protection Factor - anti-drop shelters have their own number. It's just called protection factor (PF). The SPF number refers to how much time you can spend in the sun before burning. The PF number for a rain shelter, though, provides a link between the amount of radiation an unprotected person will experience compared to the amount that could be received in the shelter. For example, sheltering with PF 5 would expose residents to about 20 percent of the amount of radiation they would receive if they were outside - not a very safe number. According to the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) Standards brochure for Fallout Shelters, fallout shelter is any room, structure or space designated as such and providing its residents with protection with a minimum protection factor (PF) of 40 with precipitation radiation as a result of a nuclear explosion [source: SurvivalRing]. This means that people inside will receive a uniform (or 2.5 percent) amount of radiation they would receive if they were outside after a nuclear explosion, which is much safer than PF 5. There are also two types of rain shelters. The first is a private rain shelter, built or purchased by a person or family. These types can be converted basements under a person's house, underground shelters built in a yard or shelters built away from a person's home. The second type is a public fallout shelter, described by FEMA as any place intended for use by the general public or accessible to the general public. Fallout shelters, which are part of a private residence and are intended for private use, are not included [source: SurvivalRing]. Public shelter can be any kind of public building, including hospitals, schools and police stations. All public fallout shelters are marked with a sign for rain shelters, which is a circle with three triangles upside down inside (as you can see in the first photo in this Public shelters usually have enough space to carry at least 50 people, but they can be large enough to provide protection to hundreds. FEMA requires at least 10 square feet per passenger, as well as at least 6.5 feet of head space. Most government manuals recommend staying in a rain shelter for about two weeks. Although the time it takes for radiation to disappear, from a few days to two weeks, most people have a better safe than sorry stance on the matter. Most of them are equipped with radiation detection devices and battery-powered radios to keep you up to date. So what do people need in a fallout shelter? Although we are accustomed to eating regularly, storing a large amount of food in a rain shelter is not the biggest problem. People can survive quite easily for two weeks without much food, but this water is important if people stay underground for a long time. FEMA suggests at least 3.5 gallons of drinking water per person to last two weeks. To find out what is necessary to build your own improvised bomb shelter, read the next page. If a nuclear attack takes place far away and you are not close to a private or public shelter, it is possible to build your own. One type of fallout shelter that can be easily made by a typical family in a short time is a ditch-covered field. It's just a hole in the ground covered with a roof of poles and a mound of earth. In the event of a nuclear attack, this general item checklist would greatly facilitate the construction of such fallout shelters. Tools - You need shovels to dig the ground, pickaxes for hard ground, saw or axe to cut poles and knives. Other useful items include cans, buckets, pots and pans, which can be used to carry the ground and eventually to store water; measuring tapes to measure the length, width and depth of the shelter; flashlights, ropes, hammers, pliers, work gloves and medical kits. Rain material - Everything, including shower curtains, tablecloths, mattress covers and canvas will work. Water - Fifteen gallons of drinking water is recommended to last people inside the shelter for as long as possible. You may need to stay in a fallout shelter up to two weeks after a nuclear attack, so enough water will guarantee survival. Domestic air ventilation - Since our bodies secrete water steam, the inside of the rain shelter would quickly become unbearably hot without proper ventilation. This page contains instructions on how to build a kearny air pump (KAP), a simple but effective way to circulate air while allowing minimal, safe amounts of radiation to the shelter. To begin, you need to put the contours of the trench from the shafts of wood. The shelter should be at least 50 metres from large buildings, as nuclear explosions can cause far-reaching storms and damage to well below zero. After deciding on the right dimensions, start digging from the ground and cut the poles to the right length. The columns are placed across the ditch, and their ends should stretch at least two feet behind the edges. Cover any cracks between logs with a cloth or anything that will stop dirt from falling into the shelter. Two 6-foot poles, one placed on top of the other and secured with a rope, can be placed in front of the entrance so that no flooded dirt spills. One layer of earth, about one and a half feet deep, should go on top of the poles. The waterproofing material mentioned above goes on top of this first layer, and at the end another and a half of the earth is placed on top.
