When Spain began to colonize the region, it introduced livestock, which later increased the region's wealth. In the early 18th century, the Spanish founded Montevideo as a military outpost. Throughout the 19th century, Uruguay was involved in many conflicts with the British, Spanish and Portuguese. In 1811, José Gervasio Artigas launched a revolution against Spain and became the country's national hero. In 1821, Portugal annexed the region to Brazil, but in 1825, after several revolutions, it declared its independence from Brazil. However, it decided to maintain a regional union with Argentina. In 1828, after a three-year war with Brazil, the Treaty of Montevideo declared Uruguay an independent state. In 1830, the new state adopted its first constitution and throughout the rest of the 19th century, uruguay's economy and government had different transformations. In addition, migration, mainly from Europe, has increased. From 1903 to 1907 and 1911 to 1915, President José Patel e Ordonez established political, social and economic reforms, yet by 1966, Uruguay was experiencing instability in these regions and was subject to constitutional amendment. A new constitution was adopted in 1967 and by 1973, a military system was established to administer the government. This led to human rights violations and, in 1980, the military government was overthrown. In 1984, national elections were held and the country once again began to improve politically, economically and socially.
