If you need to add text to the video, AndroVid has the tool to do so. Once you have chosen the tool, all you do is type in the text and then use your finger to determine where the screen it appears. You can customize the size and color of the text, but there is no way to create or import full-screen graphics, and there is no animation or transitions. AndroVid has a decent range of filter effects in one touch for video. Some are limited to only the \$2 Pro version of the program, but the vast majority work in the free version.
