Outside Russia, it is still designated as a disputed area. The notion that maps provide an objective or scientific image of the world is a common myth. The graphic nature of maps simplifies reality by giving producers and users a sense of power without social or environmental responsibility. Details such as the coloring of areas or different sizes in the printing press can have big political consequences. For example, when city names are omitted from a map, it may mean that the area is not of interest, and the addition of names, details, and other information indicates that this is an area of importance. Maps were needed for ships to navigate the oceans, and they legitimized the conquest of territories. Sometimes simply displaying the newly found territory was enough to conquer it, without having to come ashore or have any knowledge of the indigenous population and history. Maps simplify reality by giving producers and users a sense of power without social and environmental responsibility. Even the fact that we are putting north on top of the map is the result of the economic domination of Western Europe after 1500. The map has no privileged direction in space. After all, the Earth has neither up nor down, and there is no geographical center. The best way to depict the world is by showing a globe, but since the sphere can never show the whole world, translations to a flat surface are necessary. How the sphere is translated onto a flat surface is called projection. There is no such thing as the best or most accurate projection, since no curved surface can be projected without distortion. But some cards are better than others. Here are some of the most striking examples: Mercator's projection, Gerard Mercator, 1569. Ruben Pater's Worst ChoiceThe Mercator map is a monster that just won't go away. It was probably used in your geography class, and it's a standard projection for Google, Bing and Apple Maps. The Mercator map was mapped in 1569 by the cartographer Gerard Mercator for maritime purposes, using the directions of the compass as direct lines. This extends to the north and south poles up, resulting in what Africa and South America seem too small. Australia looks smaller than Greenland, in fact more than three times as much. The Mercator map gives us a 16th-century worldview because it shows Europe more and colonized countries less. Arnaud Arnaud criticized him in 1973, saying: It overestimates the white man and distorts the picture of the world in favor of the colonial masters of the time. You should not use the Mercator card if you have no other choice. The projection of Winkel Tripel, Oswald Winkel, 1921.Ruben Pater Map of the World is a projection of three-dimensional space on a flat plane. They distort the distance, direction or size of the area, and cartographers must choose which ones find the most important. Some maps are better for the direction of the compass, and some show a more accurate area size. Winkel Tripel is a world map created in 1921 by the German cartographer Oswald Winkel, who tried to minimize the distortion of all three properties, hence the name Winkel Tripel (or Winkel III). This was rather unclear until 1996, when the National Geographic Society announced that Winkel Tripel should have been the preferred forecast. Since then, many school textbooks and educational institutions have followed suit. Winkel Tripel still has some distortion at the north and south poles, but it does better than many others. For an accurate image of the world, the Winkel Tripel projection is a safe choice. Gall-Peters Projection, James Gall and Arnaud Peters, 1973.Ruben Pater The most politically correct map When German director Arnaud Peters criticized the Mercator map in 1973 for being colonial, he also presented an alternative. Its solution was to provide an equal representation of areas, so it could be used to compare the size of continents and countries. It turned out James Gall did the same in 1855, and the map became known as the Gall Peters Map. Each area on the map represents an equal area of land. This may seem strange to those accustomed to the Mercator map, where Africa and South America are always depicted too small. The Gall Peters map is considered one of the best maps in the world. The United Nations promotes it as a standard and is used in British schools. Its only drawback is that it distorts the shape of continents to make areas equal. The Arctic seems too flat and the equator too high. If you want a card that represents an equal sized area, this card is a politically correct choice. Dymaxion Projection, Buckminster Fuller, 1943.Ruben Pater Best Design (If Still Flawed) MapWhy make the world maps always collide north? Why do they need a certain continent in the center? It is a choice that is subject to cultural biases, and they are a sad consequence of the cartography of the profession. That is why in 1943 the designer and inventor Buckminster Fuller developed a map of the world without the top or bottom, left or right: the map Dymaxion. Dividing the map into 20 triangles, it can be folded into a sphere similar to an icosahedra. So the map it would be considered the user's preferred method, not just the way the cartographer intended. His only downside is that Fuller wasn't a cartographer. By Po Po Different longitude and latitude on each triangle direction are seriously flawed, and the areas above the multiple triangles are distorted. The Dymaxion map may not be very useful for serious cartography, but it shows that all continents are interconnected and offers a vision of a post-nationalist world. The mental map is their own internal map of their famous world. Geographers love to learn about people's mental maps and how they order the space around them. This can be investigated by asking for directions to a landmark or other location, asking someone to draw a sketch of a map of the area or describing the area, or asking the person to name as many places (i.e. states) as possible in a short period of time. It's pretty interesting what we learn from psychic card groups. In many studies, we have seen that the maps of lower socio-economic groups cover smaller geographic areas than the mental maps of rich people. For example, residents of low-income Los Angeles neighborhoods know about upscale metropolitan areas such as Beverly Hills and Santa Monica, but don't really know how to get there or where they're exactly located. They believe that these areas are in a certain direction and lie between other known areas. By asking people for directions, geographers can determine which landmarks are built into the group's mental maps. Many studies of students have been conducted around the world to determine their perception of their country or region. In the United States, when students are asked to rank the best places to live or the place they most want to move to, California and southern Florida consistently occupy a very high place. Conversely, states such as Mississippi, Alabama and the Dakota Access Pipeline are low on the mental cards of students who do not live in those regions.
