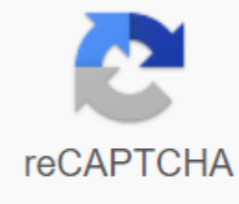

Read the moreSamsung Galaxy Tab SeriesAvailable in 7 inches, 8.9 inches, and 10.1 inch models on all four major U.S. operators and as the only Wi-Fi model, the Samsung Galaxy Tab Series is one of the most recognizable and iconic Android tablets on the market. Most models run Android Honeycomb, and can pull debt as a media tablet, performance tool, or ereader. All models come with and run Adobe Flash, have access to the Android Market, and models with 3G data plans offer 3G or 4G wireless access on your tablet while you're on the go.
