Columbia county dump stoppers

FEES: In November, the District of Columbia Board of Supervisors passed a resolution imposing a recycling fee to offset the cost of handling recyclable materials brought into The District-owned Solid Waste Stations. Residents will need to purchase an annual recycling permit, if you use County facilities. THIS IS ONLY FOR RESIDENTS USING THE COUNTY'S SOLID WASTE STATIONS. This does not affect anyone with a pick-up curb. This is an annual recycling license and will be valid for the entire calendar year regardless of when it is purchased. Therefore, if you purchase this license in March 2019, it will still expire on December 31, 2019. Each year the County continues this program, residents will have to purchase permits. The permit fee structure is as follows: Residents of the District of Columbia with proof of residence \$50.00 per household Residents over the age of 65 with proof of \$35.00 per out of County Residents household \$100.00 per household You will receive two stickers for each recycling license placed on your vehicle(s) visible to station employees. Also included, there will be a material recycling protocol that will be accepted at the station from your household. Permits are available at all District of Columbia Solid Waste Stations and the following Clerks: Please note that as the recycling industry recovers and changes, the District of Columbia will change protocol accordingly. Over the next few years, we will work hard to educate the public about the changes, so please work with our flight crew during this transition as this is affecting all of the U.S., not only Columbia County.Thank you for your cooperation and patience in the process and please contact our office if you have any questions. The station transfer policy takes effect in September 2020 Mandatory recycling as of January 11, 89A recycling permits are required for the release of recyclable materials at stations owned by the District. The fee is \$50.00 per year for residents under the age of 65. \$35.00 for county residents. You can also pay a one-time fee of \$5.00 or \$100.00 per tonne on the scale at Greenport Transfer Station.RECYCLABLES: Tin and aluminum food and drink cans, plastic bottles, jars, bathtubs or #1 jars, 2 & 5. Glass bottles (green, transparent, brown containers) and sterile (milk containers and plastic coated juices). Make sure your recycling is free from any exterior packaging and lids/lids. Do not flatten your tin and aluminum cans. Do not include anti-freeze bottles or engine oils, since they can not be recycled - they should be placed together with your garbage. PAPER PRODUCTS: All recyclable paper products can be mixed together. These items include newspapers, cardboard boxes, magazines, spam, office paper, hand bags and phonebooks. Boxboards such as cereals, tissues and shoe boxes are also accepted. This material should be kept separately, placed in a brown bag or attached to the twine. All commingled paper should be placed in a brown paper bag or kept loose. BRUSH/TREE LIMBS: Accepted only at GREENPORT Transfer Station. The limbs must not be longer than 4 feet and 4 inches in diameter. Grass and leaves are also accepted all year round. A \$25/ton charge for brush handling takes effect July 9, 2012. There will be a minimum fee of \$2.00. E-WASTE: Free of charge at Greenport Transfer Station. WE DO NOT ACCEPT FOAM OR WRAPPING PAPER: It is considered household waste and will be charged accordingly. BUILDING & DESTROYING DEBRIS: Small numbers are accepted at Livingston, Chatham & Kinderhook Stations only. A large amount must be taken to Greenport Transfer Station. Please contact the station or solid waste management office at 518-828-2737 for more information regarding the charge. The current price per tonne is \$140.00. NO HAZARDOUS WASTE: Please contact our office for appropriate treatment. ROLLING CONTAINERS AVAILABLE: Please contact 518-828-2737. MINIMUM SCALE: There will be a minimum of \$10.00 for scale use for all municipal solid waste and construction and destruction of debris. The District of Columbia participates in a system of user fees at our solid waste facilities. This program attaches a value to the garbage that we bring to the station. Household waste disposal residents must purchase official District of Columbia garbage bags to treat their waste at solid waste stations. These bags can be purchased at any of our stations by check or money order, paid to the Treasurer of the District of Columbia. ** Official District of Columbia bags and punch cards will no longer be sold at the DPW Administrative Office located at 401 State Street, Hudson, NY.** THE FEE APPLIES TO THE PROCESSING OF THE FOLLOWING DOCUMENTS: COUNTY GARBAGE BAGS REQUIRED FOR PACKAGING WASTE. This decision is based on the volume of brushes currently accepted at the station and the charges associated with the proper processing and grinding of this material. Unfortunately, the County will no longer be able to accept free yard waste. According to the New York Department of Environmental Conservation, we are required to meet certain criteria. To meet these requirements, a fee needs to be applied to help offset the increasing costs of operating this website. This processing rate can be paid by personal check, punch card or money order at the time of processing. If you currently have a commercial account with our administrative office, any related charges will apply to your monthly invoice. Anything wired is accepted including mobile phones, computers, CRT*, electronic game consoles, fax machines, laptops, LCD monitors, office equipment, printers, scanners, phones, rechargeable batteries, routers, servers and TVs* (*Charged.) Type 1 and 2 plastics are the most commonly used and easiest to recycle. Some types 3, 5 and 7 are recyclable but most do not. Recycling symbols are used to show that they can be recycled if the market is available. Currently, the District of Columbia only accepts type 1 and 2 because our processors do not collect higher quantities at this time. What is the difference in plastics? The following chart shows the most common plastics and some common uses. #1 & #2: Bottles, clean food containers and bottles without residues, bottles and personal hygiene containers and non-corrosive cleaning bottles and containers. The following items are accepted only if they do not have all the residues: seasoning bottles, products, cake containers and salads. The iconic Polyethylene Terephthalate Ethylene PETE material enters fresh water, juice, water, detergents, and cleaner bottles. Also used for cooking and jars of high density Polyethylene High density Polyethylene HDPE peanut butter come into bottles and water, bottles of bleach, detergents and shampoos. Plastic bags and grocery sacks, motor oil bottles, household cleaners and butter baths. Polyvinyl Chloride PVC goes into cleaner windows, cooking oil, and detergent bottles. Also used for jars of peanut butter and water bottles. Low density Polyethylene LDPE goes into plastic bags and grocery sacks, dry cleaning bags and flexible film packaging. Also some bottles. Polypropylene PP goes into caps, plates, syrup bottles, yogurt tubs, straws and film packaging. Polystyrene PS goes into meat trays, egg boxes, plates, cutlery, containers and clear trays. Paper and cardboard are available. Applicable fees (see fee schedule). Computers, laptops and office paper, books, spam, magazines, newspapers, an coated food and snack boxes (inside white), packaging paper, phone books and shredded paper. Chopped paper in place is currently available at the Riverside (Evans) facility. Paper can be dropped off at the William Few facility in our chosen safe bin daily. There are no limits. *Fees are charged. Brown box without wax and without coating (without grease and pollution), food box, cardboard wastes, moving boxes, shipping boxes, shoe boxes, soda and other drink packaging. NO PIZZA DELIVERY BOX! Metal and aluminum aluminum drink cans, washed food cans (labels can be left on) and scrap metal. Aluminum foil and aluminum baking pans are accepted only if they do not have residues. Equipment and tires Anything wired is accepted, including: air conditioner**, dishwasher**, dryer**, freezer**, microwave**, oven**, fridge**, rechargeable battery, stove**, washing machine** and water heater**. ** Shows a charged fee. Paint, gasoline and chemical treatment If you are a business creating this type of waste, you will be required to monitor generation and treatment, and pay very high processing costs to have the material safely removed and recycled (most likely mixed into fuel for industrial furnaces and boilers) or treated in a hazardous waste landfill Harm. However, state and federal law provides for exemptions for residents; you can legally throw this material in the trash. However, the material must be a solid, garbage trucks are not allowed to take liquid waste. For those interested in pursuing a more environmentally friendly remedy, MKC's Doraville Ga. (770-457-1341) is one of the few companies that will accept small amounts of household hazardous waste from individuals, for a small fee. The processes described here basically involve the consolidation of waste for disposal through a normal or evaporation garbage service. With both basic steps below, you want to work outside, and wear rubber gloves and eye protection. Never mix more than one material when you are preparing items for processing. Donate: Before you throw away a full can of paint, think about the less fortunate. Habitat for Humanity Restore is located at 1004 Walton Way Augusta, GA 30909 will accept the paint cans. Call (706) 364-7637 for details on activity and donations. Consolidation: The idea here is to make solid liquids. Sawdust or newspaper crumbs will work, but for any real quantity you will want to get some kitty garbage, cheaper at auto parts stores; requires dry oil. Double-line a trash can with plastic garbage bags, add some dry oil and then some liquid waste. Work outside, away from the access of children or animals. When the material is strengthened, tie the bag and then it can go into the usual trash can. Be sure not to get bags so heavy that you can't handle it, or that it breaks. Evaporation: Work outside, away from the reach of children and animals. If there is only one amount of fuel in the container, only start and let it evaporate. If you have more than one a little, you will want to speed up the process. Get some kind of disposable metal tray (an aluminum foil roasting pan is ideal) and pour half an inch of fuel into the tray. The increased surface area will allow the fuel to evaporate much faster. Repeat this process until the fuel disappears, and then recycle or reuse the containers if possible. Foil trays can be recycled with scrap aluminum; if you are leery there are fuel coated leaves around your house until you can recycle it then waste onto the tray, wrap it in a few layers of newspaper and put it in a powerful plastic garbage bag. Then it can be processed in your regular household trash. To properly treat household chemicals, uns usable paints, automotive chemicals, etc. contact Environmental Alternatives at 706-737-8433. Fees apply. Columbia County Tire Recycling Centers will NO longer accept tires for recycling purposes. Mark Yount's Tire Pros will accept tires for recycling for a fee. Their contact information is 706-868-7770. District of Columbia Recycling Centers will NO longer accept batteries for recycling purposes. Battery Plus accepts the following batteries: Lead Acid Batteries (Pb) - Cars, Trucks and Emergency Lighting Nickel Cadmium Batteries (NiCd) - Wireless Phones, Tools and Two-Way Radio Nickel Metal Hydride Batteries (NiMH) - Video Cameras, Lithium Ion (Li Ion) & Lithium Polymer (Li Poly) camera and barcode scanner - Mobile and Laptop Flash bulbs Plus accept the following bulbs (possible fee): Sodium Mercury Vapor Ballasts Compact Fluorescent Light Bulbs What should I do with a CFL when it burns out? The EPA recommends consumers take advantage of local recycling options available for compact fluorescent bulbs. The EPA is working with CFL manufacturers and major U.S. retailers to expand recycling and processing options. Consumers can contact their local city solid waste agency directly, or go to www.epa.gov/bulbrecycling or www.earth911.org to determine local recycling options. If your state or local environmental regulator allows you to put used or broken CFLs in the trash, seal the light bulb in two plastic bags and place it in an external trash can or other protected external location, for the next normal garbage collection. Never send fluorescent bulbs or any other mercury-containing products to the incinerator. If your ENERGY STAR qualified CFL product burns before it should, look at the CFL facility to find the manufacturer's name. Visit the manufacturer's website to find service contact information to ask about a refund or replacement. That's it. ENERGY STAR qualified CLS producers are required to provide a limited warranty of at least two years (including manufacturer defects) for CFLs used at home. In the future, save your receipt to record the purchase date. How should I clean a broken fluorescent bulb? Because CFLs contain small amounts of mercury, the EPA recommends the following cleaning and handling instructions: Before cleaning: Air out of the room Someone and pets leave the room, and do not let anyone walk through the ruptured area on the way out. Open the window and leave the room for 15 minutes or more. Turn off the central forced heating/air conditioning system, if you have one. Clean hard surfaces Carefully scoop pieces of glass and dough with hard paper or cardboard and place them in glass jars with metal caps (such as canned jars) or in sealed plastic bags. Use adhesive tape, such as duct tape, to pick up any remaining small pieces of glass and powder. Wipe the area with a damp paper towel or disposable wet towel. Put the towel in a glass jar or plastic bag. Do not use a vacuum or broom to clean broken bulbs on hard surfaces. Clean carpets or carpets Carefully pick up pieces of glass and place them in glass jars with metal lids (such as canned jars) or in sealed plastic bags. Use adhesive tape, such as duct tape, to pick up any remaining small pieces of glass and powder. If vacuuming is necessary after all visible materials are removed, vacuum the area where the bulb has broken. Remove the vacuum bag (or empty and wipe the box), and place the bag or vacuum debris in a sealed plastic bag. Disposal of cleaning materials Immediately place all outdoor cleaning materials in a trash can or protected area for the next normal garbage collection. Wash your hands after throwing away jars or plastic bags containing cleaning materials. Check with your local or state government about processing requirements in your particular area. Some states do not allow such garbage disposal. Instead, they demanded that bulbs containing broken and uninterrupted mercury be taken to a local recycling centre.
