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Increasingly large communities are designing special police units or officers for family searches. Every facility except Baltimore has a centralized domestic violence investigation unit in the police department. Baltimore, on the other hand, appoints one or two officers in each district as domestic violence specialists. This approach appears to lead to very few differences in the role and experience of appointed officials in the community. Patrol officers who were the first to respond to an incident tended to provide some training on domestic violence. Cases of domestic violence will then be moved to specialized units for further investigation. In Kansas City, for example, an incident response officer notifies the Domestic Violence Unit (which is staffed 24 hours a day) of a domestic violence incident. The investigator will then either go to the scene, meet the victim in the hospital, or take other appropriate measures. In Baltimore, designated officers receive written reports on all domestic violence cases and must monitor the victim either by letter or by telephone. Specialized domestic violence investigations can assist prosecutors in the preparation of cases. Investigators in these units are becoming very aware of the evidence the prosecutor needs and how to work with battered women to obtain this information. However, the progress made in this area does not appear to be limited to specialized units. Several prosecutors noted that police reports on domestic violence had improved throughout the department, which they attributed to increased training and awareness of the issue. Police and prosecutors specializing in domestic violence often form close working relationships because of their routine interactions. This improves communication between agencies and enables them to share information and address problems in a timely manner. San Diego formalized the interaction between the two agencies by holding joint staff meetings for the police and the city attorney's office every two weeks. Czech police have arrested a Russian hacker suspected of involvement in cybercrime in the United States. Czech police working in cooperation with THE FBI arrested A Russian man in a hotel in the center of Prague. He is currently in custody and now faces possible extradition to the United States, depending on what the local court decides, Czech police said in a statement. The arrest came after the US accused the Russian government of hacking U.S. officials and political groups in an attempt to influence this year's election. But a U.S. law enforcement official said the Russian hacker was not involved in the breach of the Democratic National Committee, which was reported earlier this year. On Wednesday, the FBI will only confirm that an unnamed person has been arrested. Due to the ongoing investigation, no further details can be provided at this time, the agency said in an email. Czech police said a Russian national was found travelling in a luxury car with his girlfriend. After his arrest, the man gave no resistance, but immediately lost consciousness and was later hospitalized. Czech police have released a video of his arrest, and his name is reportedly Eugene N, the Associated Press reported. Although the suspect may face extradition to the United States, the Russian government is reportedly insisting that the man be returned to his home country. We are in contact with his lawyer, said Andrei Kolmakov, a spokesman for the Russian embassy, TASS reported. Russia rejects Washington's policy of imposing its extraterritorial jurisdiction on all countries. Russian and Eastern European cybercriminals are being considered as possible culprits of data breaches involving LinkedIn and Yahoo, according to security experts. Ukrainian police on Thursday arrested five people believed to be behind the malware zevs. The operation is part of an ongoing effort to oust a criminal empire that has stolen \$70 million from victims' bank accounts over the past few years. Many of these victims were small businesses or local organizations that ultimately had to cover the costs of fraud. The National Police of Ukraine, the SBU, made the arrests as part of a joint effort with the US Federal Bureau of Investigation, dutch police and the British Metropolitan Police Service. Detainees are key actors responsible for this comprehensive scheme, the FBI said in a statement. Ukrainian SBU agents also issued eight search warrants during the operation, which involved about 50 police officers. It is considered to be the most profitable piece of malware ever and it took a network of operatives to manage the operation. On Tuesday, the Metropolitan Police arrested 20 people, after which additional arrests were made in the United States. Arrests. Both operations dismantled the money mules system used to move funds abroad. The operation, called Trident Breach, was launched in May 2009 after FBI agents in Omaha, Nebraska, launched an investigation into computer fraud that included 46 unauthorized payments to various bank accounts across the country. In the typical theft of zeus, criminals hack into the victim's online bank account and then move the money using the automated clearing system of the banking system (ACH) money transfer system. A ransomware app that blocks computers and asks their owners to pay fines for allegedly breaking multiple laws through their online activity is targeted at U.S. and Canadian users, malware experts from security firm Trend Micro said on Wednesday.The Trend Micro researchers refer to this particular ransomware - malware that disables the functionality of the system and asks for money to recover it - as the Trojan police say. Police Trojan appeared in 2011 and initially targeted users from several Western European countries, including Germany, Spain, France, Austria, Belgium, Italy and the UK rogue message displayed after blocking the victim's computer localized in the victim's language and claims to be from the national law enforcement agency of the country's victim. Owners of locked computers are told their IP addresses were involved in illegal activity and are being asked to pay a fine using prepaid cards such as Ukash or Paysafecard. Malware authors prefer these payment services because transactions made through them cannot be cancelled and are difficult to track. In researching the new Command and Control Servers (C'C) recently used by this malware, Trend Micro researchers discovered message patterns that were developed for users from the U.S. and Canada. This suggests that the scope of the malware has been extended to these two countries. Not only has the list of countries increased, but their goals are now more specific, Trend Micro senior threat researcher David Sancho wrote in a blog post on Wednesday. For example, UKash vouchers are not available in the U.S., thus a fake U.S. police notification that spoofs computer crime and intellectual property of the U.S. Department of Justice only mentions PaySafeCard as an accepted payment method. Fraudulent messages displayed to U.S. users read: This operating system is blocked due to a violation of U.S. federal laws! After the violations were identified: Your IP address was used for websites containing pornography, child pornography, bestiality and child abuse. Your computer also contains video files, elements of violence and child pornography! Spam Spam terrorist motives were also sent from your computer. This computer lock is aimed at stopping your illegal activity. The user is asked to pay a \$100 fine through Paysafecard, and the message is accompanied by the logos of several supermarkets and chain stores, from where you can buy Paysafecard vouchers. Trend Micro researchers have found clues that point to a link between this police trojan and Gamarue, some of the information stolen by malware distributed through attack downloads launched from infected websites and spam messages. There are also signs that C'C software used to control computers infected with this Trojan horse is being resold, which means that several cybercrime gangs can distribute this ransomware. It is becoming abundantly clear that the same Eastern European criminal gangs that were behind the fake antivirus boom are now turning to the Trojan police strategy, Sancho said.
