One of the best things about the smartphone revolution is that we all now have the means to listen to music wherever we find ourselves. Streaming services, curating playlists and automatically created radio stations are changing the way we listen and discover new music. This space is extremely competitive right now and it may only be good for us, but how do you decide what service will provide the soundtrack to your life? We compare some of the best competitors and weigh their pros and cons. SpotifyRod, and quite possibly still the best, is Spotify. With over 20 million songs on offer, a huge range of curated playlists, the ability to create radio stations, a powerful search feature, and some handy additions like scrolling karaoke lyrics, there really isn't anything else as well rounded. If you can tolerate ads, then the free version of Spotify can be used as a desktop client, through a browser, or as an Android app on tablets and smartphones. The limitation with the smartphone app is that you can't play any song whenever you want; You can only shuffle play playlists. It still lets you make a playlist you like, and listen to it on your mobile phone for free, you can even choose a few songs you like, and Spotify fill the rest in. There are no restrictions on tablet or desktop versions, just advertising every five songs or so. For \$10 a month you get a premium service that removes the limit on the selection of specific songs on your mobile phone, gets rid of advertising and allows you to download music for offline listening. Google Play Music All AccessThe main Play Music app lets you download up to 20,000 of your own songs and stream them for free. If you're willing to spend \$10 a month, then you can access more than 18 million songs through the All Access service. Choose whatever you want on any device and play it without any restrictions. You'll also find radio station functionality and smart recommendations. One cool feature on all access is the value of mentioning the ability to select a playlist and consume songs you don't like out of it before you start listening, instead of missing. Sony Music UnlimitedWith more than 22 million songs Sony offers is huge, but there is no free component. For \$10 a month you get free, unlimited access to the library without advertising or restrictions. You'll find curated playlists, engine recommendations, and full playlist support. You can also create or listen to ready-made channels that are very similar to radio stations. He is affiliated with Sony Entertainment So if you have a lot of Sony devices it can represent the easiest choice. On Android, the app is a bit of a weak link compared to some of the competitors. That's not true. Designed or reliable as Spotify.RdioThere over 25 million tracks on Rdio. You can choose individual songs, listen to stations to discover new music, and save everything you like in your collection or playlist. You can also sync music for offline listening. It costs \$10 a month on a mobile phone (there is a 14-day free trial). If you just use it on your desktop browser, then you can enjoy a six month free trial. Free versions of Rdio are currently limited in the US and Australia and they offer ad-supported free listening on desktops and free stations on Android.The remote control feature is the winner on Rdio. If you're playing music on your laptop, you can light up your smartphone app and use your phone as a remote control or easily switch devices. It works both ways and it can be very convenient. DeezerThis is a multi-room service with over 30 million tracks in its library. You can listen to over 30,000 radio stations or create your own, there is full playlist support, unlimited downloads of your own tracks, and engine detection. The free version has advertising and some restrictions that you can remove for \$5 per month. If you want to go Premium and for \$7 a month, then you'll also get the option to download tracks for offline listening and access a number of additional features. Both premium versions allow you to continue to use the service wherever you go, even if you're traveling abroad. The downside of Deezer is the fact that the Android app can be a bit flaky. Slacker RadioSlacker Radio somewhat underestimated the choice in music streaming. It includes over 10 million songs along with a healthy selection of talk radio stations. You can use one of 200 or more curated playlists or create your own as you so want. It also includes not one but three different subscription options. The free version gives you unlimited listening, but a limited pass, no offline play, and you'll have to listen to some ads. For \$3.99 a month you don't get any ads and unlimited passes. For \$9.99 a month you get offline listening and a very Spotify-like ability to play music on demand. The Android app is free to use and it is quite competent when accessing all Slacker features. He's known to have a problem with the crash and buffer. The interface has been updated in the near recent past and it's actually quite functional and enjoyable to use. Slacker is one of the few services to combine music and talk radio services in one so that those who love both forms of entertainment can kill two birds with one stone. Honorable mentionsSongza is a really cool app that lets you choose music based on your mood or activity, and it's packed with curated playlists, but it's only available in the U.S. and Canada right now. If you don't want to buy Apple and you live in the States, then Beats Music offers over 20 million for \$10 a month with lots of recommendations and handy features. Pandora is another good option for free radio stations. The version is supported by advertising, and the mobile version has a pass limit on iOS and Android. Users can subscribe to Pandora One for \$4.99 per month. This gives them more passes, no ads, fewer timeouts, and more. The only real downside is their lackluster 800,000 song library, which is well below average. If you're already using doubleTwist and you're in the U.S., then you should check out the Magic Radio service in it for 13 million tracks, endless playlists, and personalized stations for \$25 a year. The bottom line is if you're looking for a free service and you can put up with ads, there's nothing better than Spotify. Deezer comes close second and Rdio is a good choice for Americans and Australians. If you're willing to pay a monthly fee, then Spotify still tops the charts, but Google Play Music All Access is a good option. The fact that Spotify has been around for so long makes it hard to compete with, it has more features and add-ons and an active community, and there is very little that it lacks compared to competition.
