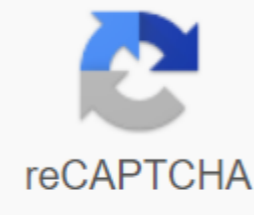

Compatible with virtually any device that knows humans, Bluetooth speakers will ensure that, as long as your phone, tablet or laptop is nearby, your music will be loud! Our favorite is the Ultimate Ears wonder tree 2 because of its small form factor and its water and dust resistance, but there are plenty of other options. Ultimate Eras speakers don't have to be expensive to be good. The Wonderboom 2 is shockingly hard for its size, and sounds excellent for just about any type of music, from pop to rock to hip hop to jazz. Like the Megaboom 3, the Wonderboom 2 has omnidirectional sound, making it great for parties. It also comes in multiple flashy colors, like the Megaboom 3, and you pair it with another speaker - although it only comes with another Wonderboom 2 speaker. It's also IP67 certified, which means it's dust-resistant and immersive - in fact, half of the photos you'll find online of the Wonderboom 2, features the speaker floating in pools. As a bonus, the Wonderboom 2 is durable, capable of withstanding drops of up to 15 meters and lasting up to 13 hours between each load. Not bad at all for a speaker of this size. The Soundcore 2 is waterproof and has a full 24 hours to last - of course you'd hope Anker of all brands could provide a good battery life. Unfortunately, the Soundcore 2 is significantly lacking in bass, which can have a big impact on certain music genres, and it's a bit quiet compared to other speakers on this list. Still, for the price it commands, it's a great little speaker available in a few color options, and you can even buy more than one and pair them together for surround sound audio. The best Bluetooth speakers at the momentThe best Bluetooth speaker in general: the UE Boom Boom builds on the success of its predecessor, with more durability and some improvements in styling - but it's ultimately the same speaker that packed a hatful of awards in its first iteration. Perhaps the biggest improvement with the UE Boom 2, though, is the increased IPX rating (from 4 to 7), which means it can now be submerged for up to 30 minutes, and still keep rocking. And with an accompanying app (for iOS and Android), you can also customize buttons and even connect multiple speakers through the DJ feature, where other Boom 2 owners can add their own music to a group of connected Booms (but don't worry; if you don't like what you hear, you can always boot them from your speaker party). With the UE Boom app you can also adjust audio settings, such as bass and treble, which really helps in dealing with bass heavy music. However, the audio performance of the UE Boom 2 has not only been improved through the software, and also features improved 1.75in active drivers, as well as 3in passive radiators. Finally, but by no means, let's look at the design. In most cases, this is the thing that first attracts people to the UE Boom 2. It is colorful (with plenty of choices), a little eccentric, and a welcome change in the homogeneous aesthetics of most speakers. But, having said that, some may find the design a little too ostentatious for their taste. The best high-end Bluetooth speakers: We have a small confession to make: we have a serious soft spot for the design of the Dali Katch. From the sleek aluminum casing to the leather handle, this is a speaker that exudes specs look. In itself, this wouldn't be enough for inclusion, but it also sounds incredible (which for its slim design is a serious feat of engineering). With two 21mm soft dome tweeters, two dual 3.5-inch woofers and two passive bass radiators, this speaker will be a serious punch. But if it gets bass-heavy, you can still detect the midrange - and this thing can also go seriously hard! You don't edit the equalizer settings with the Katch, but it does have two pre-sets: Clear and Warm (for bass-heavy audio). And between them, they will cover most flavors. Finally, if you pair with a device that supports aptX, then you have the added bonus of being able to play high-definition audio through the Katch, taking it to another level of audio performance. The best Bluetooth speakers for home and studio: This is a category with two big hitters: the Zeppelin Wireless from Bowers & Wilkins, and the Naim Mu-soen. For cost and performance alone, we recommend the Zeppelin and get more details in our best wireless speakers for 2019. But if the cost is not a problem, then the Naim at the top of our list. Make no mistake though: with a weight of 14.8 kg, this is not a Bluetooth speaker that you have in your anytime soon (not unless you're in training for an endurance contest). Building on Naim's high-end audio heritage, there is little to give away the Mu-so's digital makeup. An aluminum case envelops an MDF case, which in addition to providing audio damping also adds a serious weight to the device. Elsewhere, recessed LEDs offer a visual cue when connecting, but sit behind the grille at the front, for a truly minimalist look. And the final design element of the note is the main volume control, which will appeal to NOB enthusiasts everywhere (consisting of a sturdy ring of anodised aluminum with beadblasted). Sound wise, the Mu-so's power is something to behold, with six 75 watt amplifiers delivering a total of 450 watts (all controlled by a 32-bit digital signal processor, which Naim claims is capable of millions of calculations per second). And listening to music on the Mu-so, we believe they-it's as close to audio perfection as you get with a Bluetooth speaker (and comes with full support for AptX, too). The best outdoor Bluetooth speakers: For this category we're going to make a few assumptions. The first is that - if you're looking for an outdoor speaker - there's a good chance you don't want to spend a huge amount of money on it (because it's undoubtedly stung by the wringer). Secondly, we assume that you want it to be completely waterproof, because 'outside' often equals 'raining cats and dogs'. With these factors in mind, the selection has been severely reduced, and this category is a toss-up between the JBL Charge 3 and the UE Wonderboom; but for its sheer cuteness and competitive price, we have chosen the latter. You don't talk about the UE Wonderboom without mentioning its appearance (as we already have). The blunt design is akin to someone pouring a bucket load of awesome into a beverage can, and then wrapping the whole thing in a mesh fabric, before finally filling and staring at it with a rubber membrane. The design of the Wonderboom means you get full-360 degree audio, and thanks to the IPX7 waterproof rating, it also means you're playing with this thing in a pool! It's really so durable. On top of the speaker, you'll find power, pairing, and playback buttons, and even connect two devices at once, for easy switching with audio. And while the UE Wonderboom sounds great, it doesn't have the high-end bass support of the JBL Charge 3, but it goes brilliantly with mid-ranges, and given that it's almost £100 cheaper, we're happy to make the sacrifice on top-end bass. The best Bluetooth speakers for iPhone: connect all the Bluetooth speakers in this list via your iPhone. But for this recording, we have to find a speaker that fits both the design and audio expectations of iPhone users, and that's why we to the Bose SoundLink Mini II. Styling-wise, it has a lot in common with the Jam Heavy Metal, including a hefty weight of 670g. It features a curved aluminium casing, with grilles on the front and back of the device. And, like the Heavy Metal, it also handles bass very well (better than the Heavy Metal, in fact, which is no mean feat). Standard control buttons sit on top of the device, and in the second iteration the Soundlink Mini II locks the special Aux button in favor of automatic switching when a new device is connected. This is a

nice addition. The only downside to the Mini II is that, for the price, we would expect support for aptX, which is omitted.
