Since 2018, she has been co-captain of the United States women's national football team with Carli Lloyd and Megan Rapinoe. [6] Shortly after graduating from the University of California, Berkeley, where he played for the California Golden Bears, Morgan was recruited number one in total in the 2011 WPS Draft by Western New York Flash. There, she made her professional debut and helped the team win the league championship. Morgan, who was 22 at the time, was the youngest player in the national team at the 2011 Women's World Cup, where the team was second. At the 2012 London Olympics, she scored the winning goal in the 123rd minute of her semi-final match against Canada. She finished 2012 with 28 goals and 21 assists, joining Mia Hamm as the only American to score 20 goals and provide 20 assists in the same calendar year and make her the sixth and youngest American player to score 20 goals in a single season. It was later called U.S. women's soccer player of the year and was a finalist in FIFA World Player of the Year. Morgan also helped the United States win the titles at the 2015 and 2019 Women's World Cup, where she was named on the Dream Team for both tournaments, while she won Silver boot in 2019. In 2013, the inaugural season of the National Women's Football League, Morgan joined Portland Thorns FC and helped the team win the title that year. Morgan played for the Thorns in the 2015 season, after which she was transferred to the first year of the Orlando Pride franchise. In 2017, Morgan signed with French side Lyon, where he won the European continental treble, which included the UEFA Women's Champions League. Off the field, Morgan teamed up with Simon kassouf, Schuster to write a series of middle books for the football players: The Kicks. The first book in the series, Saving the Team, debuted at number seven in The New York Times Best Seller in July. In addition, a film starring Morgan in her acting debut, Alex & Mia, was released in June 2018, where she performed a fictional version of her. In 2015, Morgan was ranked by Time as the highest-paid American football player, largely because of her numerous approval offers. Morgan, along with Christine Sinclair of Canada and Steph Catley of Australia, became the first women's football player to appear on the cover of FIFA video games in 2015. Morgan appeared alongside Lionel Messi on the covers of FIFA 16 sold in the United States. She was named one of Time's 100 most influential people in 2019. [7] Early life Born by Pamela and Michael Morgan in the suburb of San Dimas in Los Angeles County, California.[4][8][9] Morgan was raised with her two older sisters, Jeni and Jeri, in the nearby diamond bar suburb. [10] [11] She was a multi-sports athlete who grew up and started playing football at an early age with AYSO [12] and her father was among her first coaches. [13] However, she did not start playing club football until the age of 14, when she joined Cypress Elite. [14] [15] With the club team, she won the Under-16 Coastal Football Championship (CSL) and finished third at the Under-19 level. [16] Morgan attended Diamond Bar High School, where she was three times in all leagues and was named All-American by the National Soccer Peaches Association of America (NSCAA). [9] At school, she was known for her sprint speed and speed. [17] Morgan also played for the regional and state teams of the Olympic Development Programme (ODP). [16] She later credited the program as an integral part of her development as a football player: "... programs like ODP helped me especially because I came into the club scene late and it was important for me to play as much as possible, to play with the best players and learn from the best coaches. This, for me, was crucial to my development. [18] At the age of 17, Morgan was called up to the United States women's national football team under 20. Years. While playing in a scrimmage against the men's junior national team, she suffered a pre-ligament injury (ACL) and did not play for the team until April 2008. [19] California Golden Bears (2007–2010) Morgan participated in UC UC where he played for the California Golden Bears from 2007 to 2010. [20] [20] She led Cal Bears in her first season with the team. [16] During a match against Stanford in the second round of the 2007 FCAA Division I Women's Football Championship, Morgan earned an equalizer with less than two minutes remaining during regulation, resulting in a 1-1 draw. The team was eventually defeated in the penalty shootout. [21] Despite continued absences due to the u.s. national team's commitments throughout his collegiate career, Morgan led Cal to the score and helped the team reach the CCAA Tournament four years in a row, advancing to the second round twice. [16] After being named a Hermann Trophy candidate during her first year, Morgan became the first Golden Bear to be one of the first three finalists of the award. She was one of four finalists for the Honda Sports Award, given to the best overall candidate in every sport. [16] Morgan led his collegiate career in third place in the all-time standings in goals scored (45) and points (105) for Cal.[22] She graduated from Berkeley one semester earlier with a degree in political economics. [23] The career of Western New York Flash (2011) Morgan in 2011 On January 14, 2011, Morgan was the first general choice in the 2011 WPS Draft by Western New York Flash. [24] She was the first player of Cal to be recruited in the first round of women's professional football (WPS). [25] Morgan scored her first goal for Flash during the team's field opener —a 3-0 victory over The Atlanta Beat on May 1, 2011. [26] During the 2011 season, she played in 14 games and scored four goals. [27] The club won the title in the regular season and the WPS title in the same year. [28] Seattle Sounders Women (2012) After WPS later suspended operations in early 2012 due to legal and financial difficulties,[29] Morgan joined his national teammates Hope Solo, Sydney Leroux, Megan Rapinoe and Stephanie Cox at Seattle Sounders Women for the 2012 season. [30] [31] [32] About signing it, Morgan said: I am delighted to play in a city so passionate about football. The Sounders were one of, if not the best fan support in MLS. I can only imagine how Seattle fans would respond to having a full professional women's team in the future. [33] Due to the national team's commitments and preparation for the 2012 Summer Olympics,[34] Morgan made three regular season appearances for the club. He scored two goals and provided two assists in his 253 minutes on the pitch. [35] With the presence of teammates at the national team.[36][37] The Sounders sold nine of their ten home games at Starfire Stadium with a one-time 4,500 seats. [38] The average attendance in the 2012 season for Sounders Women was four times higher than the next closest team. [38] Portland Thorns FC (2013-2015) See also: Portland Thorns FC 2013 season, Portland Thorns FC season and 2015 Portland Thorns Thorns January 11, 2013, Morgan was one of three players of the U.S. national team to join Portland Thorns FC for the inaugural season of the National Women's Football League through NWSL Player Allocation. [39] She scored her first goal for the Thorns during the home-opener team at Jeld-Men Field in front of 16,479 spectators helping her team defeat Seattle Reign FC 2-1. [40] She finished the regular season as the team's points leader and joint leader (with Christine Sinclair), with eight goals and five assists (21 points). [42] The club finished third in the regular season led by head coach Cindy Parlow Cone. [43] On August 31, 2013, Portland won the inaugural league title after defeating regular season champion Western New York Flash 2-0; Morgan witnessed the second goal. [44] Morgan was appointed to NWSL Second XI on August 28. [45] Morgan returned to the Thorns for the 2014 season, led by new head coach Paul Riley. [46] He scored six goals in the club's 15 appearances. [27] The Thorns finished third in the regular season with a record 10-8-6 and advanced to the play-offs for the second consecutive season. [27] The team was defeated by FC Kansas City 2-0. [47] In the 2015 season, Morgan made four appearances for the Thorns due to his commitments to the national team at the 2015 Fila Women's World Cup. [27] She scored a goal during a 3-3 draw against the Washington Spirit on August 31. [27] The Thorns finished sixth in the regular season with a record 6-9-5. [27] Orlando Pride (2016) Morgan with Orlando Pride in April 2018, On October 26, 2015, it was announced that Thorns had transferred Karylyn Kyle, to Orlando Pride expansion team in exchange for Pride's number one election in 2015 NWSL Expansion Draft 2016, as well as an international place for the 2016 and 2017 seasons. [48] Morgan scored four goals in his 15 appearances for Pride. [27] The club finished ninth in the regular season, with a record 6-15-1 led by coach Tom Sermanni. [27] Lyon (2017) Morgan with Lyon in the Women's Champions League final, June 2017 On January 5, 2017, Morgan signed with French champions Olympique Lyonnais (Lyon) for \$33,000 a month. [50] [51] [52] The six-month contract included a reciprocal option for an additional season. [53] She made her debut in Division 1 in Division 1 on 14 January, during a 3-0 victory over En Avant de Guingamp and recorded two assists. [54] During a match against ASPTT Albi on March 17, she scored a brace in the second half to help lift the team to a 5-0 win. [55] On 7 May, she scored a brace during the team's victory with against ASJ Soyaux, after which the club was named League Champion for the ninth consecutive season. [27] [56] She scored five goals in eight appearances during the regular season. [27] On 12 March, Morgan scored a hat-trick against Rodez to lead Lyon to a 6-0 victory and advance to the Semi-finals of the French Cup. [57] She scored four goals and recorded two assists during the semi-final with Hénin-Beaumont (three of the four took place in ten minutes). [58] Lyon won the Cup after a penalty kick on May 19. Morgan did not play during the French Cup final due to a persistent injury sustained during a match against Paris Saint-Germain. [59] [60] Morgan made his 2016-2017 UEFA Women's Champions League debut in the first leg of the quarter-finals on 23 March during the team's 2-0 victory over VfL Wolfsburg. [61] On 1 June, she started the 2017 UEFA Women's Champions League final, but was injured after 23 minutes due to injury. [62] Lyon won the match after a penalty kick. [64] Returning to Orlando (2017-2020) After the Champions League final, Pride announced Morgan's addition to their 2017 active list on June 21, 2017, giving up Christina Burkenroad to make her way to the 20-player list. [65] After recovering from his injury in the final, Morgan made a competitive return for Orlando on July 1 against the Chicago Red Stars. [66] Morgan scored nine goals in 14 games for Orlando in 2017, and the team reached a record of 11-6-7. [67] [68] On 7 October, Morgan played his first game of the Pride NJSL playoff, a 4-1 defeat to eventual Champions Portland Thorns FC. [69] After the end of the season, Morgan was named in the 2017th League. [70] Although her contract with Lyon included an option for a comeback in 2018, Morgan announced in September 2017 that he would terminate his contract and return to Orlando for the start of the 2018 season. [53] The team failed to match the success of its 2017 campaign, finishing seven of the league's nine teams with a record of 8-10-6. [71] Morgan played in nineteen games for Pride, contributing five goals throughout the season. Morgan spent most of the 2019 season at the international service, including the World Cup. Before ending the injured season, he only featured in two games for Orlando and failed to score. The first time she finished a Pride season since. In October 2019 she announced that she was pregnant, and finally gave birth in May 2020. Morgan missed the NWSL Challenge Cup tournament in early summer 2020, following the break in the season caused by the COVID-19 pandemic. [74] She returned to training with Pride in early September before the fall series. The September-October list of matches scheduled for the end of the season. Tottenham Hotspur (2020) 12th 2020, Morgan signed with English Super League team Tottenham Hotspur. [76] The contract runs from September to 2020, with the option of extending the transaction until the end of the 2020-21 FA WSL season in May 2021. [77] Orlando retained Morgan's NJSL rights. [78] He is still trying to regain his health after not playing since August 2019 and giving birth in May 2020.[79] Morgan made his Spurs debut on 7 November 2020, appearing as a reserve in the 69th minute in a 1-1 WSL draw against Reading. [80] On November 14, she made her debut for Spurs, playing 45 minutes in a 2-2 draw with Bristol City before being substituted at half-time. [81] In his third appearance, Morgan played against North London rivals Arsenal in the League Cup group stage, replacing him at half-time. The match ended in a 2-2 draw and on penalties with Morgan, the only player who did not convert, instead drawing the decisive penalty over the crossbar in a 5-4 defeat. [82] She scored her first goal for the club on 6 December 2020, a penalty in the 84th minute, in a 3-1 win over Brighton & Hove Albion, Spurs' first win of the season. [84] The following week, Morgan scored his second penalty in as many matches in which Spurs defeated Aston Villa 3-1. [85] On December 21, Tottenham Hotspur announced that Morgan would enter into a contract with the club and return to the US. Due to the ACL injury that slowed her progress in 2007, Morgan was not called upon to train with the United States women's national football team until April 2008. [100] Her first appearance for the United 20 team was during the U-20 CONCACAF Women's Championship in Cuba, Mexico, where she scored her first goal, against the first goal, against the United States. [101] Morgan was named the U-20 women's national team, which competed in the 2008 FA U-20 championship. World Cup in Chile, scoring a total of four goals in the tournament against France, Argentina and North Korea. Morgan's fourth goal was a match winner that won the American tournament, which was later voted the tournament's best goal.[102] and later FIFA's second best goal of the year. [103] Her performance on the field earned her the Bronze Shoe as the tournament's third biggest scorer and the Silver Ball as the tournament's second-best player, after teammate Sydney Leroux. [104] She was replaced by the senior national team, appearing for the first time as a reserve in a match against Mexico in March 2010.[105] and scored her first international goal after being replaced by China, which saved a 1-1 draw in October 2010. Her most important goal so far came a month later in a crucial match against Italy. After entering the match in the 86th minute, she scored in the fourth minute of time added to give the United States a 1-0 victory over Italy in the first leg of a playoff to qualify for the final place for the 2012 World Cup. [106] The 2011 Women's World Cup Morgan was the youngest player in the U.S. national team to finish second at the 2011 Women's World Cup. On July 13, 2011, she scored her first FIFA Women's World Cup goal in the 82nd minute of the semi-final match against France, giving the USA 3-1 advantage and ultimately victory. She scored the first goal (69) in the FIFA World Cup final against Japan after coming as a substitute at half-time, as well as assisting Abby Wambach (104) for a goal in extra time. Her performance made her the first player to score a goal and assist in a World Cup final. [107] Morgan finished eighth in the 2011 FIFA World Player rankings. [108] The 2012 London Olympics Morgan did not become the starter for the U.S. until the fifth match of the year in January, the final of the CONCACAF Olympic qualifying tournament. [109] She scored twice and gave Wambach two assists that day, in a 4-0 win over the Canadian hosts, and has since become a regular starter. Between January and the end of May 2012, Morgan scored 14 goals in a 12-match match, including a sequence of three consecutive two-goal efforts on January 29, February 11 and 29. [11] [1] [2] [3] She won the first hat-trick of her career on March 7, 2012, during a 4-0 win over Sweden in her third-place game in the Algarve Cup. [11] [4] In June 2012, she was nominated for the ESPY Award as Best Successful Athlete. [110] In the opening match of the group game of the 2012 London Olympics, Morgan scored both as well as the goal that scored the victory against France. [111] In the next three Olympic matches, she witnessed the winning goal of the match, including two in Wambach. [112] [113] Morgan challenges Japanese defender Saki Kumagai for as Mizuho Sakaguchi (6) and Azusa Azusa (3) Look on during their gold medal match at the 2012 Summer Olympics Morgan scored the winning goal in the Olympic semi-final match against Canada in extra time, sending the United States to the gold medal match against Japan. Her goal in the 123rd minute, the last goal scored by a member of the U.S. women's national team, was described as a late heroism in the final stages of the match. [115] The game continued to be late heroism in the final stages of the match. [116] Morgan scored the 60th goal in her career, the 60th goal in her career. The match-winning goals were Morgan's best in 2012, becoming the sixth and youngest American player to do so in a single year. [116] [117] In the final, 2-1 against Japan, on August 9, Morgan witnessed a header from Carli Lloyd. [118] She ended the tournament with three goals and four assists (tied with Megan Rapinoe) and ten points (tied with Rapinoe and Wambach). [119] To celebrate her achievements, she was honored at her former high school, and the number 13 shirt was withdrawn. [120] In 2012, Morgan led the U.S. in goals (28), multi-goal matches (9), assists (21) and points (77). [121] Her goals, assists and calendar year totals are the third best, second best (a shy number of records), and the second best in USWNT history, respectively. Morgan joined an exclusive club because she and Hamm are the only USWNT players to score at least 20 goals and 20 assists in the same calendar year and become only the third and youngest player to reach 20 assists in a calendar year. Morgan and Wambach combined for 55 goals in 2012 - equaling a 21-year record set in 1991 by Michelle Akers (39 goals) and Carin Jennings (16 goals) as the most goals scored by any duo in USWNT history. She scored or witnessed 41 percent of the U.S. 120 goals this year, and on her own, she comfortably spilled away and helped her opponents, who combined for 21 goals and 12 assists in 32 games against the U.S.[109] For her excellence on the field, U.S. Soccer announced Morgan as Sportswoman of the Year in 2012. [122] Morgan's actions also earned him a place on the Shortlist of the Fila Ballon d'Or, eventually finishing third in the vote. [123] 2013-2014 At the 2013 Algarve Cup, Morgan shared the most important scores. She finished the competition with four assists and three goals, including equalizer against Sweden, which advanced the Usa in the end and the two goals against Germany, which won the championship. [124] [125] She previously won the gold boot of the tournament in 2011. [126] On June 2, 2013, Morgan scored two goals in the second half, while defeated Canada 3-0 against a sold-out game in Toronto. It was the first match between the U.S. and Canada since the epic semi-final of the 2012 Olympics. [127] Morgan was named to her third shortlist of 10 for FIFA Women's World Player of the Year in 2013 and finished in the vote. [128] [129] For the inaugural concacaf awards, she was recognized as the player of the year CONCACAF 2013. [130] And as part of U.S. Soccer's celebration of the Centenary Anniversary, the Federation unveiled the U.S. women's national soccer team, the best team, the best player, she was the youngest player selected at 24. [131] Morgan had a five-goal comeback in seven games for USWNT in April, after returning from injury before resurgence his ankle at the 2014 CONCACAF Women's Championship, which ruled her out for the rest of the tournament. [132] The 2015 Women's World Cup Morgan scored the winning goal in a 1-0 friendly win over England in February upon his return to the international team. [133] She was part of the USWNT, which won its 10th Algarve Cup in 2015. [134] She scored in the 3-0 defeat to Switzerland. [135] Morgan spent two months recovering from a knee injury during the construction of the 2015 Fila Women's World Cup. Morgan's knee injury happened in April during the NWSL season against the Boston Breakers. [136] She made her first debut in the World Cup final, while the U.S. defeated Nigeria 1-0 in the last group match to advance as a group winner. [137] She recorded her only goal of the World Cup knockout stage with her opening in her last 16 wins over Colombia. [138] Morgan, however, won penalties for USWNT in their 2-0 victories over Colombia in the last 16 and Germany in the semifinals, respectively. [138] [139] [140] She then started the final of the 2015 Women's World Cup, while USWNT defeated Japan 5-2 to win its third Women's World Cup. [141] Morgan played in all seven World Cup Finals matches and has started in each of them since he was reinstated in his first match against Nigeria. [142] Morgan was challenged by Hikari Takagi (15) during a match against Japan in Cleveland on June 5, 2016. The 2016 Rio Olympics Morgan scored his 100th spot for USWNT in a friendly 5-0 win over the Republic of Ireland on 23 January by recording a goal and an assist. [143] In the Olympic concacaf qualifiers in February, Morgan scored the fastest goal recorded in the tournament's history and USWNT history, at the net after just 12 seconds, before adding a second later in a 5-0 defeat in Costa Rica. [144] She continued with her third career hat-trick in a victory over Trinidad and Tobago, as The USWNT secured qualification for the Rio Olympics. [145] [146] Morgan started in the qualifying final against Canada, uswnt won 2-0 to be crowned of the tournament. [147] She was voted in the XI Prize for the tournament. [148] 2016–2018 At the first SheBelief Cup competition in March 2016, a four-team tournament consisted of England, France, Germany and the United States, Morgan received the Golden Ice and the MVP Award. [149] She scored in victories against France and Germany as USWNT won with three wins from three. [150] Morgan scored eight goals in his first nine appearances in 2016. [149] In 2018, Morgan won the U.S. soccer player's award. She was nominated alongside Julie Ertz, Tobin Heath, Lindsey Horan and Megan Rapinoe. [152] 2019 FIFA Women's World Cup As the leader of the USWNT at the 2019 FIFA Women's World Cup, Morgan scored five goals in the inaugural group match against Thailand to equal the World Cup goal record set by Michelle Akers in 1991. Morgan also recorded three assists in this match. The team's 13-0 scorescore set a new record for the margin of victory in a World Cup match. [153] On 2 July 2019, Morgan became the first woman to score a World Cup goal on her birthday, in a 2-1 victory over England, which reached the final of the 2019 World Cup Women's Football Championship. [155] In the final on July 7, Morgan helped win a penalty that was later converted by Megan Rapinoe to open the scoring, while the United States defeated The Netherlands 2-0. Morgan received the Silver Boot of the tournament, finishing as a joint-scorer with six goals, but losing to Megan Rapinoe on a few minutes break. [169] The series focuses on four young girls and features themes of friendship, leadership and football. In a statement released by the publisher, Morgan said he wanted her books to inspire young women and celebrate her love of football. The first novel, Saving The Team, was released on May 14, 2013, followed by the second novel, Sabotage Season, on September 3, 2013. [170] Saving the team debuted at number seven on the list of best-selling articles in The New York Times for the children's middle class. [171] In 2015, a book-based children's comedy series, Called The Kicks, began airing on Amazon Prime. [172] Morgan's susclusion signed several approval agreements with companies such as Nike.[173] Panasonic.[174] AT&M.[174] Chobani.[175] McDonald's.[176] P&G.[177] Mondelez International.[178] and Coca-Cola. [179] Time magazine the highest-paid American footballer in June 2015, mostly awarded approval of it. [180] In July 2011, she signed a one-year approval agreement with Bank of America. [181] In January 2012, Morgan and national colleague Heather Mitts became ambassadors for the health products company's brand, GNC.
