The Oregon POLST Coalition has asked all health systems and organizations to implement the use of the 2019 form when filling out new POLST forms. Please note that the completed versions of the 2011, 2014 and 2018 POLST forms are still valid. A summary of the changes can be found here. It's a voluntary form that turns your desires for treatment into a medical order. It is intended for people with severe illness, such as advanced heart disease, advanced lung disease, or cancer that has spread. It is also for people who are older and fragile and do not want all medical treatments. Oregon's POLST coalition has withdrawn from the national POLST standard to affirm values that avoid conflicts of interest. Read the full statement here. The 2019 Oregon POLST format entered into force on January 2, 2019. All 2011, 2014, 2018 and 2019 versions of the POLST form are valid. If the patient's wishes have not changed, a new POLST form does not need to be completed. The biggest changes to the 2019 version are the change from a solid pink form to a white form with a pink outline and the removal of the ARTIFICIAL Nutrition section. How do I get a POLST form? Since the POLST form is a medical order, you should get the form from your doctor's office. If your doctor does not have POLST forms, they can with the POLST program to learn how to order forms from this website. THE APR is a secure online database. The registry allows health professionals who treat a patient to access their POLST commands if the POLST printed form cannot be found. The program is based on the effective communication of patients' wishes, the documentation of medical orders and the promise of a health professional to honor these desires. Visiting the Oregon POLST Program Program History program in 1991, it was not uncommon for sick Oregonians approaching the end of life to receive unwanted medical care. To address this problem, the Ethics Center convened a team of health professionals, including emergency medical services (EMS), medicine, nursing, hospice, and long-term care. Over a two-year period, the newly formed working group developed the Medical Treatment Coversheet (MTC); designed to help health professionals honor their patients' treatment preferences. After initial evaluation and a name change in Physician Orders for Life-Sustaining Treatment (POLST) the form was released for use in Oregon in 1995. Using a train-the-trainer model, the working group members initially trained health professionals on the use of the form. Continuous training, research and a process of continuous quality improvement based on experience at the state level have helped the working group improve the content of the POLST form and the implementation process. As the Oregon program evolved, selected regulations rather than legislation were used to help with implementation. Other developing projects such as West Virginia and New York sought legislation to facilitate adoption POLST.
