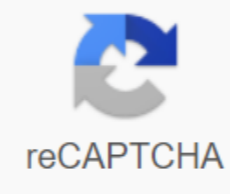




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Waimea middle school kamuela

Our Future: Introducing Our Public School Children to the 21st Century World & Workplace! Waimea is a community with great beauty, resources and rich cultural heritage. However, there is a huge economic and technological gap. This is the story of Waimea Middle School: Of the 250 6-8th grade students, nearly 70% of our families are struggling with poverty. In addition, 55% are native Hawaiians; 11% have special educational services; 22% are eligible for migrant education and 4% are English learners. Inspired by this great need for academic support and progress, our teachers and staff are risky: As mentioned earlier, they voted to become a public conversion charter school in 2003 to gain more control over the curriculum, support, and resources to better serve students. This has led to progress in the state's academic evaluations. However, our children are still fighting. Only 46% were experts in reading in spring 2017 and 29% were experts in mathematics. Moreover, the difference is even more pronounced when we compare high-needs students (economically disadvantaged, ELL and special education) with high-needs students. In addition, we have experienced a decrease in turnout. In 2014-2015, the average daily attendance was 94%, so there was a small percentage of chronic absenteeism. Our current rate of chronic absenteeism is 28%. Of course, we need to better meet students' needs and engagement in order to increase academic achievement, and we are working on this by changing the curriculum, instruction and assessment, and investing in professional development. The centerpiece of this effort revolves around our new KEAōākea STEAM Educational Center. Why is Keaoākea so important? Middle school is a key time to instill higher thinking and deeper knowledge so that students can succeed in high school and beyond. We see the STEAM Science Center as our bridge to better engaging students and improving academic performance. But ironically, this new building has very few new technologies of the 21st century. We ask the community for help. And some sensible help came: We are immensely grateful that our state legislators provided \$298,000 in grants to help STEAM technology and training during the 2018 session. We are currently working to secure the release of these funds. We also ask other funders and foundations, and we have already raised over \$200,000, including support from Kamehameh Schools. But we need about \$1 million over the next 2+ years to significantly improve outcomes for Waimea children. There are many ways to contribute. These include donations to specific technology or equipment, support to our technology team in implementing technology and training for teachers classroom or Makerspace, Demonstration Laboratory or Broadcast Studio, supporting the development of training or professional development related to STEAM for teachers. We could also use the external structures of the learning space and equipment. We are pleased with your help - waimea middle school students need and deserve it. Supporting our Waimea Middle School is a public school conversion card - the first to convert under what was a new law passed by the legislature in 2002 to support improved learning and student achievement, especially in communities with a high title 1 student population (poverty rate) and a large percentage of children of Hawaiian descent. About 70% of our students are title 1, and about 50% are Hawaiian/Hawaiian parts. Our school received full 6-year accreditation from the Western Association of Schools and Colleges (WASC) for the period 2014-2020. This is the Good Housekeeping Seal of Approval, which empowers a school-wide commitment to continuous improvement. For more information about our accreditation, click here. One of our accreditation priorities is to jointly develop a balanced budget and fundraising plan to maintain the school's academic program. PUBLIC COMMUNITY SCHOOL Located in Waimea/Kamuela on the island of Hawaii, Waimea Middle School (WMS) serves about 285 students in grades six to eight. The school became the first public charter school in 2003, but it is still a community public school, accepting all students without a recruitment or tuition process. Students receive all services provided by a regular DOE school (catering services, busing, etc.) free of charge for families, however, the school must pay for these services with funding per pupil. Using the framework of middle school and philosophy, teaching and learning are conducted with the conviction that all children can achieve high standards. To ensure rigor and importance, the core curriculum is integrated into practical/local learning with both Ike Hawai'i cultural and Malai'ai gardens in health and environmental management. While the average income in the region is 4% higher than the state average, family incomes in WMS lag significantly behind, and 68% of children qualify for free or reduced lunch. Ethnically, Waimea/Kamuela is a diverse area of mostly Caucasian and Asian residents, but the community also includes a significant number of Latinos, Pacific Islands and Native Hawaiians. WMS differs ethnically from the general population with students of Hawaiian/semi-Hawaiian descent accounting for nearly half (48%) School. WMS has a fairly high percentage of students eligible for special education services (12%); 8% are English learners and 19% are eligible for the migrant education programme. ACADEMIC POSITION In spring 2013, the State of Hawaii adopted a new educational tool for Hawaii's public schools to replace No Child Left Behind, which did not make students or schools justice. STRIVE HI was created by a large number of teachers - based on nationally proven best practices to measure student and school performance, individual student growth and readiness, as well as reducing the achievement gap. Put simply, STRIVE HI gives students, families, teachers and school leaders a clearer picture of students' academic progress: Are students learning? The WMS STRIVE HI score puts schools in continuous range improvement along with about 75% of schools in the state. First of all, our students are showing academic progress, but more is needed and this has been and continues to be our goal of general training. AREAS OF EXCELLENCE A safe, nurturing school environment embedded in the core values of Cairo's Ike, Kaizen, Accountability, Integrity, Respect. In addition, all students are assigned to an advisory class, take part in counselling classes and have the opportunity to engage in various clubs and extracurricular activities. Taken together, these protocols and opportunities nurture mutual respect, trust, support, honest communication and positive relationships between students, faculty and employees. Responses from year-end student and family surveys (2012-'13), check that: When students were asked if they felt Waimea Middle School was a safe and friendly place to learn, 76% agreed/strongly agreed.
