This website can't be found in your country The Kentucky Derby can't be denied the most important race in North America for a 3-year-old. There have been some real disappointments over the years, with unsung entrepreneurs rushing from behind the pek to take over the craze. Here's a list of 10 long shots that paid the most money when they won the Run for the Roses as if against all odds. Donerail sign on the grandstand at Churchill Downs. Cindy Pierson Dulay Donerail paid \$184.90 at a \$2 bet to win the Derby in 1913. He's still the highest paid winner ever. He was sent at 91-1 odds. Every Kentucky Derby winner has his name on the mark behind the grandstand at Churchill Downs. The Donerail sign is on the left. Al Bello/Staff/Getty Images Mine That Bird trailed most of the race before assembling in the stretch to win by 6 3/4 lengths. He did so at odds of 50-1, paying \$103.20 to win the 2009 Kentucky Derby. She placed second to Rachel Alexandra in the Preakness, and third behind Summer Bird and Dunkirk in the Belmont. Bird's swagger was a gelding that continued to pulverized until November 2010, but he never re-captured the glory of the Kentucky Derby. He batted nine more times but never won again, then he retired. He has made several appearances as a resident horse at the Kentucky Derby Museum and his story has been immortalized in 50 to 1 film. Giacomo won the 2005 Kentucky Derby. Cindy Pierson Dulay Giacomo seemed to be out of nowhere when she closed out to win the 2005 Kentucky Derby at odds of 50-1. He paid \$102.60 to win, the second-highest payout on a \$2 bet in Kentucky Derby history. Poskad Gallahadion after winning the 1940 Kentucky Derby. Cindy Pierson Dulay Gallahadion won the Derby at odds of 36-1 in 1940. His lack of popularity among Kentucky racehorses may have something to do with him as a California horse, or perhaps the fact that he ran horrid in his first two races. But he was brilliant in the Kentucky Derby, paying \$72.40 to win, the third-highest winning payout in Kentucky Derby history. Matthew Stockman/Staff/Getty Images Charismatic is something of a Cinderella story. He was a claimant shortly before derby, competing in some of the weakest races against the poorest competition in the country. It doesn't take him away at 31-1. He just got up by the neck to win, paying \$64.60 in the 1999 Kentucky Derby. He won the Preakness and was third at the Belmont, where he broke his leg just after the finish. Jockey Chris Antley and kept his feet off the ground until the doctor's interview arrived. He underwent surgery the next day and now stands on a button in Japan at Iburi Male Station. Patrick Smith/Staff/Getty Images Proud Clarion won the Derby in 1967 at odds of 30-1. He paid \$62.20 to win. It is the fifth highest highest payment in the history of the Kentucky Derby. He also had the sixth fastest time for the Derby victory with a final time of 2:00.60 for a mile and a guarter. Rob Carr/Staff/Getty Images Exterminator may have surprised the world when he won the Kentucky Derby at odds of 29-1 in 1918, paying \$61.20 to win, but he went on to have a stellar career. Race up to the age of 9, the gelding won 50 of its 100 lifetime starts, including many stakes races. He is a fan favorite. Dark Star Marks on grandstands at Churchill Downs. Cindy Pierson Dulay Dark Star won at odds of 25-1 in 1953, paying \$51.80 on a \$2 bet to win. This is the seventh highest winning payment ever in the Kentucky Derby. He ran in The Preakness but he didn't get into the money and had retired after that race. Thunder Gulch at Ashford Stud in 2007. Terence Dulay Sent off at odds of 25-1, Thunder Gulch had the fastest odds from three horses whose coach D. Wayne Lukas entered the 1995 Kentucky Derby. He drew to win at a length of 2 1/4 and paid \$51. He was in third place in the Preakness before he won the Travers Stakes and the Kentucky Cup. He retired to relax at the end of his 3-year-old season. Harry How/Staff/Getty Images Stone Street went at a possibility of 24-1 in the 1908 Kentucky Derby and paid \$123.60 on a minimum bet, which was \$5 at the time. That would be \$49.40 for the modern day \$2 bet. Derby is the only importance of winning his career. Long shots are out there and they can win Run for the Roses at any time, in any year. Watch participation this year closely for horses that might surprise everyone. The Kentucky Derby at Churchill Downs was a great gift of all 3-year-old pure lust owners afterwards. For a coach to win this race was the highlight of his career, and only a few selected have won this race more than once. Here are the elite coaches who have won the Kentucky Derby twice or more. Although most have long gone and part of history, some still practice and can have horses in the Kentucky Derby this year. Ben Jones is the only coach so far to have six Kentucky Derby winners: Lawrin (1938), Whirlaway (1941), Pensive (1949), Hill Gail (1952). He coached from 1909 to 1953 and all the Derby winners except the first came during the period he trained for a stablepowered Calumet Farm. During his time as a record coach for these last three Derby winners, he has retired since 1946 and trained with his son, Jimmy Jones. Bob has also trained four Kentucky Derby winners so far in 25 starts, as well as Triple Crown winners: Silver Charm (1997), Real Quiet (1998), War Emblem (2002), and American Pharoah (2015). Baffert has won 12 Triple Crown races and has trained 11 champions to win a total of 15 Eclipse Awards. All four of his Kentucky Derby winners won the Preakness but the first three failed to complete The Crown, lost in the Belmont Stakes, while American Pharoah went all the way to winning the Triple Crown. Baffert is also a member of the Horse Racing Council of Notoriety. Baffert's Derby starters D. Wayne Lukas has had four Kentucky Derby winners so far: Winning colors (1988), Thunder Gulch (1995), Grindstone (1996), Charismatic (1999). Luke has been training since 1974 and has won more championships than any other coach in history. Mostly dominant in the 1980s and 90s, he has become lower-profile recently. In fact, 2001 was the first time in 20 years that he didn't have a horse put in the Derby. So far he has 47 horses to compete in the Derby, the last being Mr Z in 2015. His legacy in his helpers has come out with his own triumphs, such as Todd Pletcher, Kiaran McLaughlin, and Dallas Stewart. Luke was also a member of the Horse Racing Council of Notoriety. Charismatic 1999 DerbyWikipedia bio Henry Thompson had four Kentucky Derby winners: Behave Yourself (1921), Bubbling Over (1926), Burgoo King (1932), Broker Tip (1933). Twice he also had first and second place in the race. He started training for E.J. Baldwin on the West Coast, and after seven years moved east to coach Col. E.R. Bradley and lived steadily throughout his career. All his Derby winners are for Bradley's stable. Perhaps the most famous Derby winner was Tip Broker who killed Head Play in the famous Derby Fighting Finish in 1933. James Sunny Jim Fitzsimmons had three Kentucky Derby winners: Gallant Fox (1930), Omaha (1935), Johnstown (1939). His career lasted 70 years and included two Triple Crown winners, two world-leading money winners, and 11 Derby novices. His two Derby winners came at the time he trained for William Woodward's Belair Stable, and then he trained for the Phipps family until the end of his career. Losing the most famous Derby might be Nashua, who lost as a favourite to Swaps in 1955 but became Horse of the Year. Max Hirsch's Wikipedia bio has three Kentucky Derby winners: Bold Venture (1936). Assault (1946). Middleground (1950). His career lasted 70 years and he was coach of the King's Ranch from the 1930s until his death in 1969. The most famous horse was Serangan, winner of the 1946 Triple Crown, but he also trained Sarazen, Horse of the Year in 1924-25. Nick Zito's Wikipedia bio has trained two Kentucky Derby winners so far: Strike the Gold (1991), Go for Gin (1994). He started training in 1972 and had 20 Derby starts through 2008. He has also won 1 and 2 Belmonts, giving it 5 wins, 8 seconds, and 7 thirds of the 60 Triple Crown starters so far. His two Belmont wins are remembered for breaking the last two Triple Crown bids, with Birdstone beating Smarty Jones in 2004, and Da' Tara beat big Brown in 2008. He was instiled into the House in 2005. Wikipedia bio Carl Nafzger has coached two Kentucky Derby winners so far: Unbridled (1990), Street Sense (2007). Known for not sending horses to the Derby unless they really have a chance, his two wins come from just three starts. He started at rodeo and also a member of the Texas Cowboy Hall of Fame and Professional Bull Riders's Ring of Honor. After retiring from his rodeo started training and had the first winner in 1971. So far he is the only coach to win both the Breeders' Cup Juvenile and the Kentucky Derby with the same horse, Street Sense. Street Sense won the 2007 DerbyWikipedia bio Because none of them are still training, I'll only list multiple Derby winners with links to their bios. All of them are members of the Hall of Fame.
