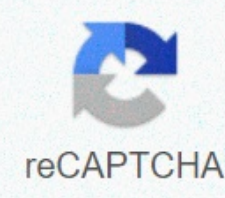

Boston's theater scene took off in the 1900s with about 50 theaters with theaters and other entertainment venues after the 1950s, many within the confines of what is now the Theater District. At the time, however, the Theater District got a bad reputation given that it doubled as a red light district which also led to crime. The late 1970s brought the preservation and renovation of these buildings and the ultimate revitalization of the Theater District neighborhood as a whole. Over time, entrepreneurs and universities like Emerson College, known for its performing arts and later Suffolk University restored many theaters. Shops, restaurants and eventually hotels and luxury apartments also opened, welcoming people from near and far into the neighborhood. Today you will see students and professionals in the neighborhood during the day. In the evening you will see both locals and tourists seeing the performances and enjoying the restaurants and bars in the area. Boston's theater district attracts everything from Broadway shows and musical concerts with superb performances, to newcomers to community performances and everything in between. Popular city venues, along with how tickets are purchased and examples of past and upcoming performances, include the following: Boston Opera House: The first show in what is now a Boston Opera house was held in 1926. After decades without regular maintenance, in 1995, The New York Times That's why boston opera underwent restoration in the early 2000s, which included an update to ensure major Broadway productions could. It reopened in 2004. Boston Opera House is at 539 Washington Street, and tickets are on sale at boston.broadway.com. Charles Playhouse: In 2014, Charles Playhouse celebrated its 175th anniversary with a \$2 million renovation. Owned and run by Broadway in Boston, this place is home to popular shows such as Shear Madness and Blue Man Group performances. It was originally designed as a church and then became the first in Boston. From there it was a speechn during Prohibition and then a nightclub after World War II. Charles Playhouse first started showing plays and stuff in 1958. You can find it at 74 Warrenon Street, and tickets are available through boston.broadway.com. Emerson Colonial Theater: The Emerson Colonial Theater, Boston's oldest continuously operating theater, has been open since 1900. It was revived, restored and reopened in 2018 with the pre-World Premiere of moulin rouge. It has also been home to shows such as Oklahoma!, Anything Goes and the Grand Hotel. Although restored, it retained most of its original details. You can also find live music, comedy and other events here. The Emerson Colonial Theatre is located at 106 Boylston Street. For tickets, visit emersoncolonialtheatre.com. Shubert Theatre: Shubert Theatre is known as the Little Princess of the Theatre District, as it suits 1,500 people and features many local community art groups. It is also home to many tourism companies representing Broadway and other performing arts. From 1910 to 2010, it's where Broadway shows such as Cats, Les Miserables and Jersey Boys performed, with little renovation taking place in 1996 specially premiering the musical Rent. Today it functions as an arts community center. Shubert is located at 265 Tremont Street and tickets are available at bochcenter.org. Wang Theatre: Formerly called Music Hall, this place has been part of the Boch Center and has held performances since 1925. It was renovated in 1983 and now has 3,500 spectators from one of the largest stages in the US. Here you can see everything from How the Grinch Stole Christmas and Dancing With The Stars Live, to Paw Patrol Live, Mariah Carey and Jerry Seinfeld. Wang Theatre is located at 270 Tremont Street and tickets can be purchased at bochcenter.org. Wilbur Theater: Built in 1914, the Wilbur Theater's design was inspired by American colonial architecture, which has not yet been done in Boston. It was revitalised in 2008 and is now a popular destination for comedy shows and musical performances, with talent ranging from Jimmy Fallon and Pete Davidson, to Gavin DeGraw and UB40. Wilbur Theatre is located at 246 Tremont Street and tickets are available at thewilbur.com. Thank you for telling us! I know!
