Just a short walk from shops, cafes, restaurants and the coastline. Feed rare Indo-Pacific humpback dolphins! Markets every 3rd Saturday of the month. Located on the beautiful Kulula coast, the hotel is a 2.5-hour drive north of Brisbane and close to the southern tip of The Fraser Island, a World Heritage Site. Tin Kang Bay is best known for being a boating and fishing paradise! For those who love the tranquility of the coastal lifestyle, Kulula National Park, the Great Sand Strait and the World Heritage Island Fraser are just a short walk away. Located just 90 minutes from Hervey Bay and 30 minutes from Rainbow Beach makes it an ideal place to stay, exploring the Fraser Coast and Cooloolo Region. Superb cabins and campsites located in a relaxing atmosphere with the surrounding bush that hosts an abundance of birds. Tin Bay is a fishing and boating paradise located on the Coulula coast 2 1/2 hours north of the state capital of Brisbane and near the southern tip of the World Heritage-listed Fraser Island. Tin Can Bay's main industry is still fishing, boasting a fishing fleet of shrimp and scallop trawlers operating from here on a seasonal basis, and more recently Spanner Crabs are being caught on an overseas market. Tin Bay is famous for its visit to wild dolphins! Our dolphins are usually in Norman Point next to the boat ramp between 7:30 a.m. and 8:00 a.m. They can also visit at other times during the day, but we have no way of knowing when! Some of the other popular attractions are: Bowls Clubs Marina 18-hole golf course and Country Club Tennis Courts Shooting Range Model Aero Club Yacht Club Craft and quilting group Gardening Club RSL Club Restaurants and Hotel Excellent Fishing Waterside cycling and hiking trails Horse riding tracks Boat ramps Skate Park and playgrounds The Kulula region boasts a great climate with temperatures averaging 24 degrees Celsius during the winter/spring seasons and minimal humidity, why don't you want to avoid the southern winters right here on the coast. For current temperatures, tides and all that weather associated in Tin Can Bay you can click Marina and Houseboat/ Yacht Charter Facilities reflect the preponderance of water activities for visitors wishing to explore the Great Sand Strait from Inskip Point in Hervey Bay, Hervey Bay, a waterway protected by Fraser Island. The old town itself is built on a peninsula that juts out in Tin Can Inlet, providing safe beaches for families and calm waters for boating. Just 90 minutes north is Hervey Bay, where whales can be observed from July to November, and the same distance south of the bright lights of Noosa. Learn more... Access to fish here through four wheels only. Double Island Point is an excellent haven for bait fish seeking refuge. It is the only heady between the mouth of the Noosa River and the inskip point, so it is a great place to fish. Ground fishing around the point will produce Jewfish, Tailor, Snapper, Bream and Odd Trevally, Cobia, Tuna and Mackerel can sometimes come closer. Ground access along the rocks is quite easy, but don't forget to fish only in good conditions. Surf breaks also hold a good amount of tailor during the winter. Beach Fishing Seasons During the summer beaches and capes are mainly Bream, Whiting, Tarwhine and darts. Winter is by far the most productive time for beach fishing. Bream and Tarwhine are becoming more abundant. Late winter sees Tailor move up the beach and into the gutters. Flathead are a consistent catch and the jewfish are likely to be enclosed. For boaters and kayakers, there is usually always calm waters to run on the north side of the Point Double Island. Access to the launch here either via Tewantin or Rainbow Beach. With the direction of Tewantin the sandy track crosses the cape and can be tricky with a large boat. Around the cape there is some good spotted reef that produces the winter Snapper. During tailor run between September and October the tailors attract larger species like mackerel and GT. Fishing around a cape can be that dynamite in these times. Sweetlip, Snapper, Kobia, Jewfish, Mackerel and yellowtail kingfish have all been caught around the cape here, and further offshore anglers can fight sweetlip, trout and red emperor. But be careful, as weather conditions can change quite quickly. Some notable offshore sites are Pinnacles, 7 miles and further from shore to 12 miles and 20 miles. Inskip Point Is an extremely popular camping spot. Inskip Point is a popular spot to soak up the bait along a stretch of the Great Sand Strait entrance. The tide can work hard here, so changing tides is best for bait. Anglers can encounter all sorts here, Bream, Flathead, Tailor and Whiting are common catches. Focus your efforts around any gutters form on the east side for best results. If the wind is up, inside Inskip Point is a good relaxing place to soak up some bait. Anglers can expect Flathead, Bream and Whiting here. There really isn't a trick here and the best bait shrimp, squid and strip mullet or The tailor will also be often a sandy point. The best time to target tailor around Inskip and Double Island Point is their annual run up the coast, which happens in September. Anytime between July and December they can be around. For boat anglers, the mouth of the Great Sand Strait catches tuna well once again. You will know that they are around when you see birds in the sky running bait fish. Tailor is also around from July to December. Tin-Kan Bay inside the Great Sand Strait is a fantastic place for boaters and kayakers to explore. The waters remain relatively calm and, as a rule, there is always an option. There are large Flathead, Bream and Whiting populations throughout Pelican Bay, Tin Kang entrance and joining creeks like Carlo and Snapper Creek. Most small run offs, feeder creeks, canals and drop-offs produce flatheads on outgoing tides. While the tide will see Whiting and Bream move to apartments. The population of Mangrove Jack is not large here compared to the northern streams in the Great Sand Strait. However, it is still worth exploring upstream of Carlo, Snapper and Teebar Creeks in the summer. Don't be afraid to explore upstream the skinny waters during high tides. Trevally is also popular throughout Tin Can Bay. They can be found working school baits at apartments, points and intersections of intersecting creeks. Western apartments usually produce on the rise. John Mallard has been fishing DI HB for the past 10 years in line and recreational fishing with great knowledge of the pristine waterways of the Great Sand Strait. Tin-Kan Bay, Tin-Kan Bay, 245km north of Brisbane, is a small hub with more than 2000 people on the mainland, opposite the southern tip of Fraser Island. It is located in a protected position in a deep but narrow entrance, which is additionally protected from the untreated force of the ocean by the peninsula protruding from the mainland near rainbow beach (see below), on the other side of the va-podkilo. Tin Can Bay is a relaxing and scenic holiday for those who want a holiday and simple pleasures, not cultural activities. It is said to be the name Tin Can Bay serves, as a kind of homophone, from the Aboriginal name of the place Tuncanbar, which is believed to refer to dugongs, which are still often the area, along with sea turtles, birds and friendly dolphins that come straight ashore for feed and frolic. The European settlement was founded here around 1870. The cape, which stretches to Norman Point, was the location of one of the state's earliest railways, which was built to transport logs to the shoreline from where they were transferred, on a raft, to the Maryborough Mills. Later, the Tin Bay became and remains a fishing village focused on shrimp. It also offers excellent recreational opportunities for casual visitors as well as the tranquil, pleasant surroundings of the neighborhood boating, sailing, windsurfing, houseboats and canoeing. Norman Point (along the Esplanade) has a boat ramp, a marina, a jetty and a fish market, as well as water equipment. There are many safe shoals for family swimming, along with parks, picnic and barbecue areas and playgrounds. Crabs, scenic walks and golf are also popular. Visitors will find enough amenities to meet their needs, including supermarket, marine supplies outlet, equipment, car service, pharmacy, newspaper, butcher, baker, seafood outlet, greengrocer, hairdresser, bank, library, post office and emergency services. Bush's Seafood Bay Fun Day is held on the shore every year in September.
