


Zone 7 planting guide flowers

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Clematis growing on arbor live in the Chicago area, which is zone 5 on the map of the U.S. plant hardiness zone. Areas in the U.S. are classified based on their temperature in winter- the coldest winter temperatures in zone 5 can reach somewhere between -20 to -10 F. To ensure greater success with your garden, choose plants that are designed for the zone in which you live. You will experience less stress and so will your flowers, shrubs and trees. Flowers that perennials in warm climates can be grown in zone 5 as annuals such as lantana, hibiscus, and fuchsia. Read on as I recommend my favorite easy-to-grow garden favorites that thrive in the 5.Monarch butterfly zone on the purple coneflowerMy Five Favorite Areas 5 Perennial flowering plants are gaining popularity. Gardeners use them for several reasons: you don't need to plant them every year, they save money and they provide beautiful and interesting flowers. Many of them attract butterflies and birds. Planning is important with perennials. Be sure to read how big they will grow when they bloom and their color blooms. The most interesting perennial gardens to date have four seasons of interest. Purple Coneflower: Long-term favorite garden and native Illinois. Daisies are like cheerful flowers, and butterflies and birds love them. Popular, low-serve and long-lived plant. Phlox Paniculata Becky Towe: Summer flowering clox tends to be taller, more upright and lump-forming than spring flowering varieties. This one has salmon colored flowers with a purple eye. Careful mottled foliage adds interest to your garden. Baptisia Midnight Prairie Blues: Baptisias are energetic shrub plants that have attractive blue-green foliage and sweet pea flowers, followed by dark seed pods. This one is very long lived, easy to grow and floral. The features are pretty periwinkle blue flowers and is known for being a rabbit resistant. Campanula Pink Octopus: These light plants are perfectly named for borders and rock gardens. This one features unique Japanese bud lanterns that are open to bright pink, octopus-like flowers. Blossoms gracefully flutter down from the vertically flowering branches. A lot of guileless variety. Black-Eyed Susan (Rudbeckia Goldstrum): Beloved generations of gardeners, rudbeckias energetic, colorful and ostentatious. It is easy to grow in the sun or part of the shade. They are versatile, have a long flowering time, and make excellent cut flowers. Golden-yellow chamomile-like flowers have various dark brown central cones. Lantana's Luscious Citrus Blend'one 5 Annual: Nine slanted and true performers are plants that sprout from seeds, grow, flower, produce seeds and die in one season. In the garden of The Area 5 annual begin to bloom in early summer and continue to bloom until they are killed by the frosty weather. Choose them carefully and they they fit in almost any situation in your garden. They are excellent for edging, accents, garden cutting, containers, and fillers in your perennial garden. Here are some good performers I recommend: Vinca: Look like impatience but loves the sun. My plants are the choice for brown finger types or beginners. It is easy to grow, low maintenance, and comes in a variety of colors. zonal geraniums: What not to love! Just don't forget the deadhead, so they keep blooming all season. I always gravitate towards coral and bright pink for my garden. Lantana: Drought is tolerant, very colorful and attracts butterflies. Petunia: Easy care and wave, the rear varieties look large cascading on the sides of containers or window boxes. I'm partial to purple. Coleus: Grown up for their colorful foliage, so many amazing combinations! Look great in the garden or in containers. Calirohoa: Fantastic colors plus hummingbirds, and butterflies love them. Scaevola: Trailing types are great in pots and hanging baskets. I love lavender blue paired with yellow and orange flowers. Dahlia: Energetic, vertical, mounded plants in different colors. Good for cutting and cold tolerance. Begonia: Great blooms all season as well drained soil. Guide to the use of native plants Hydrangea Invincible Spirit'one 5 Flowering Shrubs: Six Easy-Care Varieties'one 5 Gardens will not be complete without flowering shrubs. They provide a seasonal color and a good structure for garden beds along with winter interest after the end of the season. Make sure to give them a good start by carefully planning where they will be planted. I can't tell you how many times I've seen shrubs planted too close together or too close to home or sidewalk. Consider the mature size, shape and flowers of shrubs. Space them in line with the directions of care so they have the ability to grow and thrive for years of pleasure. Here are some of my favorite flowering, ornamental shrubs: Cotoneaster: Tiny Pink Flowers in May and Cranberry Red Berries in Autumn. The leaves provide a great autumn color. Attracts birds. Supplied in a variety of sizes from 2' - 3' to 8' - 10' varieties. Dogwood: Adaptable and energetic flowering shrubs. Especially like the types with bright red stems - stunning! They add much-needed color to the winter garden. In spring or early summer, yellow, white or pink flowers bloom. Forsythia: Ahhh spring has arrived! The masses of yellow bloom and are good for cutting. We need well-drained soil. Hydrangea: provides a great splash of color to the garden with their large, spectacular flowers. Old-fashioned plants that are enjoying a resurgence in popularity. The new Invincible Spirit is one I'm going to check out this season. Part of the sales from this hardy, pink hydrangea will be donated to breast cancer research. Mock Orange: Reblooming shrub with luscious, fragrant white flowers. Dwarf dwarf variety recommended and easy care. I planted one next to our patio-smells wonderful and butterflies. Potentilla: One of the few shrubs that bloom all summer. Drought-tolerant sustainable performer. Grows 2' - 3' high. Available in yellow, white, pink and orange-red. When we got married, it was the first flowering shrub I planted in our first home. He thrived with a little care- I was still learning and developing my green finger at that point. My five favorite zones are 5 shrubs for fall ColorBarberry Golden Ruby: A very adaptable shrub, but won't tolerate wet conditions. The foliage appears bright orange and matures to a rather burgundy hue with a gold ring. Burning Bush Compact: The shiny red autumn color makes the burning bush a very popular choice for gardens. A versatile, easy care shrub that can be used as a hedge or screen. I've always loved this shrub, so reminds me of autumn! Smokebush Golden Spirit: Lovely round leaves that appear gold lime green in spring, Summer foliage matures to a rich green color. Show-stopping fall color ranges from pink, orange and coral to red. Viburnum Summer Snowflake: It's cutey compact and usually reaches 3 to 5 high. In spring, this variety of Viburnums blooms with clusters of white flowers, similar to snowflakes. In autumn, the foliage turns rusty red into bronze. Bright red berries relish birds. Witch Hazel: Sprouts yellow flowers in late October to early December. Plant the seeds directly in the garden or in pots in full sun after the last frost. Many types have great edible seeds you can enjoy with your kids, or share them with birds. Variety try: SupersnackFire CatcherSHOP SUNFLOWER SEEDS 3 Cherry Tomatoes Many tomatoes are actually long vines that require a bet, but new varieties of cherry tomatoes have been bred to be compact and neat so they grow best in pots. Plant several different species, so you'll have a rainbow of colors to harvest. Variety to try: Sweetheart from Patio HybridYellow PearSHOP TOMATO SEEDS 4 Mint Fast-Growing Mint is a fun and wholesome plant to grow. You can grow it outside in the ground, in an open container, or inside on the windowsill. It is a great addition to brewed tea and brings up freshness in desserts and salty foods alike. Varieties to try: Spearmint Chocolate MintSHOP MINT PLANTS AND SEEDS 5 Nasturtium These light flowers grow, with blue-green leaves and gorgeous flowers, grow in rock climbing or mound shapes. They come in an array of colors from peach and red to coral and rose and show up all season before freezing. But the coolest thing about flowers and leaves is that they are edible, so children can suck them on summer salads and delicious desserts without baking. Variety to try: Baby RosePeach MelbaSHOP NASTURTIIUM SEEDS 6 Sweet Potato Vine Sweet Potato Vine claim to fame is its starring role as the perfect spill in containers and window boxes. But did you know that this attractive chartreuse stunner is also the result of a super fun science project your kids will love? To grow the vine from a whole sweet potato: Take the whole sweet potato (cutting side down) and poke four toothpicks in the middle, then rest the potatoes on the lip of a clear glass (Mason jar works perfectly). Fill the glass with water, cover the bottom of the sweet potato. After 7-10 days, one root will begin to form in the water, and sprouts will begin to appear on top. Watch it grow and then transplant into a pan or in the ground. Variety to try: Sweet Caroline Sweet LimeSweet Caroline bewitched after MidnightSHOP MidnightSHOP POTATO VINE PLANTS 7 Butterfly Bush Long, spiky flowers in shades of red, white, pink or purple on this hardy bush attract a bunch of butterflies and hummingbirds all summer long. This shrub loves the full sun and comes in a variety of sizes, two to five feet tall, so read the plant label to make sure you give it enough space. Variety to try:CranRazzPugster BlueSHOP BUTTERFLY BUSHES 8 Elephant Ears Leaves that grow larger than their heads? You children will be amazed at the size of the elephant ear plants. (Also be sure to note that they have the shape of a heart.) Bonus: These bold, jungle-like perennials are coming back year after year. Variety try:Fordhook GiantBlackSHOP ELEPHANT EAR PLANTS AND BULBS 9 Are the flower happier than the daisy, with its bright yellow center and crisp white petals? With the right amount of water and sunlight, it is easy to grow chamomile. To keep the flowers coming and the plants look neat, teach your children how to be dead (remove old flowers). Variety to try: Snow Lady ShastaCrazy Daisy ShastaSHOP DAISY PLANTS AND SEEDS 10 pumpkins take up a lot of space in the garden, with vines that can stretch up to 20 feet in length, although the new varieties are more compact. It's a relative term though, as smaller types can still require about six square feet of space! But they are terribly fun to grow up because they come in every size and shade, from pale white to bright orange. They're also versatile: Eat them, decorate them, roast seeds, or try your hand at these simple pumpkin carving ideas. Variety try:PepitasKandy Korn Plus HybridSHOP PUMPKIN SEEDS 11 Lamb's Ear This hardy, best perennial for your garden with a charming name has velvety, silver foliage (which resembles lamb ears, of course!) and unique floral spikes. It is not particularly fussy and tolerates drought and bad soil. Children will love the unique texture. Variety to try: Big EarsCotton BollSHOP LAMB'S EAR SEEDS 12 Strawberry Kids love to collect bright berries fresh from the plant. The new varieties of strawberries are pretty, compact plants that produce fruit throughout the season and thrive in containers and hanging baskets. They can be grown from seeds, but it takes time. Look for plants that will bear fruit in the first season. Variety to try: DelizzBerried TreasureSHOP STRAWBERRY PLANTS 13 Marigolds These sturdy annuals are probably a familiar sight to you, and there's a reason Grandma has always grown them. Known for their heat and drought resistance and natural insect-repellent characteristics, they're hilarious little guys too, making them an old-fashioned favorite. Pro tip: Save dried flower heads for seeds next year. Variety Try: Endurance yellow and orange Hybrids SophiaSHOP MARIGOLD SEEDS AND PLANTS 14 Pole bean beans are incredibly easy to grow, and the more beans you choose, the more your plant will produce. Plant seeds in sunny sunshine as soon as the danger of frost has passed. Some types, such as the heirloom variety scarlet runner, attract hummingbirds too. Variety try:SeychellesScarlet RunnerSHOP POLE BEAN SEEDS 15 Sweet Alyssum This lacy-looking annual plant has a sweet aroma that is easily carried in the wind. Pollinators like it. It is also a sturdy plant that looks remarkably cascading out of window boxes and hanging baskets next to other plants. And because it can withstand a mild frost, it lasts a long time in the garden.
