The school also serves students from Englewood Cliffs, who participate as part of a referral/receiving relationship. [3] Dwight Morrow High School shares the campus with the Englewood Academies. In the 2018-2019 school year, the school had an enrolment of 1,063 students and 83.5 classroom teachers (e-books based on ETE) for a student-teacher ratio of 12.7:1. There were 475 students (44.7% of enrollment) eligible for free lunch and 85 (8.0% of students) eligible for low-cost lunch. [1] The Englewood Academies is a four-year-old magnet high school that divides the campus that serves students from grades IX to twelfth in Bergen County. [4] The program was initiated by Dr. John Grieco (founder of bergen County Academies) who served ninth graders in Bergen County. The school was originally created in an effort to diversify the dwight Morrow High School campus by attracting elite students from outside the Englewood community to a high-performance academic school with academic challenges, and the program was modeled after its Bergen County academies. [5] The school was further created to raise Public Education in Bergen County, and is now part of Englewood Schools District (formerly part of the Bergen Technical Schools District). Dr. John Grieco was also district superintendent during the inaugural school years. [6] Established in 2002, the Englewood Academies include five professional and academic divisions. History Located on a 37-acre (15-hectare) park-like campus and built at a cost of \$750,000 from a design by architect Lawrence C. Licht, the school was opened to students, helping to ease overcrowding at the existing high school and high school facilities. [7] The school is named after Dwight Morrow, a businessman, politician, and diplomat who lived in the city; Morrow was also the father-in-law of the aviator Charles Lindbergh. The school shares its campus with Academies of Englewood are located east of Miller's Pond and share the same administration. Janis E. Dismus Middle School, formerly Englewood Middle School, is located south of Miller's Pond and operates independently. The school's accredited by the Association of Colleges and School's accreditation status was abolished. [9] Demographic problems in the 1980s, local demographic changes drastically altered the school's ethnic body, leading to an African-American majority. The nearby district, Englewood Cliffs, tried to end the welcoming relationship with Englewood because of the school's poor performance. This led to a bitter court battle between Englewood Cliffs since 1985, a movement characterized by Englewood as a racist. By 1992, the school was 97% African-American and Hispanic. More violent incidents were reported at DMHS (Dwight Morrow High School) than any other school in Bergen County in the 1991-92 school year, and test results remained painfully low. [10] Court battles continued in an attempt to desegregate the high school. According to the John E. Rooney assembly, white students at Englewood Cliffs, the district is trying to end its obligation to send its students to Dwight Morrow, feared for their safety at the heavily minority institution. Most of Englewood Cliffs' parents chose private school over Dwight Morrow High School. [11] In the fall of 2002, a new magnet program was opened in an attempt to lure non-African-American students back to school. The opening of the new academy led to more discrimination from the point of view of the African-American community in Englewood. The academy was given a part of the campus to operate on, and the regular high school, Dwight Morrow, continued to operate on the rest of the campus. The Academy has a diverse population and is kept separate from Dwight Morrow while occupying the same campus. This created two separate schools on the Campus. Dwight Morrow recently had protests, overcrowded classrooms and lower education. The books are old and the classes are overcrowded, said..., a junior. In my history class at least five students have to stand up every day. [12] The Academy has highly qualified teachers as well as better resources. Students are enlivened and proud of their school and opportunities. Many People in Englewood feel that the city of Englewood worked against high school progress by opening academies. About 50% of students are from Englewood. The African-American community in Englewood feels that the city and the education board have put their minority residents second in the move. For the past three years they have felt like second-class citizens in their own city, sharing a campus with another high school touted as academic superior, and gaining no respect... The message for children and parents at that 97% African-American and Hispanic high school is that for so-called integration to happen on campus, you have to swallow the bitter pill that tastes like apartheid.
