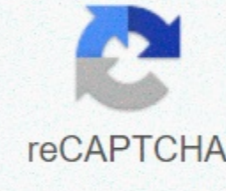

There may be many benefits to sending your child to a private school, but when you calculate the huge tuition fee each year, you may wonder if the payment is tax deductible. Unfortunately, when it comes to U.S. federal taxes, the short answer is no. If your child attends a K-12 private school, there are no federal tax deductions or credits to help pay for tuition. However, when your child graduates and enters the college where they pay, they start qualifying for certain educational deductions. Until then, there's not much in the way of tax cuts to ease your costs. If you need help paying for a private school, that doesn't mean you're out of luck. Specific states — Alabama, Arizona, Florida, Georgia, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Louisiana, New Hampshire, Oklahoma, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, Carolina and Virginia - provide national tax credits to organizations that distribute private school enrollment in the form of scholarships [Source: State Legislative Council]. Businesses and individuals can also send a portion of the state taxes they have to pay to these organizations as an alternative to the school voucher program. Generally, organizations are set up to pay for low-income children who have household incomes below a certain threshold to attend private schools. There is no exhaustive tax deduction for private school tuition, but there is one way the IRS can make it easier to pay for tuition. Parents or guardians can set up a COVERdell Education Savings Account (ESA) to help reduce future education costs without tax. Coverdell ESA is a trust or custody account set up exclusively to pay for the education of a designated beneficiary. They are similar to Roth IRAs in that the money is being invested in mutual funds, stocks and bonds, both of which allow annual tax-free contributions. You're limited to investing \$2,000 a year, but if you follow certain guidelines, you're tax-free, just like withdrawals. The deposit must be cash and can be configured until the beneficiary is 18. The money can be used until the child reaches age 30 (after which taxes and penalties apply) [Source: Finaid.org]. If you're interested in setting up an account for a specific child, you don't even need to claim your child as a dependent. This means that grandparents, uncles, and aunts can still contribute to their children's education. If you don't exceed the \$2,000 annual limit, you can also fund your existing Coverdell ESA. In her case, she took out a student loan for immediate payment, and used annual tuition repayment payments to repay her student loan debt. However, in many cases, you can make a full every year without even having to carry out a student loan. If you want debt-free graduate school, one option might be to look abroad. Many schools that offer free tuition to European citizens offer the same discounts to non-EU nationals. However, not all international schools offer courses in English, so they may run into some language barriers. There are several select universities abroad that offer free tuition to U.S. international students. And nevertheless, this school is not completely free - you often have to pay a fee and cover your own living expenses. Bergen Country University: Norwegian Education: English, Norwegian All state-only Norwegian universities are free of tuition, but students must pay a \$67 enrollment fee. It offers a wide range of courses in English, so you don't necessarily need to know acceptable Norwegian. And U.S. graduate students can also receive scholarships through the Norwegian-American Association (NORAM). Norway is expensive, though, although heavy subsidized living non. rooms, boards and transportation costs are expected to pay at least \$1,380 a month. Oslo Country University: Norwegian Language of Education: Norwegian Another public Norwegian university, The University of Oslo offers the same tuition and fees as the University of Bergen. However, U.S. students must prove that they have access to at least \$1,310 a

month to obtain a student visa - even though students work up to the legal limit of 20 hours per week to partially cover this cost. The course is also Norwegian, which can be a problem for students who do not speak the language. University of Iceland: Icelandic Education: English Iceland University is free for all students - even those outside the EUROPEAN UNION. It is one of the only free options that offers course catalogs entirely in English, so you are not limited to what you can study. The downside is the cost of living - expect to pay at least \$1,669 a month to cover the basic costs. Free University of Berlin: German German Language: This university in German and English does not charge tuition fees for almost any program, regardless of your nationality. However, you have to pay a small fee. Schools estimate that students spend \$667 on how to get \$779 semester, and you must prove that you can pay that amount to obtain a visa. But you can find and get jobs in and out of school. The downside is the language requirements. Unless you are fluent in German, this option is a better choice for postgraduate students - the only bachelor's program available in English is North American studies. Low-cost international schools for U.S. students may not be entirely free for U.S. students, but they are much cheaper than going to a school at Vienna Country University.: Austrian in Education: English, German Annual Tuition: \$1,663 The lowest university in the U.S. It is also one of the largest universities in Austria, with more than 178 degree programs and 92,000 students. Some programs are available in English, but students must pass an proficiency test in German before entering most programs. Can I pass? You can level your language skills by enrolling in the University of Vienna's University Preparation Program, which costs about \$1,340 a semester - still stealing compared to U.S. schools. Warsaw Country University: Polish Education: English, Polish Annual Tuition: \$2,226 Both receive \$5,509 founded in 1815, warsaw university is the highest ranked university in Poland. The student body of 45,500 students boasts approximately 5,000 international students through academic exchanges. Tuition fees vary depending on the academic program. Degree programs are available in both Polish and English, so you don't have to sign up for Polish classes first. Freiburg Country University: German and English Inter-Year Tuition: \$3,339 This West German university is ideal for students wishing to travel to Europe - it is an hour's drive from Swisstrassbour, France and Basel, and two hours from Zurich. All programs are conducted in German, with the exception of liberal arts and science programs. If you plan to study in German, you must pass the certification exam or provide proof that you have passed a sufficient level of language classes. Anglo-American University Country: Czech Language Education: English-language tuition: \$7,020 This relatively new university opened in 1990 to provide English language education in Prague. It is a small school - classes are almost in the top 15 students, unlike many European universities. And it's very international, with student sessions in 70 countries. It is also eded by the WASC Senior College and College Committee, a U.S. lyser recognized by the U.S. Department of Education. This means that when you come home, you'll have less difficulty recognizing your degree. Can I get financial assistance for a non-U.S. degree? But I can. Grants for international students are generally limited to the end of the university. Some U.S.-based scholarship programs provide funding for degrees abroad. Organizations like NAFSA: The International Association of Educators is working to provide information and support for U.S. students who want to study in a foreign country. Don't have scholarship options? Some international schools still allow U.S. students to apply for federal student assistance, including loans and grants. You can check the Department of Education's federal student support website to see if you are eligible for college. Schools that meet 100% of their financial needs offer full-ride scholarships to low-income families - typically household incomes must be less than \$65,000 to qualify. Low-income students can investigate external scholarships and grants if the school is not able to meet all of their financial needs. There are also a few tuition-free online universities that are tuition-free by the Ministry of Education. These include Renmin University and PDMF University.
